As Seva Mandal Education Society (SMES) celebrates its Ruby Jubilee, Dr. Dilip Trivedi, President of SMES, shared his reflections on the institution's remarkable 40-year journey. Dr. Trivedi, who has been associated with SMES for decades, provided a glimpse into its history, challenges, and vision for the future.

The story of SMES began in 1957, driven by its founders' vision to provide educational opportunities for women. Over this time, the achieved institution has milestones such as moving to the MMP Shah building in 1972, inaugurated by President V.V. Giri, and expanding its student body to over 700.

When asked about the challenges faced during the initial years, Dr. Trivedi cited financial constraints and the need

to ensure the safety of female students. "Securing funds was one of our initial challenges, but the philanthropic community in Bombay has always generous," he said. The institution even ran a hostel to support students but later transitioned to partnerships for accommodations. One defining feature of SMES is commitment to inclusivity. "We are dedicated to serving the lower-income group without imposing financial barriers," Dr. Trivedi emphasized. college operates without a management quota or seat donations, relying instead on alumni contributions and CSR funds to provide scholarships and financial aid.

Over the years, SMES has become synonymous with academic excellence. "We've produced gold medallists and top rankers across disciplines," Dr. Trivedi noted with pride. He acknowledged that the primary challenge moving forward is space. "Redevelopment is an option, but it would require temporary

relocation. which presents issues," said. logistical he Despite these hurdles, his vision clear: expanding the institution's reach while maintaining its commitment to quality and inclusivity.

When asked about his team's role in the institution's growth, Trivedi praised efforts collaborative of professionals, including chartered accountants. architects, and educators, who meet weekly to manage the institution's affairs. "There's a strong sense of camaraderie and mutual respect, which has been crucial in overcoming challenges," he shared. As the Ruby **Jubilee** celebrations Trivedi's commence, Dr. reflections serve as a reminder of SMES's transformative impact on women's education. "Our founders believed in the power of education to uplift society, and we continue to honour that legacy," he concluded.





"I feel like it's not just about coming here, studying for three years, and then having no further contact. I think they will always be there for you."

She now has a better understanding of what the college is doing. She encourages students to participate in different activities because it will definitely help them all. The college is offering so much, one must should grab those opportunities.

She quickly adapted to handling administrative work along with accounts. What initially seemed like an overwhelming challenge soon became a defining aspect of her journey at BMN.

She also speaks highly of the management's generosity, recalling how their support for staff members remained steadfast. She particularly remembers the advice of Dr Bharath Pathak, who encouraged her to always work with sincerity—an ethos she has carried throughout her career.

One of her most significant contributions was during the College with Potential for Excellence process. When the then-principal was invited to a University Grants Commission (UGC) meeting, Mrs. Khurshid was asked to accompany her. They were informed that the proposal had to be submitted the very next day. In response, under the strong leadership of Dr. Shilpa Charankar, the non-teaching staff, along with Vice Principal Dr. Mala Pandurang and BCA Co-ordinator Mr. Shahajahan Khan Sir, worked tirelessly late into the night, completing the proposal by midnight. Their collective effort paid off, securing the college the first rank.

She also recalls the uniqueness of BMN's vacation classes, which once attracted long queues for admission. 

Oggy, her partner in crime, gave her a final goodbye before we buried her. The house felt emptier, her favourite spots untouched, and her cat food left uneaten. Every corner echoed with her absence. Though Olly was with us only for just 39 days, she gave us a lifetime of memories. Her intelligence, playful spirit, and unconditional love showed us that even the shortest lives leave the deepest marks. We miss her dearly, but her light continues to guide us in our hearts. Olly's time with us was brief, yet her impact was eternal. She taught us to cherish every moment, find joy in the little things, and love without limits. Though she's gone, her spirit remains a reminder that love, no matter how brief, is always worth it. She was a tiny star who left a big impact, her memory forever etched in our hearts.

how their scent calmed me, and my preference for simple joys.


