EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Dr. Bhanuben Mahendra Nanavati College of Home Science was established in 1984. The institution has grown progressively over the past thirty two years, and today it offers courses at both graduate and postgraduate level. It is a multifaculty educational institute affiliated to SNDT Women's University. The parent body of the institute is the Seva Mandal Education Society (SMES).

The foundation for SMES was laid in 1957 when it began its first institution for women with just seven students. It has gradually expanded over a period of time, both in terms of the number of students as well as the number of courses offered. The vision of SMES is to strive for 'the Empowerment of Women through Quality in Education', and the institution has been working towards this goal with great determination and dedication.

As an all-women's institution, it particularly caters to the needs of students from conservative family backgrounds. The institute provides every opportunity to avail of qualitative educational facilities to female students, thereby enabling them to become self-sufficient and confident to face the outer world. The institute's focus is on skill based education and holistic development of the student's personality.

The institute was first accredited by NAAC in 2002 with a B+ Grade. Keeping the feedback from the NAAC Peer Team as a guideline, the institute and management worked on a perspective plan with keen commitment and dedication. In 2011, the institute underwent the NAAC reaccreditation process (2nd cycle) and was awarded an A grade with 3.64/4.

In April 2016, the institute received the status of 'College with Potential for excellence' from the U.G.C.

The institute and the management believe in the constant pursuit of excellence. We present below a criterion—wise summary of the significant highlights and best practices of the institution in the last five years from 2011-2016.

Criterion One: Curricular Aspects

The criterion describes how our academic programs are in line with our Institutional Vision of 'Empowerment of Women through Quality in Education'. We consider it our primary task to mold our women students into responsible and productive citizens, keeping the core values of NAAC as a benchmark. Our programs are mainly affiliated to the SNDT Women's University and this criterion concentrates on key aspects of our curriculum as upgraded by the SNDT Women's University in 2012. The criterion highlights the participation of 70% of our faculty on important decision making bodies of SNDT Women's University as well as other academic bodies. The NAAC peer team had rightly suggested that the institution should start additional postgraduate courses as well as short term skill and vocation oriented course. In keeping with this counsel, we have introduced two postgraduate programs (M.Sc. in Dietetics and Food Service Management, and Masters in Computer Education) through IGNOU. This is in view of the fact that our parent university has not been granting permission to affiliated colleges to start postgraduate programs. The courses allow for the vertical mobility of our students. In order to promote the holistic development of our students, we have introduced innovative short duration certificate courses emphasizing on entrepreneurial skills, research skills, landscaping, catering, and pre-school and crèche management. We have also upgraded our value added courses on life skills, soft skills and computer education.

Criterion II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation


Our faculty is committed to student-centric approaches and innovative teachinglearning techniques and evaluation methods which involve rigor as well as transparency. Our emphasis is on student performance and learning outcomes. It is our institutional policy not to turn away any woman student who seeks admission, until our available seats are filled. We believe that all students are entitled to an equal opportunity and there is no cut-off percentage for admission as long as students meet the basic eligibility criteria of the university. We take special care to cater to students who are mainly first generation college goers. Our student-centric teachers build up a good rapport with students, and identify both weak and advanced learners. Faculty takes the lead in engaging students in innovative learning styles, which also involves the use of ICT. They actively participate in one-to-one mentoring of students. In order to illustrate how learning is made student centric, institutional strategies in terms of life skills, knowledge management and lifelong learning programs are listed. Special attention is paid to ICT tools to enrich the learning experience. Strategies are shared on how the institution works towards faculty up gradation. Our Management ensures the availability of required equipment and infrastructure. Equal importance is also placed on creating awareness and developing entrepreneurial skills. The criterion also describes various evaluative measures, which are communicated to our stakeholders at every turn.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Although we are primarily an undergraduate institution, efforts are made to promote a culture of research orientation. Advanced learners are encouraged to explore topics with a certain degree of research orientation for their seminar presentations. Our M.Sc. students are involved in collaborative projects with the Food Industry such as Marico Industries, Pepsico India Ltd and Chini-kum. The college lays stress on inculcating a humanistic outlook in students, and imparting a sense of social responsibility towards society at large. The institution places stress on the utilization of student's potential for extension activities and outreach programs, especially in the thrust area of the 'wellbeing of women and children in the community'. We have established ongoing linkages with neighbourhood social service organizations. Staff members have taken up the responsibility of sharing expertise in areas such as early childhood education and community nutrition through social consultancy. The institution promotes a culture of research by encouraging faculty members to present papers at international, national and regional level conferences and seminars.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The Management of the Seva Mandal Education Society has extended its fullest support to enhance the infrastructural facilities of the institution. Enhanced



Criterion V: Student Support and progression

Every effort is made to facilitate students to complete their course, by means of financial support and academic and personal counseling. The number of freeships given to students has increased considerably from the last NAAC cycle. Financial aid is provided to needy students in the form of institutional freeships. Students are also guided on how to apply for Government freeships. Facilities offered under student welfare schemes include the presence of a trained counselor on campus, teacher-student mentoring program, and free access to internet and gym facilities at very nominal rates. The NSS unit organizes an annual health check-up for all volunteers. The college has worked towards strengthening its placement activities. Steps taken to facilitate employment include organizing campus interviews and orientations towards competitive exams and entrepreneurship skills workshops. Our students participate in a range of inter-collegiate co-curricular and sports events. They have shown exceptional promise by winning laurels at national, state and university levels. Several college level awards have been instituted to motivate students to give their best.

Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

The dedication and long term vision of the Management of the Seva Mandal Education Society has taken this institution from its humble beginning in 1984, to its present status today as a premier college of the SNDT Women's University. Criterion VI describes how the commitment of our Management is manifested in multiple ways. The criterion also stresses upon a policy of transparency in the governance and management of the institution. The relatively small number of teaching staff and students facilitate the coordination and monitoring process. Committees work efficiently to carry out varied responsibilities. The Management plays an important role in providing fiscal support for campus development. The college budget deficit is met by the Management which leaves no stone unturned to fulfill the institutions requirements. The criterion lists the mechanisms for performance assessment of faculty and staff. The IQAC has played a proactive role in initiating and monitoring activities that enhance the quality of the institution. One of the important quality improvement tools that we implement is the K.A.S.H. model (Knowledge, Attitude, Skills and Habits)

Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices

Criterion VII offers an opportunity to explain how core values of NAAC are reflected through the innovative practices of the institution. We recognize the urgent need for environment sensitization programs. We work towards



inculcating a goal oriented attitude, and ensuring the holistic development of our students. Our best practices include inculcating a sense of social responsibility in our students through a variety of social outreach programs which benefit neighborhood communities. Another best practice is our concerted efforts to foster global competencies and enhance employability skills through linkages and collaborative ventures with the industry.



CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

The vision statement of Dr. B.M.N College of Home Science is well defined as: "Empowerment of women through quality in education."

Our Mission is "To impart quality education to women and enable them to become independent and competent, thereby benefiting our society and country at large."

Our parent body is Seva Mandal Education Society (SMES) which was established in 1957. The emblem of SMES is '*Tamaso ma Jyotirgamaya*' which is a pledge to lead one from darkness to light through the instrument of education.

Our institutional objectives are as follows:

- To foster a healthy learning environment
- To make teaching and research relevant to social needs
- To inculcate a humanist outlook in students by means of value based education and community outreach programs
- To focus on vocationalization of courses

The college strives to inform and sensitize our students and stakeholders about our vision and the mission through multiple channels as follows:

- Our vision and mission statements appear on the home page of the college website www.bmncollege.com as well as all publications of the institution including the prospectus, college diary, information brochures, college magazine, S.M.E.S annual report, college research journal *Ideas*, seminar proceedings, standard operating procedures manual (SOP), library manual and manual on examination rules and regulations
- The statements appear on display boards placed at strategic points such as at the main entrance of the institution, Principal's office, staff room, students 'common room, library and larger classrooms. We ensure that there is a prominent display of vision and mission statements at the time of admission.
- The mission statement is communicated verbally by the Principal, Vice-Principal and teaching staff at every interface with stakeholders such as orientation programs for incoming students, seminars, workshops, PTA & Alumnae meetings.
- The statements also appear at the beginning of a documentary made on the Seva Mandal Education Society and its conducted institutions, which is screened at important functions.



1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

- Our undergraduate and postgraduate degree programs are affiliated to SNDT Women's University. The curriculum for these programs is framed according to unitized modules and this facilitates the effective implementation of the curriculum. Eight of our faculty have been members of the Academic Council/Board of Studies at SNDT Women's University and have participated in the preparation and implementation of the syllabi (Details are given in 1.1.6)
- The institutional calendar is planned in April, so that it is ready to be implemented when the college reopens for the new academic year in June. The examination committee announces internal and external examinations schedules on the calendar to enable teachers to plan completion of the syllabi. Care is taken to ensure that there is a minimum of 90 teaching days per semester, and 180 days in an academic year.
- Examination dates, deadlines for setting of question papers, and for submission of results are announced in advance by the Examination Committee so that faculty can effectively implement the curriculum.
- The calendar is also circulated among major various committees such as Co-Curricular, NSS and Sports to slot in dates for the various activities so as to prevent any overlap of activities. Important meetings such as GC (Governing Council), LMC (Local Managing Committee), IQAC and Quality Improvement Circle are also included.
- The calendar is uploaded on the college website, and the annual schedule of college level events and exam dates are printed in the college diary.
- Faculty members prepare their teaching plans for their respective subjects
 according to the unitized curriculum in terms of modules to be covered, the
 number of classes to be allotted to each subtopic and teaching
 methodologies to be used. The teaching plans are submitted at the beginning
 of each semester to the Head of Department for checking.
- Teachers who are on duty leave for attending faculty development programs and seminars, or who are on personal leave, are required to enter the plan for compensating of lectures in a log maintained by the exam and timetable committee.
- Departments submit an annual self-evaluative report which is then subjected
 to an inter-department audit. Faculty of other departments offers objective
 feedback on the range of activities conducted by each department as well as
 innovative methods to implement the curriculum.
- Student-teacher evaluation is conducted every semester. This enables the authority to review if the curriculum is being taught according to schedule. The institution ensures that required equipment and infrastructure is made available for the effective teaching of subjects
- It is crucial for students to attend classes regularly if they are to gain full benefit from the curriculum. The institution has a strict policy of 75% attendance and class teachers monitor attendance. A defaulters list is prepared and the same is conveyed to the parents by the class teachers.



- Examinations are conducted according to schedules and class tests, assignments and viva voce are also conducted regularly to evaluate the effectiveness of the teaching-learning process
- Teachers take into consideration the learning capacity of students and accordingly plan their teaching strategies for weak students, and advance learners.
- Industrial visits are arranged to give students an insight to practical aspects of the curriculum.
- The Standard Operating Procedure Manual (SOP) for all committees ensures effective planning of academic and extra-curricular activities
- The exam and timetable committee has compiled the guidelines regarding the evaluation blue print for the ready reference of faculty.
- Departments invite guest experts from Industry, NGO, Educational Institutes, and Alumnae for effective implementation of curriculum.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

- Faculty members have regular interaction with the SNDT Women's University in matters regarding curriculum and teaching practices. Faculty members who are members of decision making bodies such as SNDT Women's University Academic Council/Management Council/Senate, communicate changes in academic policies and exam reforms as and when they occur.
- Eight of our senior faculty have been members of curriculum planning and syllabus revision committees of the SNDT Women's University. They are therefore well versed with the objectives of the syllabi in their respective subjects, as well as evaluation patterns and required teaching methodologies.
- Circulars and notices from the University on evaluation patterns, changes regarding syllabi and credit based system are displayed on the staff notice board and discussed during staff meetings.
- The institution has taken the initiative to host the following syllabus revision and question bank workshops:
 - 6th and 7th April 2012: A workshop on "Restructuring the Home Science syllabus" to plan the template of 120 credits for 6 Semesters of the B.Sc. program
 - 5th Feb. 2013: A workshop on major changes in the curriculum/ modular structure at University Level
 - 19th Nov 2013: Workshop on new evaluation patterns and question bank and the experts were Dr. Madhura Kesarkar, Director BCUD, SNDT Women's University and Dr. Ravikala Kamath, Ex Director, Dept. of PGSR. Juhu.
 - 28th April 2014: Workshop on Choice Based Credit Systems organized for faculty from SNDT Women's University colleges.
 - 3rd Aug 2015: Workshop on question banks for V & VI semester subjects of all majors, organized for faculty of SNDT Women's University colleges.



- 13th & 14th August 2012: 8 faculty members were deputed to attend a brain storming session on revised modular based structure on at SNDT, Pune.

We have also organized the following sessions for improving teaching practices and translating the curriculum/updating knowledge:

- Dr. Jayashree Shinde (Head of Dept. of Educational technology, SNDT Women's University) conducted an interactive workshop on ICT Teaching Training Techniques on 11th August, 2011 for 35 staff members.
- 35 faculty members attended a 6 day training program conducted by SNDT Women's University from 15th to 20th April, 2013 on 'Integrating ICT in Higher education' in collaboration with Commonwealth of Learning (Canada).
- Librarian Mrs. Vidya Subramanian conducted a session on 'Use of ICT for Research' on 1st August, 2014 for 30 faculty members.
- A workshop on ICT for teaching and learning was conducted for teaching staff on 4th April, 2016 by Dr. Geeta Thakur (Faculty, Dept. of Education, Pillai College of Education and research). 31 teachers were oriented on how to use online software such as slide share, Animoto, Poster4teachers, 'learnboost', and 'engrade'.
- Mr. Nitin Pawar (faculty BCA) was deputed to attend a UGC sponsored National Seminar on 'Understanding Digital Sound-Music/ Sound Recording Techniques' organized by SVT College of Home Science on 9th March, 2016.

The IQAC has formulated a policy wherein faculty can avail registration fees to encourage participation in workshops and seminars to upgrade their knowledge. This translates into providing in-depth of new information on the subjects in the curriculum. Faculty may also apply to the Staff welfare fund for financial assistance for paper presentations at conferences held abroad. 38 teachers have availed of the same for total amount of `98,264/- .

Faculty members are involved in paper setting and assessment, examining internship projects, and assessing PhD thesis from other Universities. This helps them to upgrade their subject knowledge as well as to adapt innovative practices of other institutions to the needs of our institution.

Faculty are also members of peer review boards of journals which helps them to inculcate global competencies in their research skills and teaching practices.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency

- The academic calendar at the beginning of the term states clearly the available time frame for effective completion of curriculum.
- Departments prepare a plan of action for field visits, guest lectures and demonstrations to supplement curriculum provided by the University.
- The college has implemented 5 SMART (1 basic and 4 Advance) classrooms through a CSR initiative between our parent body Seva Mandal Education Society (SMES) and SAS Pvt. Ltd. The use of ICT enables effective implementation of curriculum.
- Remedial classes are conducted in English and Physiology. A bridge course in maths is conducted for students of BCA who do not have a mathematics background in 11th and 12th Std. A bridge course is also organized for M.Sc. students from a non-nutrition background
- Resource persons from the industry are invited to participate in curriculum delivery. As a policy, 5% of the curriculum of Computer Applications program is taught by experts from the Industry.
- Alumna are invited to share the latest trends in the industry according to their respective jobs and designations
- Faculty are granted duty leave to attend faculty development programs, workshops, training programs to upgrade skill and knowledge in keeping with the fast changing market place.
- Financial assistance is given to faculty for attending conferences and seminars to upgrade their knowledge base in their respective specializations.
- The library enhances collection of books, journals, e-data base in the library as per the need/request of the faculty and students.



1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

A. The Placement committee, Industrial Visit committee, Research committee, IQAC and Alumnae Association promote interaction with Industry and professional bodies. Faculty are members of professional bodies such as Association of Food Scientists and Technologists of India (AFSTI), Indian Dietetics Association (IDA) and Textiles Association of India and the college has benefited from collaborative projects through their interaction. SNDT Women's university does not have the provision of a twinning/dual degree and hence the college does not offer any programs to facilitate the same. However, the institution offers 3 UGC recognized career oriented programs (Event Management, Beauty Culture and Hair Dressing and Physical Fitness and Weight Management) which enables the student to gain a certificate, diploma or advanced diploma simultaneous to their degree.

1.2.3 Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability

Range of Core /Elective options opted by the college

Students have the choice of opting for any of the following specializations in Semester III of the B.Sc. degree program in Home Science (i.e. Second year) - Human Development/Food Science and Nutrition/Resource Management/ Textile Science and Apparel design. They may opt for the specialization of Nutrition and Dietetics in the first year of the program.

While English is compulsory subject under foundation courses, students may take either a higher level or lower level paper as per their language fluency skills

Vertical mobility across programs and courses

- At entry point, students from Home Science, Science, Arts and Commerce backgrounds are eligible for admission to the Home Science Program.
- Undergraduate students in Food Science and Nutrition can aspire for the following programs on campus - PG Diploma in Sports Science Fitness and Nutrition/ M.Sc. in Clinical Nutrition (SNDT) or M.Sc. in Dietetics and Food Service Management (IGNOU)
- Undergraduate students of all specializations can apply for the PG Diploma in Early Childhood Education
- BCA students opt for MCA (under IGNOU)

In addition, there are a number of vocation oriented certificates and diploma courses offered on campus by the SCNI Polytechnic of our Parent body. These include:

- Applied Art
- Travel and Tourism
- Interior Design and Decoration
- Fashion Designing and Merchandising

The college also offers a 2 years full time diploma (Govt. Recognized) course in Beauty Culture and Hair dressing through Maharashtra State Board of Technical Education (MSBTE). The eligibility is S.S.C. We also offer a full time institute course (autonomous) for 1 year as well as advanced courses in Beauty Culture for 6 months each.

Choice Based Credit System and the range of subject options:

The M.Sc. CND program offers a choice based credit system. The SNDT Women's University is in the process of finalizing the choice based credit system for undergraduate courses. It will be introduced once the University directs its affiliated colleges to implement the same.

Courses offered in modular form:

As per university norms, all the undergraduate programs are designed in modular format after the syllabus revision process in 2012, by the SNDT Women's University.

Credit transfer and accumulation facility:

Under the norms of SNDT Women's university, there is provision for credit transfer or accumulation.

Enrichment courses

The College has incorporated the following courses into the regular timetable: Personality development, Life skills through Gandhian Values, Soft Skills and German. Yoga classes have been incorporated into the timetable for FY B.Sc. students.

Potential for employability

Both the programs offered (Home Science as well as Computer applications) are vocational courses, and therefore all of the specializations offer tremendous

potential for employability. In addition, value added courses such as soft skills and fundamentals of computer enhance the employability quotient of the students.

Flexibility to pursue the program with reference to the timeframe:

As per the university norms, the students can avail a break of four years once during the program, to get readmission in the second or third year. This is particularly beneficial to women students who had to take a break due to personal reasons such as marriage or having a child. The college has readmitted such students and mentored them so as to enhance their performance.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programs? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programs, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

The institution offers five self-financed programs affiliated to SNDT Women's University. The institution follows the norms set by the SNDTWU, UGC and Government of Maharashtra for admission criteria, fee structure, and appointment of teachers. The salary of the teachers is paid by the Seva Mandal Education Society. The curriculum is prescribed by the University. Qualification and recruitment of teachers is as per the university norm and list of staff members is submitted to the University for approval. Each program has a coordinator who looks into the administration of the program.

The courses we offer under the SNDT Women's University do not combine conventional face to face and distance education mode. However, we offer two programs through IGNOU wherein students have the flexibility of combining face to face contact sessions conducted by the institution, with the distance mode of education. These are MCA (Masters in Computer Application) and M.Sc. in Dietetics and Food Service Management.

- 1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programs and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?
- Remedial classes for weak students
- Book bank facilities

- Final year students are encouraged to attend State level and National level seminars organized by the college
- Well stocked library with on-line data bases, e-resources and facilities for e-browsing
- Creating social consciousness by wide range of community outreach programs
- Environment sensitization through a series of activities, visits and workshops
- Facility of freeships for needy students, and students from SC/ST/OBC backgrounds
- Industrial visits to facilitate better understanding of aspects of curriculum
- Internship placements with NGOs, hospitals and industry
- Mentoring program
- Encouraging meritorious students by felicitations on Independence day and Republic day
- Co-curricular activities such as biennial college exhibition, workshops, demonstrations and field visits
- Building physical endurance through yoga and self-defense through karate sessions
- 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?
- Enhanced infrastructure so as to facilitate skill based training such as restaurant set- up and housekeeping labs, upgrading equipment in the textile labs and acquiring the latest software and hardware in the computer labs
- The Dept. of Resource Management offers a skills training opportunity

under the Government of India scheme 'Hunar se Rozgar.' Third year students are sent to hotels for 6/8 weeks in housekeeping and services/production departments. Similarly second year students attend a one week workshop at Garware Institute of Career Development, Mumbai University. This workshop gives students hands on experience of using Galileo software which facilitates online visa applications for different countries. Introduction of unique course 'Kshrujan' specially formulated to promote entrepreneurial skills, analytical skills, marketing skills and decision making.

- Introduction of unique certificate course on 'Research as Pedagogy, Advocacy and Transformation' in collaboration with PUKAR to promote out of the- box thinking and orientation to tools in research.
- Upgrading value added course in computer education literacy to meet the
 requirements of potential employers. Modules on AutoCAD, Corel draw,
 use of excel sheets for survey results and data analysis and Photoshop for
 helping to design work sheets have been introduced.
- Periodical review of soft skills program and introduction of components such as group discussions, interview skills, mock interviews, resume writing, etiquette and cross cultural communication.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in research competitions so that they are aware of the latest developments of the market place
- Subject experts from Industry and Professional bodies are invited to interact with the students.
- College coordinates internship in established companies, hospitals and NGO's so that students can learn the latest developments in their respective specializations
- 1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

Gender issues:

• The college has received recognition for our 'Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan' program on gender sensitization from the Government of Maharashtra. In 2012-2013, we were awarded 2nd prize at District Level and 1st prize at University Level. In 2013-2014, the institution went a step further by winning 2nd Prize at State Level, in addition to 1st prize at District Level and 1st Prize at University Level. Although Government of Maharashtra has discontinued the 'Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan' scheme, we are continuing with our gender sensitization program. As part of the program, a series of activities are conducted for all students on campus on the following topics: strategies for empowerment of women, issues related to health and hygiene, sexual harassment and domestic abuse, assertiveness and personality development, socio-legal issues related to women and self-defense strategies. In this regard, the college has also conducted collaborative activities with the NGO Stree Mukti Sanghatana.

 The college has started a cyber-security cell on campus. Sessions on cyber security have been organized to create awareness on precautionary measures ,through the cybercrime cell of Mumbai from 2014 to 2016. A lecture on



- "Making cyber space safe for girls" by Mr. Javed Ahmed, Police Commissioner of Mumbai was organized on 21st February 2016.
- Guest lectures on legal rights of women, media and women, and the screening of films on gender related issues have been organized under the Foundation course on 'Women's Studies'.
- The college has been focusing on the theme of 'Women and Health' as an ongoing project, and has organized a series of activities on health issues related to women such as Smt. Dakshaben Pathak memorial lecture series on issues such as cancer, detection camps for anemia and thalassemia.
- Department of Food Science and Nutrition conducts campus outreach programs during nutrition week and breastfeeding week.
- In March 2015, the college received D.L. Shah Quality Award (Silver) from the Quality Council of India for the project on 'Transformation of Girl Students into empowered citizens' undertaken by the faculty of the Dept. of Computer Applications.
- Faculty have worked on issues related to gender and also published papers on the same

Climate change and Environmental Education:

- There is a continued and sustained emphasis on creating sensitization to environment issues. A Green Audit was conducted by STEP Techno Solutions on 1st February, 2016. A plan of action was subsequently drawn up which compasses the areas of waste segregation, energy conservation, recycling of resources and water conservation.
- In December 2015, the college exhibition was exclusively focused on 'Environment for a better tomorrow'. Another important best practice is the screening of a short video on environmental issues before every orientation, PTA and other college events. Also, guests are welcomed with a tulsi plant or bamboo plant rather than floral bouquets.
- As part of waste management initiative, a project of waste segregation and composting in the food science labs has been initiated. Dept. of Computer Application conducts an annual drive to collect e-waste, in collaboration with Evergreen Recyclekaro (I) Pvt. Ltd. First year B.Sc. and BCA students are involved in collection of waste paper for a cause. The proceedings were given to the Helping Hand Foundation. There is an ongoing effort to reuse and recycle paper by placing boxes with one-side paper in office/staff room/library/classrooms. Slogans on saving water and electricity have been placed in classrooms and in washrooms.
- The NSS unit participates in tree plantation drives. Students are actively involved in Swachh Bharat Abhiyan activities. Students have won prizes at intercollegiate level for their presentations on environmental issues (March 2014) and bio-diversity in Mumbai city (March 2014).
- As part of the UGC prescribed course on 'Environmental studies', the following activities are conducted on an ongoing basis: lectures on topic such as waste management, biodiversity and carbon foot printing and film screenings on global warming, climate change and food security. We have a designated bulletin board on the 6th floor to display latest issues related to the environment. Student groups have visited Mahim Nature Park, Mangrove park at Vikroli and Bombay Port Trust garden at Colaba to observe water harvesting techniques, and Sewri dockyard to observe



flamingos. They have written reports and shared their observations with their peer groups via Facebook, college magazine and bulletin board displays. Student conduct peer group education campaigns on issues such as health and hygiene, water and energy conservation. FYBCA students have conducted a survey on 'Carbon foot printing and bio-diversity mapping' and presented the same

ICT:

- It is the institution's policy that all our women students should be computer literate. Therefore all students of the B.Sc. program undergo 100 hours of compulsory computer training. Wi-Fi facility is available on campus. The college has 5 well equipped software computer labs with 138 computers and one hardware lab with 18 computers. 4 advance and 1 basic classrooms are equipped with SMART Boards and overhead projectors. All departments have been provided with laptops and mobile LCD projectors.
- Faculty have been trained on the effective use of ICT in teaching-learning. Faculty have initiated Facebook and Whatsapp groups to facilitate communicate with students on subject- related topics. Inflibnet facilities and online databases are also available. Important web tools such as poster4.teachers.org, learn boost, slide share, animoto and engrade are used to facilitate teaching learning processes.

Human Rights

A range of issues related to human rights have been covered by guest lectures, film screenings and workshops to sensitize students to issues such as child labour, right to vote, right to education and dalit rights. These include among others:

- Workshop on 'Right to Education Act' by Ms. Sushila Shastri from Save the Children India in collaboration with District Legal Services Cell on 7th Sept. 2012
- Guest Lecture on 'Human Rights and Dalit poetry'by Mr. Sachin Bhumbe. Associate Lecturer, PN Doshi College, Ghatkopar on 19th July 2013
- Lecture on 'Development Indices' by Dr. Falguni Desai, Associate Professor, Smt. Maniben Nanavati College, Vile Parle on 14th Sept. 2013
- Newspaper articles are displayed by the library on December 10th which is World Human Rights day
- Important days such as Constitution Day (26th November), and the birth anniversaries of Dr. Baba Saheb Ambedkar, and Sardar Vallabhai Patel are marked by bulletin displays
- The Gandhian Studies centre invited a team of 8 tribal performers from CG Net Swara to perform a street play that highlighted the civic issues in tribal belts in the central Gondwana district on 1st Sept. 2015.
- The college hosted a film festival in collaboration with MAVA (Men Against Violence and Abuse) on 25th and 26th November 2016 on themes including homophobia and transphobia.

The Gandhian Studies Centre was established in 2013 through a grant of 10.5 lakhs from the UGC. The main motive of Gandhian Studies Centre is to create an understanding and appreciation of Gandhian philosophy among the youth of today. The main theme of the centre for 2015-2016 was



"Understanding diversity, respecting pluralism" and a wide range of activities were organized to promote a healthy respect for each other's religions and right to belief and expression.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

Faculty are members of the Board of Studies and curriculum revision committees. Based on the feedback from students, alumina, and parents, they play an important role in the decision making processes of these bodies and help to bring about changes in the curriculum as per the need of the hour and the demand of the market place. Examples are as follows as per the specializations:

Human Development: there was a major revamp in the subjects. In IV semester new subjects introduced were working with Parents, Ageing & Adulthood. In III semester, practical component was added to family dynamics. Internship was changed from 4 credits to 8 credits. In extension education, media skills development (Th & Pr) was introduced instead of extension for development.

Nutrition & Dietetics: Curriculum changes have been made for the following subjects: institutional food service management which is now included as catering management. In medical nutrition therapy credits for practical classes have been increased to 8 classes per week to give students more hands -on training

Resource Management: Business communication and basics of food production have been introduced in the IV Semester.

Textile Science & Apparel Design: Fabric ornamentation & accessory design, and Soft Skills Development have been introduced.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programs?

The quality of enrichment programs is monitored by coordinators through the feedback taken from students and alumina. Final year students also give feedback on the enrichment programs in the exit forms that they submit.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Many senior faculty members are on the Boards of Studies, Faculty and Academic Council of the University and have contributed actively towards the process of syllabi restructuring. In addition, faculty have been special nominees

- Informal feedback from parents during interaction during PTA meetings and when parents are called by class teachers to discuss wards'performance

Industry:

- Industry offers feedback after students complete their internship
- Verbal feedback from experts when they are invited for guest lectures, and to conduct workshops.

The feedback from stakeholders is collated and reviewed in the IQAC meetings. Relevant feedback is conveyed to the University during BOS meetings and other meetings related to curriculum planning.

1.4.3 How many new programs/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programs? Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

The following new programs were introduced after feedback was given by the NAAC Peer team to introduce relevant and job oriented courses. The programs were also introduced due to the demand from the student community.

Degree programs-

- M.Sc. in Dietetics and Food Service Management (IGNOU 2015)

The rationale for introducing new courses by establishing a linkage with IGNOU is also linked to the refusal on the part of the University to give



permission to affiliated colleges to introduce postgraduate progress, and also the demand for such programs from our stakeholders.

CRITERION II TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

We are an exclusive women's college, and our policy is to admit women students to our undergraduate programs as long as our seats are vacant. Transparency is maintained by considering the minimum expected marks at the last qualifying exam as per the eligibility criteria of SNDT Women's University (SNDTWU). An admission committee oversees the process of admission and ensures that the norms prescribed by the SNDTWU and Government of Maharashtra are adhered to. A help desk is set up by the admission committee soon after the declaration of the 12th Standard results. Computer terminals are set up and student volunteers assist with the online application process of SNDTWU. The admission form is available on the university portal and students can submit the form online. Information on availability of seats is available through the portal.

The institution ensures wide publicity to the admission process as follows:

- Details of the salient features of the college, the courses offered, the admission procedure, fees and refund rules, free ships and scholarships are published in the college prospectus. This information is also available on the college website (<u>www.bmncollege.com</u>).
- Flex boards are placed strategically at the entrance of the college indicating courses offered and eligibility criteria, unique features and placement possibilities.
- Faculty members conduct orientations in junior colleges in the vicinity as well as in career counseling career fairs organized by NGOs such as Rotary Club, Lions Club and Kutchhi Visha Oswal Seva Samaj (KVO).
- The college holds a biennial academic exhibition "Kaleidoscope', wherein work done by students from different specializations is displayed. The exhibition is publicized through the website and distribution of posters to colleges in the vicinity.
- Students of our M.Sc. program mentor undergraduate students who wish to appear for the Central Entrance Test (CET) of SNDTWU for admission to the M.Sc. program in Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics offered on campus.
- We share a close bonding with our alumnae, and our best publicists are our former students who disseminate information on our courses by word of mouth. We have had the daughters, as well as siblings, of our alumnae studying in our institution.



2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programs of the Institution.

Our institution is an exclusively women's college and our objective is to empowerment of women through access to qualitative education. It is our institutional policy not to turn away women applicants until our sanctioned strength is filled. There is a minimum cut off percentage for admission at entry level to B.Sc. Home Science program as we believe that the performance of women students at higher secondary school level/last qualifying exam could have been affected by several socio-cultural and economic factors. Therefore admission at first year level for the undergraduate degree program, is on a first-come basis. Students are admitted as per the minimum criteria determined by the SNDTWU and admission procedures are done in accordance with the guidelines of the University. We give priority to our in-house students from our Junior College (Smt. HMN Junior College of Home Science).

Students can choose one of the following specializations or 'majors' at the beginning of the second year of the B.Sc. program i.e. in the 3rd Semester. These are **Food Science and Nutrition, Textile Science and Apparel Design, Human Development and Resource Management (aided programs).** In order to facilitate the process of 'major selection' or selection of specialization at the end of the 2nd semester, an in-house software program has been developed by the Department of Computer Applications. Allotment of specializations is made on the basis of the marks of both 1st and 2nd semester exams as well as the students' preference list.

The specialization of **B.Sc. program in Nutrition and Dietetics (unaided)** is offered at the 1st semester itself. Students should have studied science subjects with Physics, Biology or Chemistry at Class XII level. Students can apply for the program after seeking admission in the general Home Science program. Merit lists are generated and displayed as per the allotted number of seats.

The minimum percentage for admission to the **Bachelor in Computer Application Program** (BCA) is 45% (and 40% for candidates belonging to reserved category from within the State). Direct admission for Second year BCA is also offered to students with a 3 year full time Diploma in Engineering from the Technical Education Board with an aggregate of not less than 60%.

Admission procedure for **M.Sc. Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics** is through a centralized process by the SNDT Women's University by means of a Common Entrance test and personal interview with a minimum marks of 50% at undergraduate level. From 2015-2016, admission procedure for **Postgraduate Diploma in Sports Science Fitness and Nutrition (PGSSFN)** is also through the CET and personal interviews. The minimum requirement for Postgraduate Diploma in Early Childhood Education is 45 % from Home Science stream and 50% from other streams.

There are three UGC recognized Career oriented programs (COP) namely **Physical Fitness and Weight Management, Event management and Beauty**



culture. The courses are allotted at FY B.Sc. level according to the student's preference, availability of seats and subjects studied at Junior college level.

The college also offers a 2 year full time Govt. recognized diploma in **Beauty Culture and Hair Dressing** through Maharashtra State Board of Technical Education (MSBTE). The eligibility is S.S.C. We also offer a full time institute certificate course for 1 year as well as short term advanced courses in Beauty Culture for 6 months each.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes'what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The admission committees of the B.Sc. and B.C.A sections monitor the admission process. The Principal conducts a meeting with the committee as soon as soon as the 12th standard results are announced. Admission forms are closely scrutinized by committee as per the eligibility criteria of SNDTWU. Although we are a linguistic minority institution, the committee ensures that the government and university norms for students of reserved category are followed. There is a relaxation in fees charged as well as in the minimum percentage for eligibility (for e.g. 40% for students applying for BCA course instead of 45%).

A few outcomes as a result of the admission review process are as follows:

- It was observed that many of the students required guidance for filling of online application forms which has been made mandatory under the MKCL (Maharashtra Knowledge Commission Limited) from 2014 onwards. Student volunteer-groups have been formed to assist parents and their wards at the time of the admission process.
- Students and parents were uncertain about vocation possibilities offered by the Home Science program due to misconceptions regarding the Home Science Program. Hence, teachers at the admission desk offer counseling on career options of the B.Sc program.
- In order to do the required follow up on enquiries about the course, the phone numbers and email ids of parents/students are noted.
- Information on freeships is offered at the admission counter, especially to SC/ST students who are informed about Government welfare schemes.
 Needy students are informed about freeship schemes offered by our Parent body SMES.
- In order to promote transparency, eligibility and refund rules are displayed prominently at the time of the admission. They are also uploaded on our website and through distribution of information pamphlets.

- Our institution is an exclusively women's college and the institution puts in
 all efforts to ensure access to education to women students who come from
 social backgrounds that have not traditionally encouraged them to pursue
 higher education. In particular, first generation learners are motivated to join
 the course. Married women who have chosen to continue their education
 after a gap are motivated to pursue their studies through counseling by the
 admission committee.



- The admission committee counsels students from SC, ST, and other backward classes about the admission processes and fee structures. Students from SC/ST and other backward classes as well as economically disadvantaged backgrounds are informed of financial support available from the Student Welfare Fund of the Seva Mandal Education Society, as well as Government schemes. There is a committee specially formulated to identify students who require financial assistance. The administrative office makes concerted efforts to secure Government scholarships for students from SC/ST and OBC background. The college also has the provision for fees to be paid in installments.
- Faculty take extra efforts to counsel students who are **slow learners/ differently abled learners/dyslexic students**. They guide them with sensitivity and mentor them so that they opt for the right specialization after the first year of the B.Sc. program. Students who have completed their school education through the National Institute of Open Schooling are given counseling on the nature of the courses. They are encouraged to pursue formal education by joining the college.
- Special efforts are also taken to facilitate the learning experience of students from non-English medium backgrounds. Remedial English classes are conducted thrice a week at First Year B.Sc. level and once a week for BCA students.
- The institute is witnessing a steady increase in students from the minority community. Efforts are made to integrate such students who are mainly first generation college goers into the college environment, and to ensure that they complete their graduation.

Observation and action initiated as a result of the trends:

- There has been an increase in the number of students with a higher percentage applying for admission to our institution over the last four years. This is indicative that the efforts of the institution to provide qualitative education is being recognized.
- It was observed that there was a greater demand for the specialization of Nutrition among students who joined the B.Sc. Home Science program. The college therefore introduced an additional specialization of B.Sc. in Nutrition and Dietetics in 2009 and has worked towards strengthening this course over the last five years in the post accreditation period (2nd cycle).
- In 2009-2010, the Dept. of Resource Management changed its specialization from Interior Design to Hospitality Management. The department reviewed this decision and felt that it was a positive move and therefore continued with the specialization. There has been an increase in students who are opting for this major in the III semester over the last five years.
- As there was a demand for BCA program, the college started a second division for the BCA program in 2008. Given the successful running of the course in the last six years, we fulfilled the requirements and received permanent affiliation from the university in June 2016.
- A MCA program under IGNOU was also introduced in 2012 to provide upward mobility for the BCA students. The study center is running very successfully.
- There is a high demand for the M.Sc. Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics program. In keeping with the demand from working professionals, the college registered as an IGNOU study center for the M.Sc. in Dietetics and Food Service Management from 2015.
- On the other hand, the demand for the Postgraduate diploma in Early Childhood Education program has decreased due to the mushrooming of several private courses in this stream.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this



regard?

Dyslexic students and those with learning disabilities submit certificates to the class teacher who shares this information with other subject teachers and the college counselor. The institution has admitted on an average 2-3 students from NIOS (National Institute of Open Schooling) per year, and takes care in mentoring their performance. Other slow learners are identified with the help of class teachers at first year level. Parents are also invited for discussion of their wards'performance. The institution has a mentoring program and mentor of the concerned student is involved in discussion. Students with learning problems are given extra time during examination as per SNDT Women's University guidelines. Instructions are explained at an individual level whenever required. For example, Ms. Ratanmala Hatlenkar is a student of BCA and instructions are given to her on a one-to-one basis for subjects such as software programing.

We cite some examples below to illustrate how the college is sensitive to the needs of differently abled students:

Ms. Maya Sonkar, BCA (2013-2016) was a polio affected student. She was given special permission to use the staff lift. Ramp facilities are available at the main entrance as well as the entrance to the K.G. Shah Vidya Bhavan to facilitate wheelchair accessibility to the lifts. A special washroom for differently abled students is available on the ground floor

Ms. Rabab Chobawalla FY B.Sc. (2016-17) has a congenital condition called Nystagmus in both her eyes. This prevents fixation like a normal eye. Faculty ensure that she is seated in front of the class. She has been given enlarged reading material for subjects such as the text book for English communication skills. Care is taken to assist her with applied science practical sessions. The library has provision of a kindle which enables her to enlarge e-book content. Ms. Puja Shirke T.Y ND (2016-17) has 20% functioning of the heart. She has been given permission to use the staff lift and concession from attending

Ms. Rachita Shetty SY ND (2016-17) suffers from seizures and has been given extra time to write the examinations, as well as concession from attending strenuous sessions.

strenuous sessions such as Yoga and self-defense sessions.

Ms. Amna Malick (M.Sc. CND) 2016-2017) suffers from tremors in her hand and is given extra time for tests.

We are happy to share that dyslexic students are doing well after having graduated from our institution. They include the following:

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students'needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

- The academic term begins in the June. We follow a process of continuous internal evaluation and teachers are able to assess the level of students, on an average, by mid-July. Subject teachers assess the students' needs and skill levels through written tests and various participatory activities such as project work, presentations and group discussions. Teachers have one to one interaction with students during the practical sessions with groups of about 25 students, and this enables them to cater to, as well as assess, the needs of both slow learners and advanced learners.
- Students who have studied in non-English medium at school level are
 assessed within the first week of the academic year and are given the
 option of a 'Lower Level English paper' as prescribed by the University.
 They also attend remedial classes in English thrice a week for two
 semesters, which are structured according to the needs of the students.
 Similarly students weak in science attend physiology remedial classes.
- The Dept. of Computer Applications identifies students who are weak in Math through a diagnostic test through Socrates software. Students who did not opt for Maths in 12th Std. attend a bridge course at first year level. Lectures are conducted four times a week for 2 semesters. Third year FSN Students are given extra inputs in biochemistry.
- Students are given an orientation for selection of their specialization at the end of the first year. Faculty identify their aptitude and mentor them on choice of specialization according to their ability. The college has a program of mentoring wherein students are put into batches under the guidance of teacher mentors The mentors play an important role in encouraging students to improve their academic performance.

Each department also conducts seminars, demonstrations, guest lectures to enhance knowledge of students on a regular basis. Details are given under the Department Evaluative reports.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Gender Sensitization:

Activities on gender sensitization are organized by a committee which has been specially formulated under the Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan' program. There include sessions on legal issues related to women, domestic abuse and sexual harassment. Sessions are also conducted on personality development, self-esteem, health issues and self-defense.

The college has received recognition for our concerted efforts for this unique gender sensitization program from the Government of Maharashtra for two consecutive years. In 2012-2013, we received 2nd prize at District Level and 1st prize at University Level. In 2013-2014, we received 2nd Prize at State Level, 1st prize at District Level and 1st Prize at University Level. Although the Government of Maharashtra has discontinued the Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan scheme, we have continued with our structured efforts in recognition of our crucial role in empowering women students.

Faculty of the Dept. of Computer Applications presented the endeavors of the institution towards the holistic development of women students at the D.L. Shah Quality Awards competition of the Quality Council of India, New Delhi in August 2016. The college received the Silver award for their project on 'Transformation of Girl Students into empowered citizens.'

Departments also organize gender related events as per their specializations. For example, the Dept. of Food Science and Nutrition has a special focus on 'Women and Health' through events organized during Nutrition week and breast feeding week, sponsored by Marico Industries. The Dept. of Human Development conducts gender sensitization programs at the Women's Rural Development center at Talasari. The Dept. also organizes an intercollegiate premarital counseling workshop on an annual basis wherein eminent doctors, and family counselors are invited to interact with students. Students are guided on making small documentaries on issues related to gender under the media skills paper. Guest lectures on legal aspects, women and health and women and media have also been organized under the Foundation course on 'Women's Studies' offered at TY B.Sc. level and F.Y BCA level.

A two day film festival was organized in collaboration with the NGO MAVA (Men against Violence and Abuse) on 25th and 26th November, 2016 on the occasion of '16 Days of Activism 'observed internationally against Gender-Based Violence. The 2 day fest had screenings of select national and international, short films, documentaries and feature films on the theme of Gender, Sexuality, Masculinity and Relationships.

2 male Non-teaching staff members were deputed to attend a workshop on 'Gender Sensitivity 'at Maniben Nanavati College at Vile Parle on 24th July, 2013. The IQAC organized a workshop ('Yaun Shoshan ki Prati Jagrukta') on 12th September 2016 by the NGO 'Rubaroo'in order to educate our male staff members on issues related to sexual harassment.

Faculty members have worked in the area of gender studies and published papers.

Details of programs organized from 2011 to 2016 are given in Annexure No.7

Environment Sensitization:

The environment sensitization committee organizes activities on salient environmental issues. An orientation on the concept of "Green Audit" by Fr. Alwyn D'Silva was held on 16th September, 2014 for all staff members. Further to this, an institutional Green Audit was conducted by STEP Techno Solutions on 1st February, 2016. An action report has been formulated to implement suggestions given under the audit. The main focus is on sensitization of stakeholders on issues of water and electricity conservation, reduction of carbon credits, waste segregation, sanitation and hygiene.

Several activities are undertaken in order to implement the philosophy of reduce, re-use and recycle. Students and staff implement the practice of digitization of photos, notices and invitations. Cartons have been placed in the staff room, common room and class rooms for the purpose of recycling of one sided paper. Students of the computer department submit their projects online. The 'Srishtee E-waste collection drive' is undertaken by the Dept. of Computer Applications every year in collaboration with Evergreen Recyclekaro (I) Pvt. Ltd. Similarly a collection drive for waste material is organized every year and proceedings donated to NGO Helping Hands Foundation through Raddi Connect.

A workshop was conducted by Dr. Jyoti Palekar on August 4th 2016, for the Food Science and Nutrition Department to introduce composting of wet waste in the food lab. There was a follow up session on 13th August 2016 to guide students as to whether the composting process was being done properly. A similar workshop was organized for Canteen staff on 7th December, 2016.

A small garden is maintained by NSS students, who also participate in Van Mahotsav programs of the University. For all functions, guests are felicitated with either a bamboo plant or a tulsi plant. Paper gift bags are used in lieu of plastic bags.

A Green Brigade of student members has also been formed for peer group sensitization drives. As part of its activities, the group hosts an active face book page 'Green Spirit Association' https://www.facebook.com/search/top/?q=green%20spirit%20association. Students have made power point presentations on 'dos and don'ts on campus' which are shown during student based activities. Short clippings on environmental issues made by Maharashtra Tourism Development Corporation (MTDC) are also screened during college level programs. Students have conducted a health and hygiene campaign of placing slogans and posters in washrooms and providing newspapers sheets for hygienic disposal of sanitary napkins. Under 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan', the NSS unit conducts cleanliness drives.

The students'council has the healthy practice of incorporating the theme of environmental awareness into co-curricular events. For example, the college biennial exhibition Kaleidoscope was on the theme "Environment for a better tomorrow" (December 2015); the theme of Akanksha Intercollegiate Festival (August 2016) was "Green paradise" and the theme of the technical festival Tekzone was "Green ITians Carnival" (January 2015). Students of Human Development Department along with NSS Volunteers received the 2nd prize for a Republic day float display on 'Green Power: need of the hour'organized by SNDT Women's University on 26th January 2016. BCA students have participated in a project on mapping of biodiversity conducted by Ladybird Environmental Consulting. The project received 3rd prize at intercollegiate undergraduate research competition in March 2016.

Visits are organized to create awareness about green initiatives on important issues. For example F.Y B.Sc. students visited Bandra on 11th Jan 2015 to understand the highly successful concept of 'Citizens reclaim open spaces'. Students also visit the Flamingo Festival at Sewri organized by the Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS) every March as well as the annual Kala Ghoda festival to view the installations on Best-out-of Waste. Visits are also organized to the Maharashtra Nature Park and Bombay Port Trust Garden.

Apart from the Environment Studies Foundation Course at first year level, each department takes up a special initiative to promote environmental consciousness. Students of Textile Science and Apparel Design make bags out of left over fabric. They have also participated in fashion shows using recycled fabrics, paper bead jewelry and other accessories using recycled material. Food Science and Nutrition students demonstrate nutritious recipes made out of fruit and vegetable peels. Students of Resource Management take up projects on solid waste management and eco-tourism. They make innovative gift articles from waste products such as clutch purses from polythene bags, purses from cartons, glasses, bowls and candle stands from coconut shells.

Detailed list of lectures/workshop sessions conducted to create awareness of environment related issues is available in Annexure No. 9

Social Inclusion

The college believes in respecting diversity and follows a policy of social inclusion on campus. The college also believes promoting a culture of secularism wherein all religions are treated with equal respect. The UGC recognized Gandhian Studies Centre takes up a theme every year to promote pluralism on campus. In 2015-2016, the theme was "Understanding difference: respecting diversity." The center organized the Shri Dattatraya Ramchandra

Parulekar Inter-collegiate annual Painting Competition in 2015, keeping this theme as its central focus. A series of visits to different places of worship such as Shri. Dashmesh Darbar Gurudwara at GTB Nagar, Sion, synagogue at Kala Ghoda, Dargah at Antop Hill and church at Dockyard. Lectures were also arranged on Zoroastrianism, Judaism, and the relevance of the 'Gita in everyday life'.

The centre invited a team of 8 tribal performers from central Gondwana district to perform a street play that highlighted the civic issues in tribal belts.

Faculty and students of the TSAD conducted a 3 day collaborative workshop on "Skill based training for embroidery and Fabric painting" for under privileged ladies and girls in collaboration with Dept. of Fiber and Textile Processing Technology, Institute of Chemical Technology Mumbai from 21st to 23rd September, 2016.

The Human Development Dept. conducts a Certificate course in crèche and balwadi teachers training in collaboration with Stree Mukti Sanghatna, for women from lower income groups. The department also conducts field visits to organizations dealing with the differently abled children and disadvantaged children. Students are also taken on guided visits to schools for tribal children in rural areas, and centres for street children.

Additional initiatives are as follows:

- Workshop on 'Right to Education Act'by Ms. Sushila Shastri from 'Save the Children India'in collaboration with District Legal Services Cell on 7th Sept. 2012
- Guest Lecture on 'Human Rights and Dalit poetry'by Mr. Sachin Bhumbe.
 Associate Lecturer, PN Doshi College, Ghatkhopar on 19.07.2013
- Lecture on 'Development Indices' to understand the plight of the economically oppressed by Dr. Falguni Desai, Associate Professor, Smt. Maniben Nanavati College, Vile Parle on 14.09.2013
- Newspaper articles are displayed by the library on 10th December which is World Human rights day
- The birth anniversary of Dr. Baba Saheb Ambedkar, and Constitution Day (26th November) is marked by bulletin displays and essay competition on his life and contribution towards social upliftment of the marginalized.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The faculty identifies the learning needs of advanced learners through their performance in unit tests, project work and interaction during the teaching-learning processes, questioning ability, quality of assignments submitted and motivation levels. The following activities and strategies are planned to respond to the needs of advanced learners:

Advanced learners are assigned projects with higher levels of difficulty, as
well as seminar topics that require an element of research such as using
surveys and case studies. They are encouraged to search for information
using online databases and Google scholar. They are involved in peer
teaching of classmates and are made group leaders for group projects



- Select students have been guided and motivated to register for MOOC courses. For example, Ms. Abha Sardesai and Ms. Zainab Panvelwala (TY FSN 2015-2016) have completed courses in Nutrition and Wellbeing from University of Aberdeen from 18th Jan., 2016- 14th Feb., 2016 and a course in 'the science of nutrition' from Open University from 11th Jan., to 7th Feb., 2016. Ms. Manali Shirkane completed a self-paced course in 'Nutrition and health-Macronutrients and over nutrition' from University of Wageningen. Ms. Ameena Panvelwalla completed a course in English composition from University of California, Berkeley (2015). Ms. Ameena Panvelwala and Ms. Aditi Rege have registered for an English writing skills course from Arizona State University (2016-2017). Ms. Aditi Deshpande (TYFSN) completed MOOC on "Principles of Biochemistry" from Harvard University in June 2016. Ongoing: "Micronutrients and Health and over nutrition: Part 1" Wageningen University, Netherlands. "Nutrition and Wellness". University of Aberdeen, Scotland. Ms Aditi Deshpande for TY FSN has completed an online course on "Principles of Biochemistry" from Harvard Univ. in June 2016. She is also registered for a course on basic micronutrients from Wageningen Univ. Netherlands, and on 'Nutrition and Wellness' from University of Aberdeen, Scotland.
- Advance learners of M.Sc. are encouraged to take up additional certificate courses. For example, Ms. Krystal Quadros has completed a certificate course "Essentials of Complementary Feeding" from Cornell University, 2016. Ms. Abha Sardesai has completed the NQ (Nutrition Quotient) Professional certificate course organized by Indian Medical Association, Centre for Community Medicine (AIIMS) and Indian Dietetics Association (IDA)
- Advance learners are motivated to present papers at seminars and workshops at national and international level. In all there have been 44 presentations by students. Annexure No. 10
- They are also mentored on publishing their papers at third year B.Sc. and M.Sc. levels. In all students have published 30 papers. Annexure No. 13
- Advance learners at TY level are placed for internship with firms/ organization that offer more challenging opportunities
- Dept. of Computer Applications conducts one lecture a week for advance learners in English to enhance their communication skills
- Motivational prizes such as the 'Best students of the year awards' are given to students who excel in academic and co-curricular activities. Cash prizes are given on Independence Day to students who have topped in certain subjects and also those who have appeared on the University merit list.
- Students of B.Sc. Food Science and Nutrition, B.Sc. in Nutrition and Dietetics and M.Sc. in Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics are encouraged to aspire for the 'NARAM'awards instituted by the Association of Food Scientists and Technologists of India (AFST (I)) for students who score highest marks in Food Science and Nutrition at University level.
- First five students on the merit list of every class are given scholars cards from the library entitling them to the issue of additional books.
- Names of merit holders and student achievers are published prominently in 'Akanksha', our college magazine.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme



duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The collation of data on academic performance of those students at the risk of drop out is done by the admission committee, college office, class teachers, mentors and counselor.

- The College admits students from **NIOS** (**National Institute of Open Schooling**) who are slow learners, and are therefore at the risk of dropping out. They are provided with extra attention and are given topics that are simpler. Extra time is given to complete the paper during practical and theory exams. If the teachers recognize the possibility of such students dropping out, they are referred to the college counselor. Teacher -mentors monitor their progress and ensure that they attend class regularly. They are encouraged to hone their creative talents by participating in extra-curricular activities.
- The college has also admitted students with learning disabilities such as dyslexia. The college counselor is actively involved in ensuring the integration of these students into the normal college activities. The examination committee ensures that all the students of dyslexia are given extra time for answering papers. They are also encouraged to participate in all co-curricular activities.
- Faculty assist **married women (and mothers)** cope with the schedule of activities and also allow some flexibility if a family crisis arises. The counselor helps them with stress management and time management strategies.
- Special efforts are also taken to facilitate the learning experience of students from non-English medium backgrounds and to integrate them into all activities within the classroom. The college offers a paper in 'Lower Level English to help them improve their language skills. Remedial English classes are conducted thrice a week at First Year B.Sc. and B.C.A levels. Faculty use bi-lingual instruction to help them understand complicated topics.
- Class teachers identify students with financial problems and guide them to apply for freeships from the Students'Welfare Fund. Faculty have also stepped in to provide financial assistance. Students are given the provision to pay in installments.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)
- The timetable and exam committee plans the academic calendar before the start of the academic year, keeping in mind the required norm of 180 working days in an academic year.
 - Heads of Departments and in-charges of all the committees are involved in the planning of the calendar which is posted on the website and printed in the college diary.

Faculty members prepare their individual tentative teaching plan at the beginning of each semester. The Head of Department monitors the required workload of the faculty.

- The exam committee displays the schedule of the exams and study leave dates on the students' notice boards. Examination dates are also given in the college diary. BCA dept. gives a semester planner to parents of first year students during the orientation program.
- The syllabus gives the learning objectives, detailed content, number of lectures allotted to the units and the evaluation patterns of prescribed subjects. Syllabi copy are available in the library. Evaluation patterns are explained during the orientation session for new students.
- The exam committee shares the evaluation blueprint which is clearly specified in the syllabi, as issued by the SNDTWU.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

Members of the IQAC are actively involved in the quality control of the teaching, learning & evaluation processes. External members include eminent academicians such as Dr. Ravikala Kamath (Former BCUD director, SNDTWU), Prof Harshaben Parekh (Former head of SHPT School of Library Science) Dr. Viajayanti Ranade (Former Vice-Principal, Khalsa College) and Prof. Madhav Welling (Pro-Vice Chancellor NMIMS). They have offered invaluable suggestions on the dissemination of quality initiatives.

The IQAC has initiated the following mechanisms to monitor and evaluate teaching-learning processes:

- Teaching plans are reviewed periodically by Head of Departments. The teaching plans address the learning objectives as defined by the syllabi.
- Departments submit an evaluative departmental report wherein teaching and learning processes are described in detail. The reports are interchanged and an inter-departmental audit is conducted and monitored by the IQAC. Feedback and suggestions for improvement are shared.
- IQAC oversees submission of annual performance indicator (API) files wherein teachers give details of their involvement in teaching learning process. API forms are reviewed by the IQAC in July every year and feedback shared with faculty.
- IQAC monitors analysis of data for KPI (Key performance Indicators) as required by the Government of Maharashtra.
- IQAC conducts confidential self- appraisal process of faculty. Feedback is given by the Reporting officer (HODS) and the Reviewing Officer (Principal). The Principal discusses the outcome with individual teachers.
- IQAC monitors student-teacher evaluation processes which are conducted for all teachers and all subjects twice in a year.
- Workshops have been organized on topics such as 'Classroom management' by Mrs. Margaret D'Costa on 28th October, 2015, and 'ICT techniques to enhance teaching-learning processes' by Dr. Geeta Thakur on 4th April, 2016.



Faculty are encouraged to take up quality assurance projects for the annual Best Quality Enhancement Technique (BEQET) competition of the National Centre for Quality Management. In doing so they learn to use structured quality improvement methodologies such as Root cause & Relentless root cause analysis techniques, such as Nominal Group Technique (NGT), Why-Verify-Why analysis and Differential Diagnosis Technique (K-T Method) (Please refer to 3.4.4)

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The policy of the institution is to provide ample opportunities to make learning student centric. Necessary structures and systems are in place to facilitate **interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning experiences.** Support is provided through provision of SMART enabled technology, Wi-Fi on campus, teaching aids, the latest in primary and secondary reference material, online databases, and an internet corner. Innovative methods are possible because of the average batch size of each specialization which is between 25 to 27 students, as well as the average batch size for tutorials and practical classes at FY level which is about 20 to 24 students.

Teachers incorporate **interactive and collaborative learning** using the following methods in the classroom: group discussions, presentations, debates, role-play dramatization, exhibitions, puppet shows, nutritional games, songs, poems and radio talk show. **Independent learning** among students is promoted through individual seminars, assignments, case studies, industrial visits, field visits, internship and research projects.

Different styles of learning are actively inculcated in students through a variety of subjects that are taught in an innovative manner, some examples of which are given below:

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators?

The institution nurtures critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper

through several innovative methods.

Creativity is enhanced through the involvement of students in activities such as:

- Planning and organization of the annual 'Bal Mela' of the Dept. of Human Development; 'Tekzone' the annual intercollegiate technical event of the Dept. of Computer Applications; and the annual Restaurant 'set up' of the Dept. of Resource Management.
- Subjects like Traditional Textiles and Embroideries of India and Apparel Design offer tremendous scope to enhance creativity of students. Students participate in fashion shows to showcase their ability to innovate.
- Students are taught how to make short films and participate in nutrition related demonstrations on and off campus such as at Navy Nagar, and Chota Sion Hospital.
- Students of Nutrition and Dietetics have appeared on a special telecast on "Aamhi Sare Khavaye" on Zee TV Marathi on 7th Jan. 2015. Students are trained to write scripts for street plays and participate in radio shows under the subject of Media skills development. For example, on 4th October 2016, 12 students presented the following topics on All India Radio: (1) Trends and Addictions of current Life styles (2) A discussion on Suburban Trains pertaining to problems and comfort of women, and (3) A story by Munshi Premchand in narration form. The broadcast of these two programs was on 15th November and 22nd November 2016 respectively under All India Radio's Yuvavani program. Students received a remuneration of `1300 each for the same.
- In order to develop their English communication skills, students work on their creative writing skills through film and book reviews. They also participate in essay, debate and elocution competitions. Under the soft skills paper, mock interviews and group discussions are organized wherein students engage in role play.
- Science subjects are a part of the Home Science curriculum and subjects like Bio-Chemistry, Textile Chemistry, Wet Processing, microbiology are integral to developing a scientific temper.
- Food Science and Nutrition students are encouraged to innovate in the subject of 'Food Product Development'. 70 students from MSc CND participated in an initiative organized by AFST(I) Mumbai Chapter & ICT titled 'Food Technology Innovation IPL'in November 2016. They submitted innovative ideas on different food related themes. 13 students received prizes and the college was awarded a trophy for maximum prizes received.
- Students are also encouraged to participate in intercollegiate research competitions, and learn how to critically review literature in their respective subjects. Third year B.Sc. and M.Sc. students have presented papers at national level seminars and also published under mentorship of their teachers. Annexure No. 13

All of these participatory and experiential activities equip them with the required skills to become independent thinkers, competent communicators and lifelong learners.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, elearning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education

through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Our parent body received a Corporate Social Responsibility grant for setting up of SMART classrooms on campus in 2015-2016. Dr. BMN College now has 4 classrooms equipped with advanced SMART technology and 1 classrooms with basic SMART technology facilities. There are two additional SMART classrooms on campus which are available for use by all departments upon request. In addition, all departments are provided with laptops and projectors (roaming units) and have access to Wi-Fi. Faculty direct students towards subject related resources on NPTEL and NME-ICT as well as open educational resources. Students have access to 4 computer labs with 25 terminals per lab, 5 internet terminals in the library as well as 8 terminals in the internet lab for self-paced learning and preparing projects and presentations.

The library subscribes to data bases such as N-LIST (INFLIBNET) and has institutional membership with American Library which allows access to a huge data base of journals and e-material. Faculty draw upon e-resources for preparation of teaching material. Specialization groups have been formed via social networking wherein hyperlinks, e-books, articles, slide share and you tube sites are shared.

Faculty are using M -communication to enable learning among students with SMART phones. Teachers from Computer Applications observed that while most of the students had android based cellphone with internet facility, they do not however have access to computers at home. They have therefore innovated by allowing students to use their cellphones for select subjects. Performance of students has shown a marked improvement as students are able to practice at home.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

Students:

- Students are exposed to advanced levels of knowledge through interaction
 with experts invited for guest lectures, workshops and seminars. Added
 inputs are given by our alumnae who are specialists in their respective areas.
 For example Ms. Ipsita Badani conducts training sessions on Basic Fashion
 Illustration and Coloring Techniques (2013-2014 TSAD Batch).
- T.Y B.Sc. and M.Sc. students are encouraged to attend national and international level seminars in their respective specializations and also join professional associations such as Indian Dietetics Association (IDA). For instance, they attended the 49th Annual conference of IDA hosted by Mumbai Chapter from 23rd to 25th September, 2016.
- SY RM students attend a one week workshop at Garware Institute of Career Development, Mumbai University for training in Galileo software required for the travel and tourism industry.
- Other venues for exposure to advanced levels of knowledge are internship in reputed companies, fieldwork in urban and rural centers, and industrial visits and study tours.



Faculty:

The Management and Principal encourage faculty to upgrade their subject knowledge. Faculty are deputed to attend UGC sponsored orientation and refresher courses, as well as short term training programs. They are also given duty leave to present papers at seminars as well as take up invitations as resource persons and keynote speakers. The seminar and workshop committee has organized 20 workshops in the last five years, and the college has hosted 3 National level seminars and 2 State level seminars. Subject specialization seminars have also been organized as follows:

- Seminar on "Nutritional advances in Bio molecules and Prebiotics" held on 7th September 2011 in collaboration with AFST(I) Mumbai chapter
- Seminar on "Impact of Nutrition on Diabetes & Cholesterol Management" organized in collaboration with Marico Industries on 1st September 2012.
- Seminar with Wool Research Association on 'Sports Tech'organized by Department of Textile Science and Apparel Design in collaboration with Wool Research Association/ Centre of Excellence for Sports Textiles of the Government of India, on 17th December, 2013
- Workshop on 'Enhancing Language Teaching through e-resources' organized by the English Department in collaboration with the American Library on 17th September 2014
- Seminar on "Opportunities in Sports and Technical Textiles" organized by Dept. of Textile Science and Apparel Design in collaboration with Wool Research Association/ Centre of Excellence for Sports Textiles of the Government of India on 31st August, 2015

Staff are members of Board of Studies of their respective faculties of SNDTWU as well as other universities and this gives them an insight into developments and advances in the curriculum for details please refer to 1.1.6. They also network with the industry through collaborative projects (for details please refer to 3.1.10) and professional bodies such as Association of Food Scientists and Technologists of India (AFSTI), Protein Foods and Nutrition Development Association of India (PFNDAI), Indian Dietetics Association, Textile Association and Wool Research Association. Faculty are on the editorial board and have been peer reviewers for the *Journal of Human Ecology, Science International Domain Journal, Journal of South Asian Diaspora, Journal of Medicine and Allied Health Science, Research Reach Journal of Home Science.*

- 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/ mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?
- F.Y B.Sc. and F.Y B.CA students are allotted a teacher mentor for a batch of 25 students. The mentor counsels students on difficulties faced college



or at home. F.Y and S.Y students also have class teachers with whom they can seek one-to-one interaction for personal or academic issues. From the IV semester onwards, HODs and departmental teachers act as mentors.

- A full time qualified counselor on campus is available 6 days a week from 9.00 to 3.00 in a specially designated area on the 4th floor. The counselor conducts need based sessions for students e on important topics like stress management, time management, group dynamics, team work and life skills. The counselor meets the mentoring committee twice in a semester.
- Dr. Chandralekha Venkateshan is a doctor on campus at 2nd floor counselor's room (Samavedna Centre) of the Smt. M.M.P. Shah College building
- Pyscho-Social Counseling is given through sessions organized under Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan on gender related issues. There are modules on self-esteem and positive thinking as part of the personality development classes. An annual workshop is organized on pre-marital counseling and reproductive health. Nutritional counseling is done by faculty of the FSN department and through awareness programs conducted during nutrition week in the first week of September. A life skills course based on Gandhian values is conducted at second year level for B.Sc. students.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Our faculty are constantly adopting innovative approaches to enhance the learning processes of students. This is facilitated through the provision of a well-equipped library, SMART technology enabled classrooms and access to Wi-Fi facilitates. The college has 5 computer labs wherein students can access 138 terminals as well as an internet corner. Teachers can therefore make use of ICT enabled software. The provision of LCD screens facilitates the screening of films especially for subjects such as English communication skills, Women's Studies, Media skills and Environmental studies.

One of the special features of the Home Science curriculum is its practical component wherein students gain hands-on training and enjoy experiential learning. Under the department of Textile Science and Apparel Design, lectures are supplemented with field visits to weaving units, Texan laboratory and Central Institute for Research in Cotton Technology (CIRCOT).

Similarly, for the subjects 'Introduction to Needs of Special Children' and 'Child Welfare' under Human Development, field visits are planned to organizations dealing with the differently abled children and disadvantaged children. Students are also taken on guided visits to schools for tribal children in rural areas, and centres for street children. In subjects related to Food Science and Nutrition, learning experiences include planning cooking demonstrations in the community, visits to food laboratories and dietetic departments of hospitals. Students of Hospitality Management are taken on visits to five star hotels to understand subjects of housekeeping and services. They receive skills development training under an unique Government of India scheme 'Hunar se Rozgar' Second year students attend a one week workshop at Garware Institute

of Career Development, Mumbai University. The main objective of this workshop is to give students hands on experience of using Galileo software.

Innovative teaching methods have been taken up by all the departments. Given below are at least one example from each specialization. Human Development:

Students of Human Development have the opportunity to participate in an ongoing student exchange Program with Department of Psychology of Smt. MMP Shah Women's College of Arts & Commerce. The program has been in place from 2013 onwards.

'Balmela' is an annual event conducted by the Department of Human Development. Final year students have a paper on 'Curriculum development'and this mega event gives them experiential, participatory and cooperative learning experiences. Students organize the two day event and learn to translate their theoretical knowledge into practical outcomes.

Students of Human Development also have subjects of counseling and family dynamics. As part of their learning experience, the dept. involves students in an annual seminar on pre-marital counseling wherein students interact with eminent doctors and experts from the faculty of counseling and reproductive health.

Resource Management:

A unique and attractive restaurant set up has been provided as part of the hospitality lab. The facility is used to train students on skills required under food and beverage services. The lab is planned as a proper restaurant setting with formal arrangements and required cutlery and crockery. Students are trained in Food and Beverage Services (SY level) and Basics of Food Production (TY level). As part of their formative assessment, they manage a restaurant setup for a day wherein students cater to invited guests on specific themes such as 'Desi Tadka', 'Canacona'and 'Bon Appetite'.

Textile Science and Apparel Design

Under the subject of 'Traditional textiles and embroideries of India', students are directed towards secondary sources on traditional textiles of India, including websites and youtube videos. They present their projects to their peers. Faculty facilitate their access to actual samples. Students are taken to exhibitions and on study tour for first hand observation. In March 2012 and October 2013, they visited textile manufacturing units and museum at Silvassa Dadra & Nagar Haveli. In January 2016, they were taken to Kutch to visit Kutch Handicrafts Craft Park, Kutch Museum and Bhujodi Village for Rogan art. Their contact with the artisans makes learning more meaningful and memorable. Having imbibed the required knowledge, students display and model textiles through a fashion show.

Under the subject of 'Recent advances in Textile Science and Apparel Design', TY students conduct surveys using tools like 'survey monkey' for online data collection. They also access you tube and e-resources for compilation of photographs and film clippings. Under the subject of 'Fabric Construction and Analysis', students are taught practical weaving of samples of different weaves, and analysis of actual commercial samples through looms in the textile lab.

Faculty have uploaded Ppts on slide share and share URLs with students on shuttle less weaving. The main emphasis of the subject 'Fabric ornamentation and accessory designing'is value addition to a garment or article. Faculty plan their teaching strategies so as to bring out the creativity of students. Students use their creativity to make articles from left over materials. All these articles were displayed, appreciated by visitors and sold during college biennial exhibition. Students learn the skills required to start their own ventures of making jewelry, fabric painting, and accessory designing.

Food Science and Nutrition:

Under the subject of 'Food product development'in the VI Semester, TY students learn how to develop and standardize an innovative, nutritious food product. Students are also taught additional aspects such as nutritional labeling, packaging, budgeting, shelf life studies and marketing. This helps towards the creation of a research culture as well as enhancing entrepreneurial skills among undergraduate students. Students also participate in an ongoing joint programme taken up with LTMG Hospital at Chota Sion Hospital to teach the mothers of children under the age of five nutritious recipes. In this manner, they gain practical experience in counseling on diets for pregnancy and lactation, breast feeding and hygienic practices.

Students of Nutrition and Dietetics are given innovative assignments such arranging demonstrations on low cost healthy recipes for our non-teaching staff members. They also prepare bulletin boards on the importance of breakfast. Similarly students have conducted a workshop on nutrition for menopausal women on 17th March 2016 at Navy Nagar. They also perform street plays on campus on health related topics such as prevention of diabetes and oral cancer.

The college conducts Nutrition week activities and Women's day events, in collaboration with Marico Industries. As part of the learning process, M.Sc. students are divided into groups with specific responsibilities. Each group is conducts competitions for their peers on topics related to good nutrition. Eminent speakers are invited to speak on select topics and a review paper writing competition is conducted.

Computer Applications:

Teachers from Computer Applications observed that while most of the students had android based cellphone with internet facility, they do not however have access to computers at home. They have therefore innovated with allowing students to use their cellphones in the following manner: Use of internet (website) in the cellphone for the practicing of SQL Queries, and use of App on android based cellphone for C++ programming (CPPDOIRD) and microprocessor lab (Intel 8085 Simulator), SQL Lab (PatronDB, W3SchoolSQL. Performance of students has shown a marked improvement as students are able to practice at home as well.

Faculty have devised engaging learning methods for FY BCA students who are from a non-math background such as tricks to do simple calculations, guest lectures on Vedic mathematics and quiz & puzzles to develop logical thinking. Under the System Analysis & Design (SSAD) & Management Information System (MIS), SY and TY BCA students are evaluated through projects and presentations for the same. Students are guided on how to approach IT

companies, gather subject-related information and its practical implementation, analyze and present the information in the form of a case study to the evaluators.

Foundation courses:

First aid is a part of applied science curriculum at FY level. It is taught in an innovative manner through a demonstrative and participatory workshop conducted in collaboration with the SMES College of Nursing.

Strategies are used to help students from non-English medium background to improve their reading skill speed reading practice is given in the classes. Students are encouraged to read at least two books per semester and write a book review. The fiction collection in the library has been enhanced so as to cater to the needs of different reading levels. Students are introduced to the concept of e-book since there are several books which can be accessed on smart phones.

Career oriented program (COP)

Students of COP in Physical Fitness and Weight management are trained in the college gym, on how to conduct a physical fitness test for a period of one month. They practice how to take anthropometric measurements, and calculate BMI (Body Mass Index). Students are then given on-field experience of using this knowledge by conducting a fitness tests for participants of the college annual personality contest.

Students of the COP in Event Management get hands- on skills training in how to organize major events. The college has been sending students to work in the annual international event 'India Leadership Forum'organized by NASSCOM for the last four years. They are trained for different roles on the pre-event day, and allotted duties at the registration desk and media counters. Students have received remuneration for their effort.

Impact:

The use of innovative methods have led to an enhanced learning experience. Though interaction with experts from the field, students become aware of the latest developments in their respective specializations. Their curiosity is aroused through experiences of independent learning. They develop analytical skills and begin to enjoy the learning experience. They simultaneously develop practical skills required for their specializations along with soft skills which enhance their employability. Given exposure to a plethora of activities, they develop interpersonal skills through participation in various events organized during the academic year.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The librarian conducts orientation sessions and is visible through her presence in student based activities such as the mentoring committee and Gandhian Studies Centre. Students therefore feel comfortable to approach her for assistance in their learning processes. The library has a comprehensive collection of latest books, print journals and also online journals for all the areas under Home Science and Computer Applications. The library builds up its primary and secondary material based upon the recommendations of teachers. A book exhibition is organized annually for staff and students wherein book distributors display a wide range of recent publications for perusal of faculty and students. Display of books on specific topics in the library is arranged on

request from faculty. Faculty and students can communicate their requirements during the meetings of the library committee

The library offers access to the INFLIBNET and SNDTWU database, as well as institutional membership with the American Library. Students have access to 5 internet- terminals and can also access WI-FI via. their laptops. Upon suggestion of the NAAC peer team, the library offers open access to postgraduate and final year undergraduate students as well as students with scholars'cards. The library provides book bank services, and also has a collection of films on DVDs and CDs as well as language games. Extra scholar cards are provided to the first five students on the merit list of each class. M.Sc. dissertations, minor and major research project reports, question papers, seminar and internship project reports are available as part of the institutional repository.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Each teacher prepares a teaching plan at the beginning of the semester, keeping in mind the academic calendar. Midway in the academic term, the Head of Department reviews the portion completed as per the guidelines of the syllabus. Rescheduling of teaching plans may be necessitated sometimes due to duty leave given to staff to attend workshops, refresher courses and conferences or leave for personal reasons. In which case, the teacher adjusts the teaching schedule by way of exchange of lectures with other teachers, or taking extra lectures missed in that period, so that the curriculum is completed on time. The adjustment plan is recorded in a log maintained by the exam and time table committee. Substitutes are appointed to ensure timely completion of syllabus when teachers go on long leave.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Assessment of the quality of teaching and learning is done at the end of every semester by means of the student-teacher evaluation process. From 2016, the student teacher evaluation process has been computerized and the data is processed by software developed by the Dept. of Computer Applications. The computed results are shared with individual teachers in confidence by the Principal. The aim of the process is to offer constructive feedback and to enable teachers to improve upon their teaching —evaluation processes.

The Head of the Departments offer feedback on the performance of faculty in their department through the confidential annual performance appraisal form. The Principal, in turn, reviews the confidential reports. The appraisal of the Head of Departments is done by the IQAC coordinator and the Principal. Feedback is given in writing of positive contributions as well as areas for improvement.

Other systems of monitoring and evaluating quality of teaching include the following:



- The Heads of Department reviews the teaching plans of the teacher so as to monitor the teaching quality of particular subject.
- PTA meetings held twice a year offer an opportunity for parents to give informal feedback on the quality of teaching/learning/evaluation.
- Examination results are discussed during the internal quality circle meetings with the objective of identifying ways of improving the academic performance of students.
- An Interdepartmental audit is conducted to encourage colleagues/peers to offer constructive feedback on the quality of teaching/learning processes
- Students offer feedback during student council meetings and informal meetings with the class teacher or Head of Department

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

Recruitment: The aided section of Dr. BMN College has a sanctioned strength of 17 faculty members, and all posts have been filled with competent and qualified staff members. Four appointments have been made in the last four years for the posts of assistant professors in Resource Management, Textile Science and Apparel Design, and Science. Selection procedures were followed strictly according to Government norms. NOCs were obtained from the Joint Director of Higher Education's Office and the posts were advertised in newspapers.

The appointment of faculty to unaided sections (BCA/B.Sc. in Nutrition and Dietetics/PG Diplomas/M.Sc. Program) is also done according to University norms. The Management has appointed the required number of staff and their salary is paid on time. Additionally, quality in teaching is maintained by inviting experts from the field for guest lectures/workshops as per the requirements of the curriculum.

Retention: The fact that the institution has retained the majority of its staff over the last 20 years, especially of unaided courses, is evidence of the congenial work culture which offers several opportunities for professional growth. The Management and Principal encourage faculty to continuously upgrade their knowledge base, and duty leave is granted for participation in seminars, workshops and training programs. At least one workshop in a semester is organized for faculty upgradation (for details please refer to 6.3.1).

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programs/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

Experts from the industry, senior academicians and alumnae are invited to conduct sessions on new components in specific areas of the curriculum, whenever required. For example, computer applications is a fast evolving field and hence the department has introduced a healthy practice wherein 5% of the syllabus is taught by resource persons from the industry. Similarly, the postgraduate course in Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics requires inputs from doctors and highly qualified nutritionists. A list of experts who have been invited is available in Criteria 3, as also in the department evaluative reports. Faculty are encouraged to attend training programs, seminars & workshops to upgrade their knowledge base. They are also encouraged to enroll for their Ph.D., and apply for UGC Minor research projects.

There are 5 self-financing courses offered on campus. Each course has a coordinator and the required number of staff members has been appointed by the Management to ensure that the course is conducted effectively. Departments coordinate with in-house faculty to share their expertise on subjects such as women's studies, nutrition, soft skills and computers.

The institutional culture is an open and transparent one. Faculty are encouraged to do their best and to consider themselves as an integral part of the college. The Principal and the entire institution feels a pride in the various achievements of our faculty members.

The Management expresses appreciation during weekly meetings and Governing council meetings, and by felicitating teacher achievers on occasion of Teachers'day on September 5th every year.

The institutional policy is to encourage constant professional and personal growth. Faculty are encouraged to take up invitations as resource persons to various institutions. They also serve on the BOS and staff selection panels of SNDTWU and other universities. Teachers share their experiences during staff meetings and set a benchmark for others to aspire towards. A number of workshops are organized on campus to enhance the learning experience and skill development of teachers. Faculty are encouraged to apply for minor and major research projects and enroll for their Ph.D. They are encouraged to start short term courses through IGNOU and are motivated to become coordinators for short certificate courses such as 'Kshrujan' and Pre-Crèche training program. They also actively participate in community based projects such as THRED intergenerational interactions, and income generating projects for marginalized sections of society.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

- Students assess teachers for all theoretical and practical subjects at the end of every semester. Evaluation is through a questionnaire based on the following parameters: communication skills, subject knowledge, use of innovative teaching methods, interpersonal skills and class room management skills. The feedback is tabulated through software devised by the computer department. Teachers have a one-to-one meeting with the Principal who discusses the feedback given by students, in confidence. Teachers are counseled on how to improve quality of teaching-learning.
- All faculty submit their Academic Performance Indicator (API) files at the end of the academic year. The validity of the information submitted is reviewed by the IQAC, particularly in terms of questions on teachinglearning strategies and also co-curricular activities.
- During the annual inter-department audit, teaching-learning processes of departments are evaluated by members of a twinned department.
- The annual AQAR report is sent to the external members of the IQAC for feedback, which is then shared during the annual IQAC review meeting. IQAC external experts have given invaluable inputs on improving feedback



mechanisms.

 Faculty who have undergone promotion through CAS/PBAS have also been subject to evaluation by external peers

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- The academic evaluation processes are determined by SNDTWU and is clearly stipulated in syllabus of each course.
- Students and their parents are informed about the credit system, grade system, evaluation system and rules for passing during the orientation to the course.
- The methods of formative assessment are shared by subject teachers when assignments are given in the class.
- Guidelines for evaluation for seminar presentations are prepared by the respective departments and shared with students.
- Guidelines for evaluation of internship report is prepared by the respective departments and shared with external members of jury invited to assess the same.
- A detailed evaluation format for continuous evaluation of each practical subject is prepared by the respective departments.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution follows the evaluation reforms and continuous assessment / grading system of the SNDTWU. The syllabi for B.Sc. and B.C.A was restructured and the modular format introduced in 2012-2013. Grading patterns were revised in 2016. The syllabi emphasizes on continuous evaluation and formative assessment for 25% of the total marks. Innovative methods for continuous assessment include group and individual projects, presentations, quizzes, dramatization and book reviews. Unit tests are conducted to hone the writing skills of students. Industry experts are invited to evaluate internship/subject presentations

Re- tests are conducted for students who have missed tests and submission dates because of their participation in extra- curricular events and competitions, as well as absence due to medical reasons. Teachers evaluate the student's performance after every practical. If the teacher finds the student slow or below average in the performance in a particular practical, the student is given extra guidance and support.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The examination and time table committee of the college works towards the effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university. The institution follows University regulations during conduct of college level exams as is the norm. The committee has formulated a handbook for ready reference of rules and its effective implementation. Circulars and changes in examination rules are communicated immediately to the faculty and displayed on the examination committee notice board.

Evaluation reforms of the university.

SNDTWU reviewed its B.Sc. Home Science and BCA programs in 2012 and 2013 respectively so as to implement uniform 120 credits across board. The semester system is followed with continuous evaluation in the form of formative (25%) and summative evaluation (75%). The institute follows this pattern at first year level for college level exams (i.e. SEM. I and II), and conducts formative (25%) evaluation for SY and TY level in semesters III, IV, V & VI. Summative evaluation for semesters III, IV, V & VI is done by SNDT Women's University.

Initiatives taken by the university and implemented by the college

- Students are guided on the online registration process wherein the Maharashtra Knowledge Commission Limited (MKCL) allots every student a unique number upon admission.
- Every subject is allotted a unique examination code. Faculty has played an active role in streamlining this process for the SNDTWU.
- Faculty have been appointed as CAP coordinators of the University exams and are therefore well versed with the system.
- The examination cell has been set up on the 4th floor which is secured and under CCTV surveillance. The examination committee has designated members of the non-teaching staff for the smooth conduct of the examinations.
- Examination papers are delivered online. The college has the required infrastructure and facilities to download the question paper and to make arrangements for required copies immediately.
- College level exams for B.Sc. and BCA sections are conducted simultaneously to ensure smooth implementation of the academic calendar.
- All rules and regulations are displayed on the notice board for students.
 Issues of unfair practices and subsequent punishment are discussed during PTA meetings.
- The schedule of the internal and final semester exams is displayed in advance on the staff boards at the start of the academic year. Schedules for the exams are also mentioned in the college diary and the college calendar which is uploaded on the college website.
- Faculty enter the internal marks online for the university papers. They also enter the marks onto excel sheets for college level exams. This has helped to reduce the average time taken by the administrative section for declaration of results, and reduce margin of error in calculations.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.



Formative assessment is for 25% of the total marks for B.Sc. and BCA students, and 50% of the total marks for M.Sc. and PG Diploma students. Formative evaluation methods include class tests, project presentations, book reviews, surveys, reports of industrial and field visits, seminar presentations and internship reports. Summative evaluation is conducted at the end of each semester for 75 % of the total marks for B.Sc. and BCA and 50% for M.Sc.

The college conducts summative assessments for semesters I & II, while exams for III, IV, V and VIth semesters are conducted by the University. The overall result is based on the performance of student in internal tests and the external examination. The positive impact of formative assessment can be seen in improved attendance of students who realize the importance of attending class for continuous assessment. The practice allows for the teachers to identify the weak and the advance learners of the class. This in turn enhances teacher-student communication. Innovative assignments enhance their creativity and create an interest in the subject. Students become independent learners and this leads to an increase in self-esteem and confidence levels.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

The college ensures rigor transparency in the internal assessment process as follows

- Internal tests are conducted as per the schedule fixed by the exam committee
 and also according to pre-defined dates by subject teachers. Written unit test
 papers are shown to students for their review. This ensures transparency in
 assessment of papers.
- Internal marks are shown to the students before they are submitted to the University. If the same subject is taught by more than one teacher, the question paper is set together to ensure that all portion is included.
- Guidelines are in place for seminar/group project/internship report presentations. Seminar presentations are assessed by two teachers of the department to ensure impartiality. After evaluation, marks assigned for projects are discussed with students.
- Seminar reports and project files are returned to students after they have been assessed.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The institution is committed to imbibing graduate attributes in students which will empower them at all levels — intellectual, physical, spiritual and economical. The college works towards imbibing these attribute through innovative teaching methods, value added programs, seminars, workshops and a host of co-curricular and extracurricular activities. In addition, students are encouraged to participate in leadership camps, NSS and extension activities,



sports events, literary events, project work and internship, research competitions and inter-collegiate youth festivals. Co-curricular activities are geared towards developing these attributes along with a strong sense of ethical and social responsibility. Extra-curricular activities play a vital role in developing leadership skills, team work, decision making ability, and time management. (Please refer to figure no. 1- KASH Model, Page No.82)

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The examination committee looks in examination grievances with reference to evaluation at college level. Students can approach the concerned teacher/class teacher/ HODs for clarification regarding evaluation procedures. If a student has a grievance regarding her results at University level, she can apply to the University exam department, through the college within ten days after the declaration of the result. The student can ask for verification of marks/ photocopy of the answer book / re-evaluation of her paper. University rules regarding re-evaluation of papers are communicated to students by the Heads of Department

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes'give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?



Our learning outcomes are incorporated into institution objectives, which are as follows:

- To foster a healthy learning environment
- To make teaching and research relevant to social needs
- To inculcate a humanist outlook in students by means of value based education and community outreach programs
- To focus on vocationalization of courses

Our focus is on developing analytical, critical thinking and communication skills of our students. We strive to empower students with the necessary employability skills while simultaneously inculcating a sense of social responsibility.

Further, the syllabi of SNDTWU defines the learning objectives of each course offered. Faculty correspondingly uses appropriate teaching-learning practices to ensure that these learning outcomes are achieved. Teachers have attended syllabus framing and content analysis workshops that provide guidelines for achieving these outcomes. Faculty submit a tentative teaching plan before they commence the course, giving details of time frame and teaching methods so as to achieve the learning outcomes.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programs/courses offered.

The institute follows a formative system of evaluation as part of the continuous assessment process. This gives teachers an idea of the performance level of students from the first month of teaching itself. The progress of the students is monitored viz. subsequent performance in class tests and assignments. A written test is conducted approximately after 1 ½ month of teaching. This allows the faculty to assess the writing skills and subject comprehension of students. Weak students are thus identified and given extra help. Question paper sets of previous years are kept in the library and they are encouraged to solve the same. Weak learners in subjects such as English, Physiology and Math attend remedial/bridge classes. Advanced learners are also identified in this manner and given challenging assignments. Attendance is monitored regularly to ensure the consistent progress of students. If required, parents are called for a meeting with the class teacher or Head of Department. Wherever the faculty feel there is a learning problem, the case is referred to the counselor. Parent teacher meetings are conducted regularly once per semester.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The graduate attributes identified by the college along with desired learning outcomes determine the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution. Our focus is on participatory learning and skill development. Hence teaching/learning /evaluation strategies are structured so as to enable students to become employable upon graduation, and also to become socially responsible citizens. Methods used for assessment of application of knowledge include grading of individual and group presentations in a structured manner, conducting practical exams, projects and assignments, and inviting an external jury for internship presentations.

Strategies to achieve learning outcomes begin with pre-planning which includes an academic calendar, teaching plans and exam calendar. Learning takes place through a variety of methods such as independent learning, collaborative learning, participatory learning and cooperative learning. Students are encouraged to participate in seminars and workshops to supplement classroom teaching. In addition, knowledge-based activities and internship placement during the third year B.Sc. help students to achieve the desired learning outcomes. Departments organize visits to take students beyond the classroom. Value additions are offered through the Career Oriented Program (COP) courses. On the basis of students' performance in initial assessments, strategies are revised to enable them to achieve the intended learning outcomes. Faculty are trained in use of ICT, and the classrooms are equipped with Wi-Fi and smart technology boards in order to incorporate innovative teaching methods.

Additional incentives to encourage students to enhance their subject knowledge are awarded for those on the merit list, appreciation letters, and certificates of participation for students who have participated in curricular and co-curricular activities. It must also be added that for consideration of the 'Best Students of the Year'awards, criteria such as participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities, extension activities, sports, leadership qualities and overall behavior is also taken into account.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

Student placements: The placement committee conducts sessions on how to apply for competitive exams to enhance employability. It also conducts aptitude tests to help students to make career choices based on their potential. Campus placement interviews are conducted by the BCA placement committee and students have been placed in companies such as Wipro, Accenture and Infosys. A student committee has been formed for Industry placements. The internship program in the third year B.Sc. also gives exposure to students of the requirements of the industry.

Entrepreneurship: We have initiated a unique entrepreneurial program

'Kshrujan' in collaboration with Carepox Corporate Services Ltd. Students receive the necessary tools to begin their own start up. Interested students are sponsored to attend start up workshops. For instance in September 2016, Ms. Hiran Jaiswal from TY TSAD was deputed to attend a two day training program organized by the National Institute for Entrepreneurship. The college contributed Rs 6500 towards registration. Our alumna have initiated a mentoring group on social media called 'entrepreneurial superstars'.

There are several departmental initiatives and ventures wherein students are motivated to cultivate entrepreneurial skills. They learn the basics of planning, budgeting, costing and marketing. These include the following opportunities:

- Students are encouraged to put up stalls during the intercollegiate festivals Tekzone & Akanksha.
- Students of TYRM participate in a restaurant settings every year and learn how to make a budget and plan the entire venture.
- TYFSN & ND students study 'Food product development' as part of their curriculum. They develop a new product or enhance existing products as per specific target groups. They learn how to budget and market the product. Students of Nutrition and Dietetics plan and budget for a one day cafeteria as part of the course work.
- 'Balmela'is an annual mega event of the Human development Department which is entirely managed, from conception to execution, by the students of SY & TY HD and PG Diploma in Early Childhood Education.
- A college exhibition with special focus on the theme of entrepreneurship was organized as part of enhancing employability skills" on 28th to 30th November, 2015.
- The Placement committee organizes sessions on entrepreneurship as a career choice. Our alumnae who are now successful entrepreneurs play an important motivational role in such sessions:
 - Ms. Supriya Damani, spoke on 'Entrepreneurship Skill Development for Wedding gifts' on 12th August, 2011.
 - Ms. Kajal Thosani spoke on 'Entrepreneurial Skills' on 7th July, 2012.
 - Ms. Kajal Bhatia, Nutritionist, Ms. Rachana Patel, Senior Merchandiser and Ms. Swati Palwankar spoke on "Developing Entrepreneurial Skills" on 6th September, 2014.
 - Ms. Anuja Patel spoke on her fitness hub on 14th March 2016.
 - Ms. Ponam Rattan Chharia spoke on her experience of setting up her own export house, and Ms. Misba Mukri spoke on setting up her Preschool on 17th March 2016.

Research aptitude: The College research committee organizes sessions on research methodology to orient students on the fundamentals and ethics of research. Students are encouraged to take up surveys on social relevant themes. The college has signed a MOU with the NGO 'PUKAR' for conduct of an exclusive one semester course on 'Research as pedagogy, advocacy and transformation'. The focus of the course is on community based action research. Students are guided towards becoming critical thinkers as well as conscious and contributing citizens to their communities.

The college has initiated a unique mentoring programme on 29th October, 2016 called "Incubation (Guru-Gyan)" for M.Sc. students, who will be mentored

during their internship and also work on projects mentored by experts from various professional bodies including AFSTI, Marico, Farm to Folk, Hindustan Unilever and Kamani oils.

Soft skills to enhance employability: Value added courses on personality development and soft skills are offered at SY and TY levels. Modules include basics of personality development, presentation skills, public speaking, mock interviews, resume writing and group discussions. A course on 'Life Skills based on Gandhian Values'is offered through the Gandhian Studies Centre in the 3rd Semester. The college has signed a MOU with SEED Infotech to enhance the soft skills of BCA students. A wide range of co-curricular and the extracurricular activities help to develop organizational, managerial and leadership skills.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Head of Departments collect and analyze data on student performances and learning outcomes through formative evaluation and summative evaluation methods which are conducted in a regular and structured manner. Performance is also appraised through seminar presentations, and participation in mock interviews which are conducted at third year level. Results of performance at university level exams are published in the SMES annual Report, and shared during the Governing council meetings with the Management. Faculty analyse the reasons for low performance and try to implement strategies to improve the performance of the students. For example, steps are taken to help improve the writing skills of students weak in English. Bi-lingual explanation is given whenever necessary to explain difficult concepts. Remedial classes and extra coaching are other strategies used to help enhance academic performance.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Teachers prepare a tentative teaching plan in keeping with the learning outcomes as outlined in the syllabus. This plan is reviewed periodically by the Head of Department. The college follows a system of internal assessment as per the regulations of the university. The modular curriculum suggests the kind of assignments to be given to ensure the achievement of learning outcomes. Faculty communicate marks allotted for projects and assignments along with positive feedback on how the student can improve her performance. Slow learners are given extra inputs and advanced learners are given more challenging topics. One to one interaction, mentoring, presentations and group assignments help to assess achievement of learning outcomes. Student teacher evaluation also helps to assess if students are satisfied with learning outcomes. Organizations like PFNDAI (Protein Foods and Nutrition Development Association of India), AFSTI (Association of Food Scientists and Technologists India) and BCPT (Bombay Community Port Trust) have recognized the efforts of students by awarding merit based scholarships to deserving students.


2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes'provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Internal assessment tests are conducted on a regular basis and teachers use evaluation outcomes to evaluate student performance and progression. Methods of assessment include MCQs, oral presentations at individual and group level and testing of practical skills. Skills that are assessed include theoretical knowledge, practical component, communication skills and knowledge application skills. Due to formative assessment, there is a constant monitoring of performance which allows faculty to identify weak as well as advance learners and to devise methods to assist their performance accordingly. Weak students are counseled by faculty, mentors as well as college counselor. Workshops are organized on stress management, time management and study skills to help to improve students' performance.

The K.A.S.H Quality parameter model (Knowledge-Attitude-Skills-Habits) is used to evaluate teaching-learning methods in terms of achieving learning outcomes and also graduate attributes as defined by the institution (See fig 1.)



Evaluating teaching learning processes through KASH







3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the Affiliation University or any other agency / organization?

We are primarily an undergraduate institute and we therefore do not have a recognized research centre. The institution however believes in promoting a strong undergraduate research culture wherein students are taught how to think independently and in an innovative manner. The college research committee organizes a number of activities for students and staff to promote a research culture on campus. The college also offers a M.Sc. in Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics for which research is an important component for fulfilling the program's requirements. For this purpose, the college has formulated a registered ethical committee which follows the guidelines of Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR). Once a research proposal is approved by the committee, it is submitted to the ICMR for a global register number through the Clinical Trial Registry of India.

3.1.2 Does the institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects?

- Autonomy is given to the principal investigator of UGC minor and major research projects viz. selection of topic and implementation of the project
- The institution ensures the timely availability or release of resources as and when accounts are submitted justifying the same. The administrative section also facilitates timely auditing and submissions of utilization certificate to the funding authorities so that the faculty can get reimbursed for the same.
- Faculty who have enrolled for their PhD have the provision of using college facilities for their research. In all, three teachers have been sanctioned leave under UGC Faculty Development Program to complete their PhD, while 3 others have availed of duty leave to attend contact sessions and research methodology courses under their PhD program. Faculty who are in the completion stages of their PhD have been given considerations as far duties in college level extra-curricular committees are concerned so that they can focus on their research work.
- The institution provides adequate infrastructure such as labs and computer facilities. Staff are provided with Wi-Fi, computers, laptops, as well as printing and scanning facilities.



- Library subscribes to UGC Inflibnet N list which offers access to around 6000+ e- journals and 3000000+ e- books and also to the American Library which offers a number of online journals. The library also has provision of inter-library borrowing facilities with Smt. MMP Shah College of Arts and Commerce, and SNDT Women's University Libraries.
- Faculty are sanctioned duty leave to attend conferences and may apply for reimbursement of registration fees for conferences within India. Faculty may apply to the staff welfare fund for financial assistance for paper presentations at conferences held abroad.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institute is a predominantly undergraduate college. Several efforts have been made to develop an undergraduate research culture and aptitude for analytical and innovative thinking:

- In 2014 -2015, the college signed a MOU with the NGO PUKAR (Promotion of Urban Knowledge Action Research) to introduce a unique certificate program in "Research as Pedagogy, Advocacy and Transformation." The objective of the program is to develop basic research skills at undergraduate level. Students are taught how to create a research design, choose appropriate research methods, create instruments, and complete data collection and analysis, and write a research report.
- Student groups have been encouraged to join the Barefoot Researchers Youth Fellowship Program funded by PUKAR. The Youth Fellowship initiative encourages cross-disciplinary community-based participatory research on issues pertaining to urbanization and globalization. PUKAR supports the research efforts up to Rs. 30,000 for a year.

Projects have been undertaken on the following topics in the last four years:

- ➤ "An explorative study of groups of working women travelling in local trains of Mumbai." (2012-2013)
- > "Aspirations of mothers" (2012-3013)
- ➤ "Problems and strengths of students from non-English medium while studying in a college of English medium" (2014-2015)
- ➤ "Governance of the weekly market at Vashi, New Mumbai" (2015-2016)
- ➤ On 12th Feb. 2015, the student team was selected for an interview with the National Public Radio (NPR) of Chicago and Public Broadcasting System (PBS)
- The research committee conducted an intercollegiate undergraduate research competition on 12th March 2015 on the theme "Emerging Trends in respective specializations".
- The college is proactive in giving opportunities to advanced learners to participate in research activities. Third year B.Sc. as well as M.Sc. students are encouraged to participate in technical sessions at national level and international level conferences. For instance:
 - 2 students of SY TSAD were awarded 3rd Prize for their poster on 'Customization of Clothing' at the National Level Vastra Technical Poster Presentation, organized by Veermata Jijabai Technical Institute (VJTI) on 17th Feb. 2012.



- 2 students of TY B.Sc. FSN participated at the ICMR, DST and DBT Sponsored International Conference on 'Technological Advances in Super Foods for Health Care (ICTASH-2013)'at Pondicherry from 3rd to 6th May, 2013 and won a consolation prize and trophy for their oral presentation. The paper has been published in the International Journal of Food and Health Science e- ISSN NO 2320-7876.
- 3 students of M.Sc. Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics received prizes for their presentations at an International Conference on "Challenges and Advances in Food Technology" organized by International Institute of Food and Nutritional Sciences held at Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi from 2nd to 5th May 2014.
- 4 students of TY FSN won 2nd prize for their paper presentation titled "Food Security and Climate Change" at an Inter Collegiate student research Competition organized by the research cell of Smt. Maniben Nanavati Women's College, Vile Parle, on 17th January, 2014.
- 4 students of M.Sc. Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics received prizes for their presentations at the 6th International Conference on "Emerging Technologies in Food & Nutrition for Health Management" held at ICAR-Adugodi, Bangalore on 14th and 15th May, 2015.
- The college inaugurated an incubation cell for promoting research and innovation (Guru Gyan) on 29th August, 2016. This centre will collaborate with industries, researchers and entrepreneurs who will mentor M.Sc. CND students on innovative research ideas and entrepreneurial possibilities.
- Advanced learners are also encouraged to publish their papers under mentorship of their teacher-guides. In all 26 students of M.Sc. and TY B.Sc. (Food Science and Nutrition) have authored papers in with their teachermentors. Annexure No.13
- Advanced learners are guided in data collection, basic statistical analysis, and review of literature. They are encouraged to take up surveys, case studies seminars and projects that require independent investigation on the part of the students.
- Sessions for students have been organized such as "Research Instruments and Ethics" conducted by Dr. Anita Patil Deshmukh (Director, PUKAR) on 17th September, 2015; "Understanding various aspects of the research and difficulties during ongoing research" by Mr. Sudhir Kale (TISS expert in SPSS) on 10th October 2015; and "use of statistics for research" by Mrs. Mohiniben Mankekar (Former Principal, Smt. MMP Shah College of Arts and Commerce) on 15th October 2016.
- The librarian conducts orientation sessions on effective use of library resources, how to write a bibliography and how to conduct online searches in the months of July to September every year.
- Students of the Dept. of Food Science and Nutrition are involved in innovative food product development wherein they apply scientific learning and out- of -the -box thinking. . 70 students from MSc CND participated in an initiative organized by AFST(I) Mumbai Chapter & ICT titled 'Food Technology Innovation IPL' in November 2016. Students submitted 105 ideas which were divided into different sections like oils and fats, dairy, fruits and vegetable, nutraceuticals / functional foods, traditional foods,



breakfast /snacks. 13 students received prizes. The college was awarded the trophy for maximum ideas received at National Level.

- Students have presented projects on innovative food product development at conferences. In November 2016, students from MSc CND participated in an initiative organised by AFST(I) Mumbai Chapter & ICT titled 'Food Technology Innovation IPL'in November 2016. The college was awarded the trophy for maximum ideas received and thirteen students received individual prizes.
- The exposure to a research culture has motivated students to continue with their research skills after their graduation.
- Faculty have presented their research papers at national and international level seminars and conferences.



3.2 Research Mobilization for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The main source of funding for research is from UGC. for minor and major projects, and from the Industry for collaborative projects. The college has been awarded UGC status of College with Potential for Excellence and will be availing of CPE funding for its proposed research based initiatives. The management bears the books and journals, chemicals, equipment, maintenance and college level journal. Staff avail of financial assistance towards attending conferences from the staff welfare fund, and also towards travel expenses for international conferences.

3.2.2. Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

Our Management has sanctioned the necessary amount in advance as required by staff who have been awarded Minor research grants to purchase books and equipment, although the sanctioned amount has not yet been received from the UGC. In the case of Mrs Veena Verma, our Management has sanctioned Rs 70 000/- as an advance towards expenses towards her minor research project. There is provision for financial support towards registration fees for national and international conferences. In addition faculty can apply for funding to attend

- Registration fee of Ms. Neelam Ghadge (M.Sc. CND Final Year) for 1500/ for presentation at the 7th International conference on 'Growing trends in food technology and nutrition for public health care' on 25th & 26th May, 2015 at New Delhi. She received 3rd prize for the same.
- Registration fee of `1300 each for 5 final year M.Sc. students participation at a national conference organised by Indian Dietetics Association (IDACON) from 23rd to 25th September 2016 at Mumbai.

Students from S.Y B.Sc. (Home Science) have been mentored on how to apply for the PUKAR Youth fellowship program, wherein `30 000/- is available in support of the research process. Four groups have availed of the fellowship in 2013-2014 (two groups), 2014-2015 and 2015- 2016.

- Faculty from Depts. of English, Human Development, and BCA work in tandem to promote Gandhian values on campus.
- Faculty from Dept. of Computer Applications conduct training sessions for B.Sc faculty on the latest in ICT and use of computers.
- Mrs. Alka Pant of the HD department trains students of the SMES School of Nursing in extension activities for community work.
- Dr. Vrushali Datar of Resource Management has conducted demonstrations on Madhubani painting for students of the Dept. of TSAD while Mrs. Vinaya Vaishampayan from Nutrition and Dietetics has conducted lectures on importance of breast feeding for students of BCA

3.5 Consultancy

3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute-industry interface?

The institute has established a strong institute –industry interface through the following activities:

- a) TY Students of B.Sc. are placed for their internship in industries and organizations related to their specialization in the VIth Semester. We have established a steady ongoing relationship with several companies. (For details please refer to 1.1.5)
- b) Experts and resource persons are invited from the Industry for guest lectures. For example BCA department invites experts from industry to conduct 5% of the syllabus.
- c) Experts from the industry are invited as members of the jury for evaluating internship reports in the VIth Semester. They offer invaluable feedback to students on the expectations of the market place.
- d) Experts from industry are also invited to speak on career possibilities as part of the FY orientation for major selection at the end of the II semester.
- e) The college has established linkages with companies such as with Marico, Pepsico, Vissco, Neoteric, Chinikum, Pawaak and Easy to eat Foods which has led to collaborative projects.
- f) Mr. Milind Rane, Deputy General Manager HR at Hardcastle Petrofer Pvt. Ltd, is a member of the LMC committee of BCA, and Dr. Prabodh Halde, Head (International Regulatory Affairs) Marico Industries is a member of the LMC committee of M.Sc. CND.
- g) Eminent members of industry have been invited as chief guest for events such as the inauguration function of the intercollegiate technical festival Tekzone, and National level seminars. For e.g. Ms. Sunita Bhaskaran (Head, Oracle Practice, ATOS India), Mr. Sankar Ghosh (MD, Solution Architecture, Accenture), Mr. Nanasaheb Shendkar (Environmentalist and Chairman at Aaartist group of companies)
- h) Members from industry are invited to be part of mock interviews which are conducted at TY Level as part of the soft skills course.



3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

IQAC has accepted the guidelines for consultancy of SNDTWU as passed in the Academic Council meeting dated 19th April 2012, wherein consultancy is categorized into two types: 1) activities which bring in remuneration through the use of expertise of a faculty member. (2)activities which focuses on sharing of specific knowledge and expertise of faculty members and does not necessarily bring in remuneration

Under the first type, the college has two projects:

- a. Consultancy project with SASMIRA Institute of Textiles and Management and Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) for a project titled, "Ergonomic Evaluation of Ten Spindle Charkha" developed by Udyog Bharati, Gondal Surat District for `90, 000/- (2016 -2017). Principal Investigator Ms. Roma Gandhi.
- b. Nutritional counseling to create awareness among parents & children about lifestyle disorders, Amulakh Amichand School for ` 50000/- (2016-2017). Principal Investigator Dr. Rupali Sengupta.

Under the second category, our faculty actively participate in social consultancy for NGOs on issues such as community nutrition, health and hygiene, early childhood education, and research related projects. While there is no monetary revenue generated, the reward to the college is in terms of tremendous satisfaction of having contributed towards social betterment.

- i. After the second reaccreditation cycle wherein we got A grade with grade point of 3.64/4, colleges consulted our institute on how to prepare the NAAC Self-study report. Principal Dr. Shilpa Charankar has been invited to share expertise on preparing the RAR at the B.M Ruia College, Smt. MMP Shah College of Arts and Commerce, and Loni SNDT College.
- ii. Vice-Principal Prof Mala Pandurang is an external expert on the IQAC of Maniben Nanavati College, Vile Parle. She has been invited to speak on "Consultancy Possibilities: Arts and Humanities" by Bhavan's College on 30th August 2016, and on "Academic-Industry Collaboration Consultancy: A perspective from the Arts and Humanities at Lala Lajput Rai college on 26th August 2016. She was invited by PUKAR to mainstream their 'Community based Participatory Action Research'(CBPAR) course targeted at undergraduates in 2014.
- iii. Mrs. Anuradha Shekhar (HOD, FSN) is a co-opted Member of AFSTI Mumbai Chapter and in-charge of their student welfare programs.
- iv. Dr. Rupali Sengupta has been involved in setting up the curriculum for the M.Sc. program in Nutrition and Dietetics at Perriyar University.
- v. Dr. Rashmi Vyvaharkar (Associate Professor, HD Dept.) collaborated with NGO Stree Mukti Sanghatana to prepare the syllabi for a certificate course in crèche and balwadi teachers training.
- vi. Dr. Meena Mehta has been a member of the organizing committee of the Indian Dietetics Association for a number of their events

In addition faculty members are also on peer-review boards of academic journals such as *Journal of Human Ecology, Science International Domain Journal, Journal of South Asian Diaspora, Journal of Medicine and Allied Health Science, Research Reach Journal of Home Science.*

Publicity of expertise available for consultancy is mainly generated by interaction on one-to-one basis, and through networking with institutions and NGOs.

3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

The institution acknowledges staff members who have offered consultancy by special mention of their efforts during staff meetings and by appreciation by the Management during the Governing Council meetings. They are sanctioned duty leave as and when necessary.

3.5.5 What is the policy of the institution on sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for institutional development?

The IQAC has accepted the guidelines of the SNDTWU for promoting research, consultancy and extension, as passed in the Academic council dated 19th April 2012. However, the nature of consultancy offered is social consultancy wherein the specific knowledge and expertise of faculty members is a major input.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibilities (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighborhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

We place special emphasis on community oriented activities. To ensure maximum participation of students, they are engaged in activities organized by the NSS unit, gender sensitization programs of Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan and the Gandhian Studies Centre. Each department also integrates outreach programs while imparting the curriculum. Faculty participate actively in social

outreach programs. Non-teaching faculty members are also involved in organizing programs such as blood donation camps, satyanarayan puja for the neighbourhood and NSS Special camps.

Activities organized to promote institution-neighborhood-community network include the following:

Our Institution strives towards building community- networks in a meaningful way. We make every effort to sustain mutually beneficial partnerships which have been built with different welfare organizations. Outreach activities contribute to the holistic development of students, who learn to imbibe an attitude of service before self.

The Dept. of Human Development works with the following organisations in the neighborhood:

- Shradhanand Mahila Ashram (Matunga)
- Ashadeep Orphanage (Andheri).
- Manay Seva Sangh Home for Senior Citizens (Sion)
- Stree Mukti Sanghatana (Chembur and Govandi)
- Kamala Mehta School for Blind (Dadar)
- Mobile Crèches (Wadala)
- Save the Children (Bandra)

During their fieldwork and internship, students engage children in the above welfare organisations in activities to foster the creative, cognitive and physical development of children.

The neighborhood community reciprocates by participating in the 'Balmela' which the department organizes every year. Students are also involved in an integrated program between our Prangan experimental nursery, and socially disadvantaged children of Shraddhanand Mahila Ashram to celebrate the Ganpati Festival.

The Department initiated a 32 hour certificate course on "Crèche and Balwadi Teachers Training" in collaboration with NGO Stree Mukti Sanghatana in 2015. The objective of the program is to enable women from lower economic strata to become successful crèche and balwadi teachers and entrepreneurs.

Our college has an ongoing project with the NGO THRED (Trust for Human Resource Enrichment & Development) wherein students are mentored to bridge the gap between generations. Student volunteers befriend at least 4 senior citizens and interact with their adopted senior citizens (individually) for a minimum of 2 hours in a week over a period of at least 8-10 weeks. Students learn to show empathy and compassion towards the senior citizens.

The Dept. of Food Science and Nutrition conducts nutrition education programs every year in collaboration with Chota Sion Hospital. Activities included nutrition demonstrations, puppet shows street plays and nutrition related games. Awareness programs are also conducted on the importance of breast feeding. As part of this initiative, students also created awareness on healthy practices to be followed for a healthy lifestyle through a demonstration of multi-nutrient

recipes to mothers of children under five. Students of Nutrition and Dietetics have performed street plays on campus on health related topics such as stress management, prevention of cancer and diabetes. They also conducted a workshop on nutrition for 50 menopausal women between age 40-50 years on 17th March 2016 at Navy Nagar, with the emphasis on foods rich in phytoestrogen. The students prepared brochures for the same.

Students of the Dept. of Textile Science and Apparel Design have conducted activities for underprivileged girls at Ashadeep Association, Andheri (sponsored by Cipla Pharmaceuticals. Co) from October to November 2013. Activities included teaching underprivileged girls and women different techniques of fabric painting, lantern making and diya decorations. Mrs. Sugandha Lad and Mrs. Pradnya Ambre along with 4 TY BSc students conducted a training workshop in fabric painting and embroidery for the marginalized section of the society in collaboration with Dept. of Fiber and Textile Processing Technology, Institute of Chemical Technology, Mumbai in October 2016.

Students of BCA have volunteered as writers for blind students for the Indira Gandhi Open University MCA exams. In 2012-2013, the department successfully conducted IGNOU examination for 100 blind and visually impaired MCA students

NSS students regularly participate in pulse polio drives in the locality, as well as blood donation drives on campus for the benefit of the Lokmanya Tilak Sion Hospital. The Rotary Club of Bombay Uptown coordinates with the NSS Unit on an ongoing basis for health awareness programs/health check-ups. Student volunteers have worked in the following communities during the annual NSS Camps conducted in December every year.

- 2011: Mangalpada and Comrade Godavari S. Parulekar Junior College with collaboration with Rural Community Development Center at Talasari, Ashadeep Balwadi at Andheri and Goregaon
- 2012: Ashadeep Association Centres at Bamanwada, Mahakali Caves, Shakti Center, Sahar Village (Andheri) and Dindoshi Center (Goregoan). In addition to social outreach activities a survey was conducted on eve teasing and sexual harassment.
- 2013: Ashadeep Association (Mahakali Cave, Dindoshi Center Goregoan), Shradhanand Ashram (Matunga), YWCA (Bhandup, Ghatkopar and Chembur), Ashadeep Association (Ghatkopar), Shradhanand Ashram.
- 2014: Community work for children at Rural Community Development Center Talasari. Field visits to nearby Padas of Talasari for survey of livelihood in Padas. Street Play performances on the themes of Women Empowerment, Water Conservation and Plastic Free environment.
- 2015: Community work in slum areas of Govandi and Chembur in collaboration with Stree Mukti Sanghatana. Areas of focus included a survey on sexual harassment, eve teasing and gender discrimination; creativity sessions; and skills training in embroidery and jewelry making.

Other ventures to prepare students for good citizenship are as follows:

- 12 students were invited to present radio shows on the following topics:
- (1) Trends and Addiction (2) A discussion on Suburban Trains i. e. Western, Central and Harbour pertaining to problems and comforts of women and (3) A

story by Munshi Premchand in narration form. The broadcast of these two programs was on 15th November and 22nd November 2016 respectively under YUVANI Program of SAMVADITA Channel MW 287.3 meters i.e.1044 kHz

Students' council members actively participated in the "I vote for a Better India' (IVBI) campaign inter-collegiate competition called Vote-a-thon on 6th February 2015. The college received 1st prize for the category of under 1500.

The Gandhian Studies Centre conducts activities to create awareness about Gandhian thought and action, thereby promoting ideals of good citizenship, in association with Sarvodaya Mandal and Khadi Gram Udyog. Volunteers have participated in Swacha Bharath Abhiyan cleanliness drives.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movement/ activities which promote citizenship roles?

Extension activities are an integral component of the Home Science discipline. The institution promotes participation by students and faculty on a regular basis by conducting a number of activities in collaboration with welfare organizations such as Shradhanand Mahila Ashram (Matunga), Ashadeep Orphanage (Andheri), Manav Seva Sangh home for senior citizens (Sion)and Stree Mukti Sanghatana (Slum areas in Govandi and Chembur).

A calendar of extension activities is planned at the beginning of the semester. Mrs. Alka Pant has been appointed as faculty in-charge of coordinating extension activities by means of internship placements, fieldwork related to curriculum and voluntary extension activities.

The Human Development dept. ensures that students are placed in social outreach organizations for their internship and fieldwork, including mobile crèches in urban areas, and the Rural Development Centre at Talasari and rural balwadi centres in Lonavla and Wada. Their participation is monitored and evaluated by the department, and the feedback on the students 'participation is taken from organizations where they have been placed.

Activities of the NSS Unit are coordinated by four NSS Program officers. The NSS Calendar is planned at the beginning of the academic year and is in consonance with the calendar of the NSS unit of the University. The NSS program officers meet once a month every Monday with the Principal to discuss the plan of action and progress of work. The N.S.S unit organizes an orientation program at the beginning of the academic year to encourage students to volunteer for extension activities. Workshops are conducted to train students such as the annual street play and script writing workshop held on 1st August every year. All activities are reported on a quarterly basis. The sharing of experiences during special camp valedictory function, as well as during the NSS Annual day serves as an important feedback mechanism. Due recognition is given to NSS Volunteers by awarding certificates and the best N.S.S Volunteer



trophy.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performances and quality of the institution?

- a. Student-teacher evaluation is conducted at the end of every semester for theory and practical classes, on parameters like punctuality, discipline, innovative teaching aids used, percentage of interactive sessions conducted, explanation and understanding by the students, additional information beyond syllabus and teachers accessibility. The Principal confers with each teacher over areas of possible improvement.
- b. Final year students fill an exit form wherein they offer suggestions and feedback on the academic and student support mechanisms.
- c. Final year students submit an exit form to evaluate services provided by the library and its support staff.
- d. Student satisfaction feedback mechanism solicits responses from students in terms of infrastructure, administrative procedures and student support services.
- e. PTA meetings are held twice a year. This allows for interface between Principal, teachers and parents.
- f. Staff satisfaction engagement questionnaire is given to the teaching staff every alternate year. Teachers evaluate the institution on the basis of infrastructure provided, administrative functioning and interpersonal communication.
- g. Alumnae are members of the LMC of the BCA and M.Sc. sections, and also on the IQAC. Our alumnae are active on social media groups on Facebook and WhatsApp. Alumnae offer feedback when they are invited for guest lectures, PTA meets and annual alumnae meet.
- h. Potential employers (places of internship) return a feedback form on the employability quotient of students, on the basis of technical skills and soft skills. Industry experts who are invited as subject moderators for TY presentations also offer feedback on the performance of students from the perspective of employability.
- 3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

The budget for N.S.S. activities is prepared as per the guidelines from the government of Maharashtra and SNDTWU.

Impact on overall Development:

Students are encouraged to transfer skills they have imbibed from the college to the community. In time, they develop a sense of bonding with the community, and also a sense of responsibility to work towards the upliftment of the unprivileged. Students are taught to respect diversity and the values of secularism. They improve their communication skills, time management skills, problem solving skills, team work, leadership qualities, organization skills and analytical skills. Several of our alumnae have taken up careers with NGOs and continue to work with the community even after graduation.

3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

The NSS unit conducts an orientation at the beginning of the academic year to create awareness about its extension activities. Details of events are posted on the notice board and also circulated on social media. Regular announcements are made to invite student participation. Added incentives are participation certificates, deputing students for leadership and other such camps, and the best NSS Volunteer trophy that is given at the end of the academic year.

An extensive survey on household food consumption with emphasis on processed food was undertaken by students of M.Sc. Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics (II) in collaboration with Protein Foods and Nutrition Development Association of India (PFNDAI) in 2016. The survey was conducted keeping in mind the increasing impact of processed food on the nutritional status of youth viz. malnutrition/ under nutrition and obesity.

Broad objectives of extension activities:

- To create awareness about social issues especially related to women, health and hygiene
- To inculcate a humanistic outlook in students through community outreach programmes.

Outcomes:

- The institution has been able to organize at least 4 need based programs in a year in collaboration with different welfare organizations such as Shradhanand Mahila Ashram (Matunga), Ashadeep Orphanage (Andheri), Manav Seva Sangh home for senior citizens (Sion) and Stree Mukti Sanghatana (Slum areas in Govandi and Chembur).

3.7.6 Detail on the systematic efforts of the institution in planning establishing and implementing the initiatives of the linkages/collaborations.

The college explores every opportunity to build up a healthy rapport and establish linkages that will help us to achieve our mission statement of empowerment of women students through qualitative education initiatives. Linkages have been established through experts who have been invited to the college and expressed interest in possible projects. Faculty are members of professional bodies such as AFSTI and IDA, we have been able to set up collaborative ventures with companies such as Marico Industries through their networking efforts. The college put across the suggestion of a course on entrepreneurial skills to Carepox Corporate Services who were agreeable on the same and have taken the responsibility to support the entire course. Similarly, the Dept. of Human Development worked on a syllabus for a training program for Balwadi teachers on the request of Stree Mukti Sanghatana, a NGO with whom the NSS unit had a long association.

In the above cases, the concerned faculty draw up a proposal and shares it with the IQAC. The IQAC then takes the approval of the Management to implement the initiative. Review meetings are held on the functioning of the collaborations and reported to the Management during the Governing Council meetings. The Management has been extremely supportive in establishing and sustaining linkages.

CRITERION IV INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

- The following protocol is followed for procurement and enhancement of infrastructure. Concerned departments prepare a plan for requirements for infrastructure and/or equipment and present the same to the Principal, who then shares it with the Management. The Management sanctions funds after due evaluation/ scrutiny, in discussion with the Principal. Monitoring of implementation is done by the Principal and the respective Heads of Departments. For example, the Department of Resource Management submitted a plan to construct a hospitality management lab with restaurant set on the 6th floor in 2014. The lab was completed by 2015 and is being used for the subject of Food Beverages Services, and Basics of Food production. Similarly, HODs worked together in preparing a proposal for infrastructure requirements, under the UGC 12th plan.
- In 2014-2015, the IQAC worked on a proposal submitted to the UGC for enhancing facilities under the CPE scheme in consultation with all faculty members. The college has duly been sanctioned a grant of Rs. 1.5 Crore in May 2016. The IQAC will monitor the creation and enhancement of facilities once the amount has been received. These will include up gradation of labs and implementation of MIS system.
- Principal and 3 faculty members played an active role as part of a special committee which was formed by our Parent body SMES for submitting a proposal under CSR to SAS India Limited. SMES received a total grant of Rs. 20, 07000 (Sanctioned amount Rs.22 lakh) under CSR towards setting up technology enabled learning spaces on campus, of which Dr. BMN College installed 4 advanced SMART classrooms and 1 basic classrooms.
- Faculty of TSAD worked on a project to enhance infrastructure in the Textile Science and Apparel Design laboratories as suggested by the NAAC Peer team in their exit report in 2011. The Department received second prize for the presentation of their project on "Upgrading Infrastructure for Enhancing Skills'at the Best Educational Quality Enhancement Team (BEQET) competition organized by the National Centre for Quality Management (NCQM) (2014-2015).
- The institution has an annual maintenance contract to ensure effective maintenance of equipment. Infrastructure is maintained through services of carpenter, electrician, housekeeping staff and lab attendants.
- Staff who have received minor and major research grants have utilized grant resources to enhance learning resources through purchase of equipment such as laptops and printers.
- The college set up a UGC recognized Gandhian Studies Centre in 2013. The committee in charge of the center worked on a proposal for setting an aesthetically designed replica of the model of the Sevagram ashram at Wardha, the cost of which was borne by the Management.

 Institution has purchased required equipment with UGC additional grant of 2635200/-, under UGC 11th Plan.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

A. Curricular and co-curricular activities—classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories etc.

The following infrastructure facilities are available for Curricular and cocurricular activities:

i. Classrooms

There are a total of 28 well-furnished classrooms used by approximately 900 students, attending all the programs that we conduct. These include 9 large classrooms with a seating capacity of about 100 to 150 students. These classrooms are well ventilated and adaptable to the use of electronic teaching aids. Mike systems are installed to facilitate the teaching process. There are 11 medium classrooms with seating capacity of 60 students, and 8 small classrooms with seating capacity of 25 students.

ii. Technology enabled learning spaces:

Three large class rooms have been enabled with complete ICT facilities including Epson 595 Wi-fi interactive projector with white board, and Dell Inspiron 3542 laptops and CCTV surveillance.

An additional two classrooms have been ICT enabled with wall mounted LCD projectors with white board and Dell Inspiron 3542 Laptops and CCTV surveillance.

Faculty have been provided with laptops and mobile LCD projectors which they can use in the medium and smaller classrooms as and when required.

Computer lab 503 has been attached with Cybernetyx model 8090 and lab 502 with an interactive panel. The above facilities are Wi-Fi enabled.

iii. Seminar/ Conference rooms:

The seminar room is located on the 5th floor. It has a SMART board model 480 with SMART note book software with a short throw projector connected to desktop CPU. Faculty and students also have access to a well-equipped conference room with audio-visual facilities on the 3rd floor of the annex building.

National and State Level UGC Sponsored/NAAC sponsored Seminars and other such important programs are conducted in the air-conditioned Shri Visanji Ravji Auditorium, with a seating capacity of 282 persons. Ravji Jivraj Changdaiwala Hall has a seating capacity of 450 persons and is used for seminars, workshops, public lectures, endowment lectures and pool campus.

iv. Tutorial spaces:

8 small classrooms are available to conduct tutorial classes for subjects such as English and soft skills. Smaller classrooms are also used for SY and TY students for practical work for their specializations.

Prangan Experimental nursery is the experimental laboratory of the Human Development department. It is located on the ground floor, with the latest of play equipment for children in the adjoining area like water play centre

The Gymnasium (Physical Fitness Centre) is located on the 9th floor. It is used to conduct practical sessions of the postgraduate diploma course in Sports Science Fitness and Nutrition, and Career Oriented Program in Physical Fitness and Weight Management

The Beauty Parlour on the 6th Floor is used for training students of Beauty Culture and Hair Dressing Certificate/Diploma Programs as well as Career Oriented Program in Beauty Culture

The Hospitality lab on the 6th floor with Restaurant Set Up and one Housekeeping Lab is used by students of Hospitality Management under specialization of Resource Management.

4 Computer laboratories on the 5th floor with total of 115 computers, one lab on 6th floor with 22 computers and one hardware lab on the 7th floor with 18 computers. The labs are used to conduct practical sessions for students of BCA, and 100 hours computer training to Home Science students.

Spacious, well ventilated and well lit reading hall on the 8th floor which can accommodate 80 students. The library also has an internet section with 5 computers. The reference section and main library can seat an additional 20 students. There is a separate reading room with a computer for teachers. The students also have access to an additional reading room of the library of sister institute Smt. MMP Shah Women's College of Arts and Commerce, which is also on our campus.

Gandhian Studies Centre: There is a special designated corner on the 8th floor for the Gandhian Studies Centre wherein books on, and by Gandhiji are displayed. It has been aesthetically designed so as to replicate the model of the Sevagram ashram at Wardha and has a conducive ambience for meditation and quiet study.

Audio Visual Recording Studio: Students have access to a fully equipped recording studio with mixing consoles on the ground floor of our sister college of Smt. MMP Shah College of Arts and Commerce.

B. The following infrastructure facilities are available for co-curricular activities:

The college hall with a seating capacity of 450 persons is used to host a number of cultural activities such as orientation sessions for First year students, Fresher's Meet, 'Akanksha Inter-Collegiate Festival', 'Tekzone' intercollegiate IT festival, 'Balmela', College biennial exhibition, fashion show, and other important cultural events. The NSS unit conducts blood donation camps in the hall. Other important events that are hosted in the hall are PTA meetings, alumnae meetings, Pool Campus and Smt. Dakshaben Pathak Memorial Endowment Lecture Series.

The air-conditioned auditorium has a seating capacity of 282 persons has built-in LCD facilities and is used for cultural events such as dance, music, theatre performances, and film festivals. Other important events that are hosted in the hall are PTA meetings, Alumnae meetings, Pool Campus and Smt. Dakshaben Pathak Memorial Endowment Lecture Series. We also use the foyer of our sister institute Smt. MMP Shah College of Arts and Commerce for functions such as Independence Day, Republic Day and summer vacation classes exhibition

Activity space on 9th Floor: Student activities such as socials practice for cultural events, Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan Lectures, NSS Events, activity oriented workshop sessions, and yoga and self-defense for students are conducted here.

Students have access to **5 computer laboratories** for work related to the students' council, Inter-collegiate college festivals of 'Akanksha' and 'Tekzone', Green Spirit Association and college magazine.

There is an additional space at the entrance to the college which is used for exhibitions and entrepreneurship stalls wherein students can display their work and also sell the same as part of entrepreneurship projects.

The **Counseling cell** is located on the fourth floor and is open for six days a week to facilitate free counseling services for staff and students by a trained full time counselor.

The **health centre** is located on the 8th floor of Vasantben Vadilal Shah Vidya Bhavan, and is located as part of the SMES Nursing College. The college has signed a MOU with the SMES Nursing College for use of the facilities of the health centre. Dr. Chandralekha Venkateshan is a doctor on campus at 2nd floor counselor's room (Samavedna Centre) at Smt. M.M.P. Shah College of Arts and Commerce

The college has a small garden (**BMN Katta**) which is maintained by the NSS unit.

The following infrastructure facilities are available for sports

Gym (Physical Fitness Centre):

The college offers gym facilities for all students available at a very nominal charge of Rs. 250/- a year. An experienced gym instructor is employed by the college to oversee student participation.

The college makes special efforts to ensure that those students who are interested in games such as basketball, badminton, chess and kabaddi get the opportunity to attend coaching camps organized by the SNDT Women's University. The Management also signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Amulakh Amichand School so that students also have access to the school's sports ground adjoining the campus. Students also have access to the adjunct grounds of the GSB Seva Mandal Sports Club to conduct annual sports meet of the college. The college also has access to the foyer of our sister college MMP Shah to conduct activities like karate.

NSS Unit: There is designated space for NSS group meetings on the 4th floor.

C. Other infrastructure/ equipment facilities available are as follows:

- **President's room** for meetings with Management members and eminent visitors to the institution
- Administrative Area on ground floor which includes Principal's room, Vice-Principal's and Office Superintendent's room, Administrative office, Finance Section, and Visitors room.
- **A spacious Staff Room** on the 4th floor equipped with lockers for staff members, a microwave, fridge, Wi-Fi facility, a computer and a laser printer as well as separate washroom facilities. Staff room for BCA on the 5th floor has two computers, printer, scanner, microwave and fridge.
- **Examination Room** on the 4th floor. The area is equipped with a computer, printer, photocopy machine and a cyclostyle machine. There are secure spaces for examination question papers, and answer booklets so as to conduct fair practices during the examinations. The cell is under CCTV camera surveillance.
- A documentation centre for administrative work is also located on the 4th floor for all important records related to the administrative section
- **IQAC cell:** IQAC cell is located on the 8th floor and also serves as a documentation centre for all IQAC records.
- Canteen facilities on the ground floor with seating arrangement for staff and students.



- 4 lifts as well as a ramp at the entrance of the college, and a toilet for specially challenged students on the ground floor
- Washrooms facilities (female and male toilets) are available on every floor
- Safe drinking water through provision of Aqua guard filters and 8 water coolers
- There are a total of **40 fire extinguishers** with at least one on each floor and one in each lab and **50 CCTV cameras for security surveillance** of the entire institution. (For details please refer to 4.1.2)
- Sanitary Napkin Vending machine is available in the students' common room.
- 4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? The college is open for the various courses from 8.00 am to 6.00 pm from Monday to Saturday. This facilitates accommodating the courses of the Junior College, Degree and Postgraduate Departments and the SCNI Polytechnic, conducted by the Seva Mandal Education Society. The timetable is planned in a staggered fashion, thus allowing optimum utilization of rooms and facilities.

There are two divisions for the BCA program, which works in shifts (first division from 8.20 a.m. to 2.40 p.m. and second division from 10.00 a.m. to 4.00p.m). Classrooms are used for MCA program of IGNOU on Saturdays (1.00 p.m. to 7.00 p.m.) and Sundays (9.00 p.m. to 7.00 p.m.) The food lab/Biochemistry lab/ Microbiology Lab are used for conducting M.Sc. in Dietetics and Food Service Management under the IGNOU program. During the Summer vacation in May, the classrooms and the labs are used for conducting skill development classes (hobby classes) as part of a community courses initiative.

In addition, the college management generates additional income to enhance facilities for students on campus, by optimal use of the following infrastructure when classes are not in session:

- Renting out the college hall and auditorium for marriages and other social functions
- Renting out classroom during vacation periods for conducting mock exams by coaching classes such as Mahesh Tutorials
- Using the beauty parlor as a means of generating additional income
- Renting premises for conducting competitive exams such as C.A & CPT.
- Renting premises for conducting exams by 'Better Fitness for You'(BFY)
- Renting Prangan experimental nursery for dance classes conducted by Brian Dance Academy after college hours
- Renting premise for classes conducted by ITM (Institute for Technology & Management) up to Nov 2013. From 2013, the premises are used by Digital

Marketing & Training Institute (Binary Edge Education & Research Services Pvt. Ltd.) on Saturdays & Sundays.

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet there requirements of students with physical disabilities?

- There are ramps at both entries to the college allowing easy access to 4 lifts
- There is a toilet for specially challenged students on the ground floor

4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them:

The college does not have a residential facility. The college is located in the suburb of Matunga in Central Mumbai and is easily accessible by local train and bus facilities.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

On Campus:

Dr. Chandralekha Venkateshan (Consulting Physician) has been appointed by SMES and is available on the 2nd floor, counselor's room (Samavedna Centre) of Smt. M.M.P. Shah College of Arts and Commerce every Tuesday and Friday for free medical consultancy.

The institute has signed a MOU with the SMES College of Nursing which is also on campus. Students can avail of health care facilities which include a wheelchair, three beds and equipment such as stethoscope and BP monitoring equipment. There is also provision of two beds (in the common room and in the staffrooms) for students and staff who feel unwell, and require to rest. Faculty members of the nursing department are called upon to administer basic first-aid during emergencies. First aid kits are also available in the labs, staffroom and administrative office.

The NSS Unit conducts regular dental, eye and hemoglobin checkups. Camps have also been conducted for cancer, and thalassemia detection, and rubella vaccination in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Bombay Uptown, Inner Wheel club of Bombay Downtown and Lion's Club of Sion. A comprehensive health assessment checkup, as well as cancer detection and mammography camp was organized for teaching and non-teaching staff in collaboration with Dabhar Foundation on 13th June 2015.

The Smt. Dakshaben Pathak Memorial Lecture Series was especially initiated on the theme of 'Women and Health'in 2008. For the last eight years, an annual endowment public lecture is organized by eminent doctors on topics such as prevention of cancer, osteoporosis, diabetes, stoma care, anemia, menopause and cardiac diseases.

The Department of Food Science and Nutrition conducts regular programs on nutrition counseling and events such as Nutrition Week, Breast feeding week, Cancer Awareness week and Diabetics awareness day.

In order to cater to the mental well-being of students, a professional trained counselor is available on the premises for personal counseling every day from Monday to Saturday. Teachers also act as mentors and help students to overcome their anxieties. They refer students to the counselor/doctor as per their need.

Off the Campus:

There is a doctor (Dr. Sabnis) on call in the vicinity of the college, who has been called upon in case of emergencies. The Management also has ties with the Tarachand Bapa hospital and Lokamanya Tilak Municipal Hospital in the vicinity, wherein students can be attended to, in case of an emergency.

- 4.1.7 Give details of the Common Facilities available on the campusspaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counselling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.
- a) IQAC and Documentation cell is located on the eighth floor and also serves as a documentation center for all IQAC records. The center is equipped with a cupboard, table and chairs to conduct meetings, cupboard, a computer and printer with internet facilities. A documentation centre is also located on the 4th floor for all important records related to the administrative section
- **b)** The college canteen caters to the requirements of the staff and students. It provides a range of food items at affordable rates to students. The canteen has a separate seating area for the staff members. The faculty also has the facility of microwave ovens donated by our Alumna, in the common staff room, as well as the BCA staff room. A microwave is also placed in the administrative office. Both staff rooms also have the facility of fridges.
- c) Recreational facilities: The college has a spacious hall, which is used for cultural events and annual functions. Special functions such as Annual day, dance, music competitions/ fashion shows, College Fest and Intercollegiate festivals are organized here
 - An open space is also available on the 9th floor for activities such as yoga and dance rehearsal socials. The college has a MOU with the Amulakh Amichand School for use of the adjoining sports ground.
- **d) Seminar Room:** Workshops, film screenings are arranged in the seminar room located on the 5th floor. The room has air condition and is equipped with Wi-Fi enabled interactive smart board, projector, laptop and audio systems. (Placement Cell) Faculty and students also have access to a conference room with Wi-Fi, projector, and audio system on the 3rd floor of the Vasantben Vadilala Vidya Bhavan
- **e) Students Common Room** is on the 2nd floor of the Vasantben Vadilala Vidya Bhavan. It has facilities of lockers, tables and chairs. This space is



utilized by the students for practice sessions for cultural events and small workshops. Facilities for playing chess and carom are available. Students have access to a vending machine for sanitary napkins. One bed is also available.

f) Sports and Games: Gym facilities are available to all students on campus for a very nominal fee of Rs 250 per year. The sports committee conducts trekking camps every year in collaboration with SNDTWU. Special arrangements are made to send students for coaching camps at the University for games like badminton and basketball. The college appoints special sports coaches to train the students who are selected to participate in the intercollegiate, interuniversity, district, interstate & national sport championships. For further details please refer to 5.1.6.

The college motivates and trains students to participate in yoga and PT displays at University level. Ms. Vandana Saha has been appointed as the college sports teacher. Mr. Mahesh Navale has also been appointed by SMES for training the students in Karate and self-defense techniques. Nonteaching staff also participate in intercollegiate sports like volleyball and cricket. The Management bears 50% of the cost for self-defense classes

- **g) Shri. Visanji Ravji Auditorium (basement)** with the latest audio-visual equipment is also available for film screenings and conducting music and dance performances.
- h) Ravji Jivraj Changdaiwala Hall on the ground floor has a seating capacity of 450 persons and is used for public lectures, PTA meetings, seminars and endowment lectures.
- i) Counselling and Career Guidance Cell ('Mind Space'): A professional counselor is available on the premises for personal counseling on all week days. From 9.00am 3.00 pm on the 4th floor. She also conducts sessions for students of all classes on need based topics such as time management, interpersonal relationships, stress management and preparation for exams for the student.

Apart from the above permanent members, the library committee also includes at least 2 student representatives each from the B.Sc. BCA and M.Sc. programs.

The function of the Library Advisory Committee is to support the functioning of the library and to facilitate development of infrastructure, support services and holdings of the library the committee formulates policies regarding procurement of books and journals

The following initiatives have been taken on recommendations of the committee:

- The number of days for which books can be issued has been increased from 3 days to 7 days.
- A separate server for the Library was made available so as to put its OPAC online on the college website (http://bmncollege.com/library.aspx). The college library's OPAC can be viewed online during college hours at http://27.106.65.244/W27/.
- Initially, open access was given to postgraduate students. On recommendation from the committee, it was further extended to final year B.Sc. and BCA students. From 2014, scholar card holders also have open access, once a week.
- On request from student members, the management sanctioned 5 computer terminals with internet access for use in the library. Students can work on their projects on the 5 terminals in the college, or on Wi-Fi enabled laptops within the library.
- The library has initiated a book club in collaboration with the English Department and has published a special catalogue of available fiction.
- On recommendation by the IQAC, , a library Audit was conducted on 25th August 2016 by Dr. Sachin Vaidya (Librarian of SVT College of Home Science) and Mr. Paritosh Pawar (Librarian KET's V.G. Vaze College of Arts, Commerce and Science). The audit has put forward the following recommendations:
 - a. Purchase and use of serial's control package
 - b. Dedicated area for handicapped
 - c. Provision of photocopying facility
 - d. Maintenance of institutional repository

4.2.3 How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, print and e-journals and other reading materials? Specify the amount spent on procuring new books, journals and e-resources during the last four years.

Grants from UGC and support from management are the main sources for purchasing reading material. Books are also donated by well-wishers and staff members. The amount sanctioned annually for books and journals is approximately Rs. 3 lakhs, excluding the funding from UGC XII Plan. The budget allocation is done by the librarian, based on number of students in the program, changes in the curriculum and requests of Heads of Departments. As a policy, a request of a minimum of 15% discount is made to the vendors / publisher. A budget is prepared at the beginning of academic year based on the previous academic year, and taking into account the fees collected from students.

Our library staff member browse through catalogues to identify current titles available for subjects offered. Details of these are communicated to concerned faculty, thereby ensuring purchase of current titles. They also circulate catalogues, and from books on approval, supplied by publishers/distributors. Faculty members and Heads of Departments are consulted for selection and approval of books and other reading materials. Faculties also have the option of requesting the library to purchase the book via online orders and through cash on delivery through websites such as amazon.in and flipkart.com. The library arranges an annual book exhibition on campus. Faculty members are allowed to buy books related to their subject area during educational visits. The list of subscribed journals periodicals is circulated among the staff members. Faculty can recommend the books to be procured for their courses and research. Students can also recommend the books for procurement provided their recommendation is endorsed by a faculty member. Older editions of the books are replaced with latest and updated editions as per the need. Efforts are made to purchase prescribed titles before a new course is introduced and when curriculum is revised.

A list of the title newly arrived books is displayed on the library notice board and the staff room. New books are also displayed in the special showcases in the library. Teachers are also informed about the arrival of books via approval emails. A subject-wise list of new books is prepared and given to respective depts. A list of new arrivals is also available through OPAC which has the facility to provide bibliographic listings. Staff and students are guided on how to use OPAC and can therefore access current titles. Information about library facility and services is given in orientation sessions arranged for first year undergraduate and postgraduate entrants in July every year. A special orientation is provided for final year students to access the databases obtained through INFLIBNET, American Library & SNDTWU consortium.

 prepared every year and given to respective Depts. on demand; The OPAC
 has facility to provide bibliographic listings. Staff and students are given
 training on how to prepare a bibliography through OPAC
- **In-house/remote access to e-resources**: Access to e-resources are available through library webpage in the college webpage.
- User Orientation and awareness: Information about library facility and services is given in the general library orientation. Separate orientation sessions are arranged for first year undergraduate and postgraduate entrants in July every year. Special orientation is provided for students to access the databases obtained through INFLIBNET, American Library & SNDTWU Consortium.
- Assistance in searching Databases: Sessions are conducted for students on database searching strategies and preparation of bibliography.
- **INFLIBNET/ IUC facilities**: The college has subscribed to the N-LIST of Inflibnet. The passwords are provided to staff and PG students. Undergraduate students are assisted by the librarian to do the searches.
- **Guest Membership**: Library offers guest membership facility for a nominal fee
- **Institutional Membership**: Library has guest membership with American Centre Library, and AVEHI.

4.2.7 Enumerate on the support provided by the Library staff to the students and teachers of the college.

- A general orientation on library facilities organized for all first year undergraduate students & post graduate students at the beginning of every academic year. A detailed library orientation programme is also organized for under & postgraduate students for use of databases subscribed through N-LIST of INFLIBNET & SNDTWU Consortium
- Booklet on available library services
- Access to library collection is provided through card and computerized catalogue OPAC. Open access facility is also provided to staff. Final year students, scholar card holders and post graduate students have open access once a week.



- Book Issuing Facility:
 - ➤ Home issuing Facility –Undergraduate students can issue two books for a week. Journals and magazines are for in-house use.
 - > Scholar Card holders can issue an additional book for 1 week
 - ➤ Postgraduate students get 4 library cards (2 reference, 1 fiction and 1 periodical)
 - ➤ Staff members can issue up to 15 books per semester, which can be renewed at the end of the semester
 - > Renewing, reservation and current reading facilities are available.
 - Fiction card can be extended by an extra week for members of the book club
- Current Awareness Services:
 - ➤ Putting up of clippings of important current news and events on the notice board.
 - Display of new arrivals and latest issues of periodicals and newspapers in English and regional languages
 - ➤ Theme based displays and subject displays
- Reference and Referral Services:
 - > Reference service to our members whenever required
 - ➤ Library services to outsiders, IGNOU students, staff members and students of other colleges.
 - Assistance to staff in research work and to students for project work
- Reprography service is available on demand. Free of charge Internet surfing facility is available through internet centre. Wi-Fi facility is also available to all users.
- An annual book exhibition is held on campus
- Books are made available through Inter Library Loan facility from SNDTWU and Smt. MMP Shah College
- Book-bank facility is extended to needy students. Under this scheme approx. 100 students are provided with a set of textbooks for one academic year on payment of nominal refundable deposit of 25% of cost of the books.
- Library has designed virtual library page links to external reference sources.
- Library subscribes to N-LIST, American Centre and SNDTWU databases
- In collaboration with the English Department the library conducts a book club. A list of fiction, Classics, Indian Writing in English and translated works is made. Book club members should read 3-4 books in a year. And write a review/make a presentation on the same. The library also conducts talks on the importance of reading. The library arranges for films shows on films based on novels like *Junoon and Blue Umbrella Namesake*.
- In collaboration with Gandhian studies centre, the library conducts the Gandhi exam in association with the Sarvodaya Mandal. Quotes by Gandhiji, books by and on Gandhiji are displayed. The Gandhian Study Centre is in a section of the Library.
- Visits have been organized to the American library and Money Museum of Reserve Bank.

4.2.8 What are the special facilities offered by the library to the visually/physically challenged persons? Give details.

Ms. Rabab Chobawalla FY B.Sc. (2016-17) has a congenital condition called



Nystagmus in both her eyes. This prevents fixation like a normal eye. She has been provided with an enlarged photocopy of English text book. She has also been provided with a kindle, downloaded with fiction books and other matter related to her academics.

4.2.9 Does the library get the feedback from its users? If yes, how is it analyzed and used for improving the library services. (What strategies are deployed by the Library to collect feedback from users? How is the feedback analyzed and used for further improvement of the library services?)

Students'feedback is obtained across the counter through interaction between library staff and students, and also from class representatives, teachers and members of library committee.

Library has a feedback form for final year students. The results are analyzed and reported in the Library Committee. Follow up has been done on the basis of feedback such as extension of timings; extended duration of days of issue and open access facilities. Library feedback is also obtained during library committee meetings wherein students and staff share observations regarding library services.

Some of the suggestions which have been implemented are:

- Extending open access to TY students and students with scholars cards
- Increase in the issue of scholars card from 2 students to 5 students
- Increase in the number of days of issue for teachers from one month to one semester
- Increase in the number of days of issue for reference books from 3 days to one week
- Inclusion of two student members from PG courses in the library committee.
- Barcoding of books for circulation purposes

4.3.2 Details of computer and internet facility made available to the faculty and students on the campus and off-campus?

- 5 SMART classrooms have been enabled with complete ICT facilities (i.e. 1 basic and 4 advance classrooms)
- An exclusive internet corner "Browse- IT" with 8 computers is available on the 5th floor. This facility is availed from 7.30 a.m. to 6.30 p.m.
- All computer labs are well equipped internet connection. Printing facility is available for BCA students for academic projects and assignments
- B.Sc. staff room is provided with Wi-Fi facility, a desktop, laser printer and scanner
- BCA staff room is provided with internet connection and Wi-Fi facilities, 2 desktops, laser printer and scanner.
- Internet facilities are available for online admission processes, and online application for scholarships.
- An interactive panel and 3 Ipads are available for enhancing ICT teaching.
- Seminar room is equipped with computer, LCD Projector and internet connection for conducting workshops and seminars for staff and students. It also has an interactive board.
- Each department is provided with a laptop having Wi-Fi connectivity and a mobile LCD projector.
- The college library is equipped with five computers with internet



- connectivity for students and staff, and is Wi-Fi enabled
- The college has purchased a 'wireless presentation system' for seminars, workshops, guest lectures and placement sessions.
- A hardware Lab has been established to train students in computer hardware. There are 18 computers in the lab.
- 2 stand-alone screens have been provided for students and staff conducting seminars and workshops in the class rooms.
- Internet and computer facilities are used by the examination section for downloading University question papers

4.3.3 What are the Institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

The NAAC Peer team had suggested that the college should introduce SMART classrooms. As a follow up, a proposal was submitted under CSR to SAS Ltd by our Parent body SMES. The college has benefited from the CSR grant and has 1 basic and 4 advanced SMART classrooms. The Dept. of Computer Applications plays a proactive role in up gradation of computer software and hardware in the college, and in providing required expertise on campus. Training programs on the use of ICT and SMART Technology have been conducted for staff, as also in how to upload relevant information onto the website.

4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/learning materials by its staff and students?

Students:

- Students have access to 138 computers in 5 labs. They also have access to 8 computers in the internet corner on the 5th floor and 5 computers in the library.
- Students have access to computers to complete their project work and they are guided in how to make effective PPTs for seminar presentations.
- 100 hours computer training is compulsory for all three years of the Home Science program. The syllabus caters to the specific needs of the students in terms of their course work.
- Orientations are conducted by the library to guide students on how to use databases and e-journals. High speed Internet and Wi-Fi facilitates online referencing
- BCA students submit projects through online.



• Software which is required for the curriculum for BCA courses as well as for CAD have been installed in the labs.

Faculty:

- Workshops have been organized for faculty on the use of ICT for teaching
 –learning processes.
 - ➤ Dr. Jayashree Shinde (Head, Dept., of Educational Technology, SNDTWU) conducted an interactive workshop on ICT Teaching
 - ➤ Training Techniques on 11th August 2011. 35 staff members attended the session. Dr. Shinde highlighted various e- learning tools such as portals, web pages and virtual classrooms.
 - ➤ Mr. Shahajahan Khan (Coordinator, Dept. of Computer Applications) conducted an in-house training program on use of Microsoft Excel from 06.08.2012 to 09.08.2012.
 - ➤ 35 faculty members attended a 7 day training program conducted by Dept. of Educational Technology, SNDTWU in collaboration with the Commonwealth Association, Canada, from 15th to 20th April 2013, on Integrating ICT in Higher Education
 - ➤ Mr. Abdul Rahman (faculty, BCA) oriented staff members on 'Knowing the BMN Website' on 6th August 2013.
 - ➤ Mr. Shahajahan Khan conducted a session for BCA staff on 'Learning Graphics with CorelDraw' on 07.08.2013 and 08.08.2013 and Mr. Abdul Rahman conducted a session on Hypertext Pre-processor for BCA staff members from 14.10.2013 to 18.10.2013
 - ➤ Librarian Mrs. Vidya Subramanian conducted a session on 'Use of ICT for Research' on 1st August, 2014
 - ➤ A workshop on ICT for teaching and learning was conducted for teaching staff in 4th April, 2016 by Dr. Geeta Thakur (Faculty, Dept. of Education, Pillai College of Education and research). Teachers were oriented on how to use ICT teaching aids such as Poster 4 teachers, learnboost and engrade
- Every department has been provided with at least 1 LCD projector and 1 laptop so as to enable effective teaching learning process. (There are a total of 18 laptops, 18 LCD Projectors & 26 Printers available for use). Classrooms as well as the staff room are Wi-Fi enabled.
- Staff members are computer literate and all documentation and report writing are done by the staff members themselves.
- Faculty have the provision of access to institutional email accounts as well as passwords to the website if they wish to upload any material.
- Computer technicians are available for the entire day for assistance for any technical problems
- 4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching-learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student that the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.



Our parent body (Seva Mandal Education Society) received a CSR (Corporate Social Responsibility) funding towards setting up of 12 SMART classrooms on campus in 2015-2016. Our institute has 5 classrooms (i.e. 4 classrooms equipped with advanced SMART technology and 1 classroom with basic SMART technology facilities) which are available for use by all departments upon requests. Departments are also provided with laptops and projectors (roaming units) and access to Wi-Fi. The seminar room on the 5th is also equipped with a SMART interactive board with projector and laptop with Wi-Fi connectivity. Students have access to 130 computers in 5 well equipped computer labs. Students also have access to 5 internet terminals in the library as well as 8 terminals in the internet lab for self-paced learning and preparing projects and presentations. Increasingly, faculty are using M –communication to enable learning among students who are in possession of SMART phones. The library subscribes to data bases such as N-LIST (INFLIBNET) and has institutional membership with American Library which allows access to a huge data base of journals and e-material. Faculty draw upon e-resources for preparation of teaching material, and use you-tube animation videos and other documentaries to explain complex theoretical concepts. Teachers and students have formed groups on social networking wherein hyperlinks, e-books, articles, slide share and YouTube links are shared. Our faculty is constantly adopting new and innovative approaches to enhance the learning processes of students including the use of ICT enabled software such as slide share, animoto, learnboost and poster4.teachers.org. The provision of LCD screens also facilities the screening of films especially for subjects such as English communication skills, Women's Studies, Media skills and Environmental studies.

5.1.2 Specify the type, number and amount of institutional scholarships/freeships given to the students during the last four years and whether the financial aid was available and disbursed on time?

- The committee in charge of freeships, monitors allotment of freeships and disbursal of financial aid as per the procedures outlined by the committee. Students are chosen on the basis of financial status of family, academic sincerity and attendance. 456 students have been given freeships from the Students Welfare fund for the total amount of Rs 1,872,976 in the last five years. Needy students are also allowed to pay fees on installment basis.
- Faculty members also provided financial assistance to students and also coordinate with alumina to help support the education of needy students.
- The Department of Food Science and Nutrition has established linkages with Protein Food Nutrition Association of India (PFNADI) and Association of Food Scientists and Technologists of India (AFSTI) wherein financial scholarships are given to deserving students every year. 3 Students have received scholarships from Bombay Community Public Trust in 2016.
- The BCA Dept. conducts an annual E-waste college drive and the amount collected is used towards fees for needy students.

They are also helped in opening bank accounts. A designated staff in the administrative office (Mrs. Kavita Kasar) does the necessary follow-up to ensure that students receive the same from Social Welfare Office. Continuous efforts are made by the staff to reach out to maximum number of eligible students.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for

a. Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections:

- The admission committee counsels students on the availability of freeships. Government norms are followed at the time of admission.
- Guidance is provided on how to apply for Government student welfare freeship schemes. Peer-assistance by senior students is provided in the college computer lab to complete the online application process.
- Students from economically weaker sections of society have the provision to pay in installments.
- Book bank facility is given to needy students by the college at a nominal charge of 25% of cost of the books.
- Notebooks are donated to needy students by well-wishers, such as the Lions Club of Sion.
- Faculty and alumnae contribute towards fees for needy students
- The mentoring committee guides students on personal and academic issues

b. Students with physical disabilities:

- There is a facility of ramps at entrances, which allows students to access the lifts with ease. There is a toilet for disabled students on the ground floor.
- Arrangements are made for partially visually impaired student to sit in a well-lit area to facilitate writing of exam papers.
- A student with a tremor in her hand, as well as slow learners, are given extra time during exams. A writer is provided if needed.
- Students are especially encouraged to participate in extra and co-curricular activities to enhance their self-esteem.

c. Participation in intercollegiate, state, national, international competitions

- College appoints coaches to train talented students in events such as theatre, music, folk dance and sports. Costs for dance costumes and props are borne by the college.
- College ensures that students are given incentive marks allotted by the SNDTWU for participation at university, zonal and state level competitions.
- Participants are given attendance when they represent the Institution in any activity. Faculty conduct extra classes for the portions that they have missed.
- Sports teacher accompanies students to ensure security on trips outside Mumbai.
- The importance of participation is emphasized during PTA. Faculty counsel reluctant parents to allow their talented wards to participate.
- Student achievements are mentioned prominently in the college magazine
- Management members personally congratulate prize winners during the office bearers meetings and Governing council meetings.
- Students are encouraged to participate in undergraduate research competitions and also to attend national and international level seminars. Monitory support is provided towards registration fees.
- Students who have participated at intercollegiate level are allowed to submit assignments, and give exams, at a later date.



 Winners of various events with the trophies are taken to different classes to motivate their fellow students. They are also felicitated during important functions. Names of student winners are displayed on notice boards prominently

d. Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

- The college has signed a MOU with the SMES Nursing College for use of the facilities of the health centre. The health centre is located on the 8th floor of the annex building.
- Dr. Chandralekha Venkateshan (MBBS. Retd Chief Medical Officer MCGM) has been appointed by the SMES management for all students and staff on campus and is available twice a week for consultancy on the second floor of our sister college Smt. MMP Shah college.
- First aid kits are available in the labs, staffroom and administrative office.
- The Management has ties with the Lion Tarachand Bapa hospital, and Lokamanya Tilak Municipal Hospital at Sion, for emergency cases.
- The NSS Unit, in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Bombay Uptown, Inner Wheel Club and Rotary Club of Bombay Downtown and Lion's Club of Sion, organizes regular eye, dental and health checkup camps as well as detection camps for anemia and thalassemia, mammography tests and cancer detection has been conducted in collaboration with N.K. Dabhar Foundation.
- The Smt. Dakshaben Pathak Memorial Endowment Lecture Series has been initiated on the theme of 'Women and Health'by Hon Secretary of SMES Dr. Bharat Pathak. Lectures by eminent doctors have been arranged on topics such as prevention of cardiac related problems, cancer, osteoporosis, diabetes, stoma care, anemia and menopause.
- The Department of Food Science and Nutrition conducts programs on nutrition counseling and awareness events during 'Nutrition Week'and 'Breast feeding week'.

• The students of the college are covered for medical insurance through the Oriental Insurance Company.

- The college signed a MOU with SEED Info tech on 26th August 2015 wherein SEED Infotech conducts aptitude training for students of BCA. They also provide training for IT competitive exams on a regular basis.
- Students are trained on how to write an effective resume, and how to prepare for personal interviews and group discussions, as part of the soft skills value added course.

f. Skill development:

Language skills and soft skills.

About 25 % of our students have studied in vernacular medium at school level. Remedial English classes are conducted thrice a week by a qualified faculty (Dr. Chinmai More) in order to enable to develop their written and verbal competency.

- Students are encouraged to participate in dramatization as well as take part in reading events such as the 'Pratham' annual reading event.
- Students are encouraged to join the book club which is conducted by the English department and the library.
- A special workbook to enhance vocabulary in English has been compiled by Mrs. Usha Kumar, faculty of the BCA section.
- Value added course in Soft Skills trains students in the necessary soft skills required for global competencies in today's job market.
 Workshops on communication skills and presentation skills have been incorporated into the personality development and soft skills module, which is offered to all students of the Home Science and BCA sections.

ii. Hunar se Rozgar/ Skills development for hospitality industry

The Department of Resource Management offers a unique skills development opportunity under the Government of India scheme 'Hunar se Rozgar.'Third year students are sent to hotels for 6/8 weeks in housekeeping and services / production departments. Similarly second year students attend a one week workshop at Garware Institute of Career Development, Mumbai University. This workshop gives students a hands on experience of using Galileo software which facilitates online visa applications.

A unique restaurant set up has been provided for the Resource Management Department as part of the hospitality lab. The facility is used to train students on skills as part of the Food and Beverage Services, and Basics of Food Production subjects. The lab is planned as a proper restaurant setting with formal sitting arrangements with required cutlery and crockery. Students manage a restaurant setup wherein they serve food on a specific theme such as 'Desi Tadka', 'Canacona'and 'Bon Appetite'.

iii. Skills related to Textiles and Apparel Design

Faculty and students of the TSAD Department conducted a training program in collaboration with the Dept. of Fiber and Textile Processing Technology, (Institute of Chemical Technology, Mumbai) for the marginalized section of society. Students were involved in imparting skill training in fabric painting, embroidery, basic stiches and also application of the same on garments and articles to increase the value of the product – in the process of which they honed their own skills in these areas.

Every year, Mr. Aidtya Kadam (Partner, Avdhoot) conducts a workshop on screen making and printing

Sessions on skill development in basic fashion design illustration are conducted by alumnae who have completed an advanced course in the same.

iv. Computer based skills

- BCA section offers value added courses to train students in the latest in software and hardware.
- All students of the B.Sc. program undergo a mandatory 100 hours training in computer skills.

v. Innovative Food product development:

Creative skills and scientific thinking of students of Food Science and Nutrition, as well as M.Sc. CND, are honed in developing innovative food products to address contemporary life style diet disorders. This is done through an incubation cell (Guru-gyan) in collaboration with AFST (I), Mumbai Chapter

vi. Students of the COP in Event Management get training in how to organize major events. The college has been sending students to work in the annual international event 'India Leadership Forum'organised by NASSCOM for the last four years. They are trained for different roles on the pre-event day, and allotted duties at the registration desk, media and speakers' counters. Students have received remuneration for their effort. Similarly students of COP in Beauty Culture and Hair dressing and Physical Fitness and Weight Management are given hands on experience wherein they acquire the required employability skills.



vii. Students of Department of Human Development are involved in organising an annual theme based funfair for children called 'Bal mela'. Students are trained in management and organizational skills and they learn to plan, implement, exercise and evaluate activities, thus putting their theoretical knowledge into practical experience.

g. Support for "slow learners"

Slow learners are identified through the help of class teachers and subject teachers at first year level. Dyslexic students with learning disabilities submit a certificate to the class teacher who shares this information with other subject teaches and the college counselor. The institution has admitted on an average 2 -3 students from National Institute of Opening Schooling (NIOS) per year, and takes care in mentoring their performance. Parents are also invited for discussion of their wards'performance. The mentor of the concerned student is involved in the discussion. Students with learning problems are guided with sensitivity for project work, and are given extra time during examinations as per SNDT Women's University guidelines. Instructions are explained at an individual level where required.

h. Exposure of students to other institution of higher learning/corporate/business house etc.

Internship is an integral part of the program and students are sent to NGOs, corporate and business houses for their internship program Students undergo 4 to 8 weeks internship in corporate houses (depending upon their specialization), NGOs, food industry, hospitals, hospitality industry and nursery schools. After completion of the program, students present their reports which are evaluated by a jury of experts from the industry/ organizations related to the respective specializations.

Students are taken for field visits and study tours to give them first hand exposure to the functioning of the workplace:

5. 1.5 Entrepreneurial skills

- 'Kshrujan'is a unique entrepreneurial program initiated by Ms. Dipti Shah, Director, Neoteric Informatique Ltd. for students of Dept. of Resource Management. The college has signed a MOU with subsidiary Carepox Corporate Services Ltd in 2015. Various sessions are conducted on topics like Personality Development, Finance, Grooming, Business Planning and Digital Marketing. The sessions are just not within the four walls of the classroom but they go beyond that in the form of visits to entrepreneurial exhibitions and participation of the Kshrujan in trade shows.
- There are several departmental initiatives wherein students are motivated to cultivate entrepreneurial skills. They learn the basics of planning, budgeting, costing and marketing. These include the following opportunities:
 - Students are encouraged to put up stalls during Tekzone & Akanksha intercollegiate festivals.
 - Students of TYRM participate in a restaurant on thematic settings every year, they budget and plan for the entire venture.
 - TYFSN & ND students study 'Food product development 'as part of their curriculum. They learn how to budget and market a new product, or enhance, existing product, as per specific target groups. Students of Nutrition and Dietetics plan and budget for a one day cafeteria as part of their course work.
 - 'Balmela'is an annual mega event of the Human development Dept. which is managed from conception to execution by the students of SY & TY HD, and PG Diploma in Early Childhood Education.
- College exhibition was organized on "Enhancing Employability Skills" from 28th to 30th November, 2015. Special focus was the theme of entrepreneurship. Students put up stalls and sell products during college festivals
- Alumnae who are now entrepreneurs have been invited as guest speakers by the Placement committee.

- 5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.

Sports/games:

The college has appointed a qualified sports teacher who identifies talented students for different games. Special coaches are appointed for games such as badminton, chess, volleyball and table tennis. Yoga classes have been included as part of the timetable for FY B.Sc. and are conducted by a trained yoga



instructor. Intensive self-defense training for 5 days is conducted for SY/TY B.Sc. and SY/TY BCA students by Mr. Mahesh Navale who is a highly qualified instructor. The college has a well-equipped gym for a very nominal fee of Rs 250 a year. Facilities of indoor games such as table tennis, chess and carom are also provided. College provides sports uniform for participants for events such as Yoga. Awareness for appropriate nutritional requirements are looked into by a collaborative venture between the Sports committee and the Food Science and Nutrition Department. Participating students are allowed to give assignments, submissions, presentations & class test at a later date. Annual sports day is conducted to bring out the best in students and to encourage participation in outdoor sports.

In recognition of our efforts, we received the trophy for the maximum participation in sports events conducted by the SNDT Women's University in 2015-2016.

Interactive sessions are conducted as part of the soft skills value added course which is compulsory for all students on the following aspects: group discussion, writing of resumes, statement of purpose, and how to appear for personal interviews.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

Academic and Career Counseling:

- First Year students are orientated on examination system and exam pattern at entry level
- First Year students are given a detailed orientation on which specialization
 to opt at the end of the semester I. Experts from the Industry, and
 specialization related organizations, are invited to speak at these sessions.
- Teachers conduct counseling sessions on career opportunities in Home Science for students of our Smt. Hiraben Manilal Nanavati Junior College, as well as other Junior colleges and schools in the vicinity.
- Principal and course coordinators have been invited to career counseling fairs organized by the Kutchhi Visha Oswal Seva Samaj (KVO).
- Faculty give personal counseling to TY students on career opportunities, and opportunities for further studies on completion of graduation.
- Relic Academy and SEED Infotech organize career counseling sessions for BCA students.
- The college biennial exhibition has specifically focused on the following themes:
 - ➤ 1st December, 2011- Women in the New Era: Challenges and Opportunities
 - ≥ 28th to 30th November, 2013- Enhancing Employability Skills

Personal counseling:



The college has a full time counselor on campus (Ms. Ekta Patil) who is available 6 days a week from 9.00 to 3.00 in a specially designated area ('Mind Space') on the 4th floor. The counselor is involved in college level activities so as to build up a rapport with students. She conducts sessions on topics like stress management, time management and life skills, and is invited to speak at orientations for newcomers, as well as to parents during the PTA meetings.

Pyscho-Social Counselling

- A series of lectures on gender related issues, including enhancing selfesteem and assertiveness training, is organized under the 'Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan'
- Personality development classes are conducted for all SY and TY students.
 This includes modules on self-esteem, positive thinking, decision making,
 and assertiveness. A 'life skills course based on Gandhian values' is taught
 in the 3rd semester and includes modules of interpersonal skills,
 communication skills and anger management.
- An annual workshop on pre-marital counseling and reproductive health is conducted by Dept. of Human Development for all SY and TY students.
- Nutritional counseling is done through awareness programs conducted by the Department of Food Science and Nutrition during Nutrition Week. As part of Women's day students are made aware about gynecological problems and lifestyle disorders such as polycystic ovarian syndrome, menstrual problem and thyroid problems and preventive measures.
- Lectures on 'Life Skills & Value Education'are organized under Shri Madhav Bakshi lecture series
- 'I Transform India Transforms'series (6 workshops) is conducted in collaboration with Chinmaya Mission Youth Wing. This includes modules on intellectual/emotional/physical and cultural transformation. SY B.Sc. and BCA students are awarded certificates on completion of all four workshops.
- 5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'yes', detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programmes).
- The placement cell conducts guest lectures on subjects such as: employment opportunities, resume writing, courses offered at different institutions, preparation for further studies and studies abroad.
- Job opportunities are displayed on the student notice boards and in library notice board. Refer to 5.1.7
- Career counseling is conducted for final year FSN & ND students on how to appear for SNDTWU's CET for admissions to the Post graduate programs.
- As part of the personality development modules, students are guided on how to appear for interviews, prepare resumes and participate in group discussions.
- The Placement committee conducts 'David's Battery of Differential Abilities (DBDA)'aptitude tests with the help of the college counselor for TY students.



- Each department organizes interactions between alumnae and third year students so that they may provide informal counseling/mentoring on possible career opportunities.
- The BCA placement cell conducts pool campus recruitment for TYBCA students. Mock interviews and campus interviews are conducted for the final year students by companies like Wipro BPO, Wipro InfoTech and Igate Patni.

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

Yes, the institution has a students' grievance redressal cell (Annexure No.22). However, to date, no written complaint has been addressed to the cell as the institution follows an open door policy. The easy approachability to authorities help to resolve complaints on the spot. The college has an internalized system of dealing with grievances. Students can convey their problems to their class representatives who in turn speak with the class teacher. Depending on the nature of the problem, the class teacher then communicates the problem to either the HOD/ Vice-Principal/Principal and a solution is worked upon.

Students'Council members play an important role in redressing student grievances by bringing them to the notice of authorities. Suggestion boxes are placed in the common room, 5th floor and outside the counselor's office, wherein students can drop suggestions/ grievance anonymously. The exam grievance committee looks into complaints related to exams and results.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

With reference to Sexual Harassment at work place (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act of 2013, the Management of Seva Mandal Education Society has formulated an Internal Complaints Committee (Annexure No. 23)

There have been no complaints related to sexual harassment to date. As a proactive measure, we conduct sessions to sensitize our students on how to handle sexual harassment issues off-campus. In addition, a workshop was organized for non-teaching male staff members on creating awareness on "Sexual Harassment" on 12th September 2016 by the NGO Rubaroo. For safety of students and staff, the premises of the college is under CCTV surveillance. There are female security personnel at the entrance of the campus, and wearing of ID cards is mandatory on campus.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

An Anti-Ragging Committee of the college has been constituted as per the directives of the Honorable Supreme Court of India dated May 16th 2007 and UGC Regulations to curb the menace of ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009 (Annexure No. 24)

The college has a no-tolerance policy on ragging and there has been no incidence of ragging within the campus. Measures taken to curb ragging include the following:

- All incoming students are required to submit an anti-ragging affidavit online as per the UGC guidelines
- Notifications against ragging are displayed on the website, magazine, college diary and display boards.
- A video presentation on ragging is shown during student events such as college level election of students' council.
- Freshers' meets are organized in a manner to create a friendly ambience so that new students feel at home, and consider their seniors as their friends.

5.1.13 Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution.

a. Student Counseling Support:

- Under the 'Mentoring' program, a batch of about 25 FY students each are allotted to a teacher- mentor. Students are encouraged to keep in contact with their mentors after they go into the second and third year. The activities of the mentoring committee is coordinated by the college counselor and two meetings are held every semester between the mentors.
- The College has a well-qualified and trained counselor on campus. Provisions have been made for a separate counselor's room on the fourth floor of the college to ensure confidentiality. The counselor submits a

feedback report to the principal on a regular basis. While the nature of cases referred to the counselor is kept confidential, the counselor gives feedback of a general nature during staff meetings. She encourages teachers to send referrals, should they feel the student needs emotional support. The counselor is also invited to conduct sessions on topics such as stress management, time management, decision making and conflict resolution as per suggestions of teacher-mentors and the feedback of students.

 Needy students have received financial assistance from faculty and management members

b. Health Services:

- Dr. Chandralekha Venkatesan (MBBS. Retd Chief Medical Officer MCGM) is available for consultancy twice a week on campus for faculty, non-teaching staff and students. In addition, there is a doctor on call in the vicinity of the college (Dr. Sabnis) who can be called upon in case of emergencies.
- Faculty members of the SMES College of Nursing are readily available on campus for consultation in case of a medical emergency. The department also has provision for a sick room with three beds, on the 7th floor. The college has signed a MOU with the college of Nursing for the same. F.Y B.Sc. students are trained by the nursing staff on how to administer first aid.
- The college has an understanding with the Sion Tarachand Bapa Hospital wherein emergency cases can be referred for immediate treatment. The Sion Hospital is also in the vicinity of the college.
- First Aid boxes are available in the administrative office, staff rooms and labs.
- The NSS Unit organizes an annual health checkup for students and staff members. Annual Thalassemia and Anemia detection camps have been organized in collaboration with the Rotary Club and Inner Wheel club, Lions Club of Sion. Students have been given rubella vaccination.

c. Students'Insurance Scheme:

The institution has subscribed to a Students'Medical insurance policy through Oriental insurance wherein all students on campus for a nominal charge of Rs. 20 /- a year.

d. Book Bank Facilities

The library offers book bank facilities with provisions for text books for needy students, on payment of a nominal deposit of 25% of cost of the books. Students are allowed to keep the books for the entire semester. Reading room facilities are available during exam time and holidays. Members of the book club are allowed to extend their fiction card for one week. Extra card (scholar card) is issued to students who have come in the merit list at FY and SY levels)

e. Internet facility and access to computers:

Students are provided with free internet facilities in the separate internet corner on the 5th floor. In addition, internet facilities are available in the library. Students can make use of computers in the computer labs for their



project work/academic work from 7.30 am to 6.00 pm depending on availability of the computers

5.1.14 Does the institution have a registered Alumni Association? If 'yes', what are its activities and major contributions for institutional, academic and infrastructure development?

The college has an active alumnae association. Although it is not a formal registered association, alumnae have actively contributed to the institutional development in multiple ways:

- The institution has the healthy practice of inviting alumnae as resource persons in order to encourage interface between present students and alumnae who are working in the industry. Alumnae are invited as subject experts to evaluate presentations.
- Alumnae achievers are felicitated during the Foundation Day/ Annual Day program and the inaugural function of 'Tekzone'. Alumnae are also invited as judges, guests of honor for functions such as NSS Annual Day and Personality contest. They are also invited for orientations to interact with new students and their parents.
- Alumnae are members of the IQAC, and Local Managing Committee of the BCA/M.Sc. sections.
- An annual Alumni Meet is organized wherein the alumnae get to meet their classmates and they are also updated about the institution's progress. They also contribute towards freeships for the students and sponsorship for Tekzone.
- Alumnae help with providing internships and placements for students.
- Special groups such as 'entrepreneurial superstars'have been formed on social media to offer mentorship to students

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

- Faculty takes keen interest in students' progression to higher education and is engaged in one-to-one counseling.
- Seminars and orientation programs are conducted to make students aware of higher education options available. Students are also encouraged to attend education and career fairs.
- Notification of admissions to premier institutions are displayed regularly on the notice board. Similar announcements are posted on the website and social media
- We conduct 4 postgraduate programs which facilitate students' progression from undergraduate to postgraduate level.

Initiatives taken to improve students' progression to employment:

- Sessions are held to prepare students for post graduate entrance examinations.
- Aptitude tests are organized to guide students towards getting a job suitable to their caliber
- Faculty guide students during the internship period which gives them on hands -on training for the job market. Often, the firms/hospitals/organizations where they have been placed hire them after graduation.
- Alumnae play an important role in posting information on suitable job opportunities on social media.
- Personality development and soft skills value added courses are organized to enhance students' employability quotient.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and dropout?

The following support is offered to students who are at the risk of failure and dropout:

- Approximately 10% of students are at risk of dropping out due to family
 pressure to get married, academic limitations and economic constraints.
 Students are referred to the college counselor who counsels the student on
 how to continue with her studies. These students, along with their parents,
 are also counselled by teachers.
- Attendance is monitored, and students who are not attending classes are counseled and mentored so as to improve their attendance and overall performance.
- Parent-Teacher meetings are held every semester. The results of weak students are discussed with parents so that they can motivate their wards to improve their performance.
- Remedial coaching and bridge course are organized to help with academic performance.
- The Principal personally counsels any student who applies for a leaving certificate.
- Sessions are organized on stress management and time management to enable students to cope with their studies.
- Parents/spouse are encouraged to let the student continue with studies after marriage. Married alumina are encouraged to take readmission, after a break, to complete their studies
- Provision of financial assistance and government freeships helps to reduce dropout of students due to economic problems.
- In certain instances, the student, as a slow learner did not have the capacity to continue with the course. She was counseled to join an alternate program offered by the college i.e. certificate in beauty culture.

5.3. Student Participation and Activities

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students.

Sports and games:

- Competitions at college level are organized to encourage students to participate in different sports activities and to identify talent.
- Qualified coaches have been appointed for training students to participate at different competitions at the college, intercollegiate and inter-university level (For list of coaches please refer to 5.1.6).
- The college has a MOU to use the adjacent Amulakh school ground to give
 adequate practice for games such as Basketball and Volleyball. The college
 also uses the adjacent GSB sports ground whenever required such as for
 conducting the annual sports day. Competitions such as Yoga are also
 conducted in the main hall.
- The institute received the trophy for maximum participation in events conducted from the SNDT Women's University for academic year 2015-2016.

B) Cultural and Other Extra-curricular Activities:

The co-curricular committee organizes a range of cultural and literary activities. The committee plans its calendar before the beginning of the academic year. Events organized include the following:

'Akanksha'is the college annual intercollegiate festival organized by the Students'council wherein students get the opportunity to develop their organizational skills and nurture their creativity. Yuva Mahotsav'is the annual Youth festival of the SNDTWU wherein students from affiliated colleges from all over India participate. This is a prestigious and highly competitive event. The college appoints coaches to train students in folk dance and theatre events, wherein the college team has won several prizes. Language teachers coach students for participation in literary events as well as Ms. SNDT Tejaswini Contest (List of prize winners Annexure No. 20)

Study tours and industrial visits are organized by the respective departments:

Students are taken for field visits and study tours to give them first hand exposure to the functioning of the workplace, according to their specializations (for details, please refer to 5.1.4 h).

C. NSS Activities:

The NSS unit has four program officers and enrolls about 150 volunteers every year. The unit conducts regular activities and special camps every year. NSS volunteers participate in various awareness drives on AIDS, sanitation and polio and also volunteer in health check-up camps for rubella vaccination, thalassemia counseling, hemoglobin tests, dental and eye checkup, blood donation camp, rallies, street plays and tree plantations (for details of NSS activities please refer to 3.6.1).

5.3.3 How does the college seek and use feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

The college seeks feedback from its graduates and employers as follows:

- An exit form is designed which is given to final year students asking for feedback on curriculum implementation, infrastructure, student support services and suggestions for future plans. Based on the feedback received, the college has introduced new programs such as MCA to enable vertical mobility of BCA students and M.Sc. in Dietetics and Food Service Management. Vocation oriented courses such as Catering Management and Landscape Design have also been introduced.
- Feedback on areas in which performance can be enhanced have been given by alumnae. They have, for instance, suggested incorporating more sessions on entrepreneurship skills, as well as updating training in computer skills, as per the need of the workplace. These suggestions have been incorporated into the syllabi.
- A formal feedback is collected from potential employers where final year students are placed for their internship. The main feedback received has been to enhance soft skills and communication skills. Based on this, the soft skills course at TY level is divided into two components. The focus in Sem. V is on presentation skills while the focus in Sem VI is on writing resumes, appearing for personal interviews and taking part in group discussions. The



- Dept. played an important role in ensuring that Soft Skills Development has been added to curriculum of SY TSAD in Semester IV by SNDTWU.
- Informal feedback from industry is given during mock interviews, pool campus and whenever experts from the industry are invited to evaluate student presentations. Feedback from potential employers is also sought during industrial visits and campus selection interviews.
- 5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.
- Every department has been allotted notice boards on their respective floors
 wherein articles of the latest developments in the subject as well as creative

- Students of the Textile Science and Apparel Design Department. Have made booklets on design collections for embroidery and painting.
- Students of the Department of Human Development have produced pamphlets with creative songs and exercises for pre-school children. They have also produced recordings of performances for children for the annual Balmela using the mass media lab on campus.
- FSN students have made pamphlets on nutritious and innovative ideas for recipes. They have also designed posters for 'Nutrition week', breast feeding campaigns which have been used for community awareness drives.
- Students prepare charts and posters as part of their extension work on socially sensitive issues.
- Students of BCA have made mini documentaries on environment and gender related issues.
- Ms. Tejashree Gaikwad of TY TSAD writes articles for "Loksata" a Marathi newspaper. Most of her topics are related to her specialization.

- Student representatives from co-curricular, NSS and sports committees are sent for a leadership camp at Devlali for 3 days organized by SNDTWU.

5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumnae and former faculty of the Institution.

Each department maintains an alumnae data base. In addition, faculty connect with alumnae through social media groups on Facebook and WhatsApp. Special groups have been formed on shared interests such as entrepreneurship and nutrition education. The annual alumnae meet is an important occasion wherein we can network with our former students.

Alumnae are considered as an important human resource base and we invite our former students for guest lectures so that they may share the latest trends in their respective specializations. They are also called upon to motivate stakeholders during orientation for new students and PTA. Alumnae have given back to the institution by means of students freeships, as well as infrastructure (such a microwave in staff room, fridge in BCA staff room and wall clocks in staff room and common room). They have also assisted students with placements. For

CRITERION VI

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.

Our Vision and Mission Statements are as follows:

Vision: "Empowerment of Women through Quality in Education".

Mission: "To impart quality education to women and enable them to become independent and competent, thereby benefiting our society and country at large".

Institution's Objectives:

- To foster a healthy learning environment
- To make teaching and research relevant to social needs
- To inculcate a humanist outlook in students by means of value based education and community outreach programs
- To focus on vocationalization of courses

Institution's Distinctive Characteristics:

- Multi-faculty institution with a student population of about 900 in all the programs. Being a relatively small institution, there is a positive advantage, as it allows us ample opportunities to focus on quality enhancement and sustenance mechanisms at a micro-level.
- The college is affiliated to the SNDT Women's University, Mumbai, which was started by Bharat Ratna Maharshi Karve in 1916. The institutional vision is in keeping with Dr. Karve's dream of empowering women through the powerful tool of education.
- The institutional policy is to ensure access to education to all women students. Admission is given to any student on a first come basis, until our available seats are filled. We believe that all women are entitled to an equal opportunity and there is no cut-off percentage for admission as long as the student meets the basic eligibility criteria of SNDT Women's University.
- A number of students come from conservative and diverse backgrounds that have not previously the tertiary education of women, and can be referred to as first generation college goers.
- Ensures the holistic development of the students and strives to enhance their professional and personal progression after joining the institution.
- Programs are planned to equip the students with multiple skills and competencies, in order encouraged to enable them to perform to the best of their abilities in an increasingly globalised world. The institution makes a determined effort to introduce skill based components, with a focus on developing employability skills and emphasising on promoting the use of ICT. Academic activities are complimented by co-curricular and extra-

curricular activities to foster the overall mental, spiritual and physical development of students.

Vision for the future:

The institution vision is towards instilling personal and professional ethics, and respect for pluralism and secularism through life-skills education and value education programs.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

Role of the Management:

- Our parent body Seva Mandal Education Society (SMES) established in 1957, started on a humble note with just seven women students. Over the last six decades, SMES has been a pioneer in the field of women's education and today has eight institutions under its astute management.
- The Management members work in tandem with the Principal (Dr. Shilpa P. Charankar) and faculty in planning and implementation of quality policy and plans. Transparency and accountability are the central pillars for the functioning of all the top Management's decisions.
- The institution has undergone two cycles of NAAC Accreditation.
 - In the first cycle the institution received a B+ (in 2003).
 - In the second cycle, the institution scored an A grade with a CGPA of 3.64/4 (in 2011) thus showing considerable improvement in the institutional performance.
 - In May 2016, the institution received the UGC Status of 'College with Potential for Excellence'.

This was due to the planning and implementation of a well-defined perspective plan. The NAAC peer team review and feedback in the exit report has played a central role in formulating the quality initiatives of the institution and in defining quality parameters to be followed. The institution has successfully compiled with the suggestions given by the NAAC Peer team's exit report submitted in 2011. Feedback mechanisms and self-appraisal processes have also helped us to achieve our institutional goals which are as follows:

- To enhance infrastructure and facilities for ICT in order to upgrade academic excellence
- To introduce skill based programs with vocational opportunities
- To equip students with global competencies such as computer and soft skills
- To ensure responsible citizenship through a wide range of social outreach programs
- To create an environment conducive for the students' holistic growth and development
- To develop skills and knowledge according to each student's individual aptitude
- To develop understanding of the inter-relationship of different disciplines of Home Science as well as Computer Applications and inculcate an interdisciplinary approach among students
- To prepare students for employment in Home Science and Computer related fields through interaction with industry

• To enrich professional commitment of the teacher through participation in different faculty development programs.

Role of the Principal

- Principal Dr. Shilpa P. Charankar has been with the institution for more than 3 decades and plays a pivotal role in the administrative and academic functioning of the institution.
- Monitors and coordinates developmental schemes of the college through weekly Wednesday meetings with the Office Bearers of the SMES. She is a qualified Master trainer for developing women managers (as under the UCG program for Capacity building for Women Managers).
- Encourages team work and faculty hence works as one unit in whatever task undertaken. He is member of various statutory bodies & shares decisions taken at various levels & the recent GRs with all faculty members.
- Meetings are organized to a pre-planned schedule and staff members are involved in decision making processes. Follow up is done meticulously. Meetings are conducted in a democratic manner, to arrive at consensus. Action taken reports are presented during monthly meetings. There is an open door policy and transparency in decision making processes. Constructive suggestions are welcomed and discussed openly.

Role of Faculty

- Heads of the Departments have an important role in the general governance and administration of academic activities.
- Since the number of faculty members is relatively small, all faculty members are involved in discussions on matters such as the academic calendar, admission procedures, introduction of new courses, methods of curriculum administration, budget planning, examinations and results, discipline, attendance, library related issues, student development initiatives, and other routine administrative areas.
- The college has developed a Standard Operating Procedure manual for reference by various committees.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring the policy statements and action plans for fulfilment of the stated mission?

- The commitment of the SMES Management is manifested in multiple ways. The top leadership is keenly involved in implementation of the institution perspective plan, in consultation with the Principal and the IQAC. Our quality policy is derived from our vision and mission statement focused on the empowerment of women through quality in education. Empowerment of students is perceived in terms of the knowledge, attitude and skills that the institution imparts. This will give them a strong and positive belief in self, life-long learning and knowledge management skills as well as a sense of social responsibility. All this leads to empowerment at intellectual, financial and emotional levels
- The Management meets the Principal every Wednesday and the Principal communicates decisions taken during these meetings, to the staff during the monthly Quality Improvement Circle meetings on the first Tuesday &

- Thursday of every month with the Home Science section, with BCA section respectively. Common staff meetings are held thrice in a year.
- The Management also invites ideas and feedback on areas of improvement from faculty during meetings of the Local Managing Committee, Library Committee, Common staff meetings etc. The Annual Quality Assurance Report of the IQAC is presented before the Management before submission to NAAC.

Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan:

- The academic calendar is formulated before the academic year commences.
 All activities including the meeting dates are incorporated into the calendar enabling councils, departments and committees to plan their events well in advance.
- Institutional master timetable is planned in advance by the exam and timetable committee and is ready to be implemented as soon as the term begins. This ensures working of all committees to a well- defined time frame.
- Schedule for the Governing Council, LMC, and Managing Council meetings is planned at the beginning of each academic year and circulated among all members. It is displayed on the staff notice board.
- Plans for departmental activities as well as committees such as co-curricular committee, sports committee, NSS, and seminar and workshop, etc. are submitted to the Principal. After participatory discussion, the action plan for operation of the same is incorporated into the institutional strategic plan. The Principal guides faculty to ensure that the institutional objectives are translated into measurable outcomes.
- Faculty present their ideas to the Management during the LMC (Local Managing Committee) meetings. The LMC comprises of Management members, Principal, IQAC coordinator, 3 nominated representatives of teaching staff and 1 non-teaching staff. The meetings are conducted at least twice a year. Alumnae are nominated as members on the LMC of the Department of Computer Applications as this helps the college to keep abreast with the latest developments and requirements of the industry. External experts are invited as members for the LMC of the postgraduate programs of M.Sc. in Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics, P.G Diploma in Sports Science Fitness and Nutrition and PG Diploma in Early Childhood Education, as well as BCA.
- Faculty puts forth ideas to the Management during committee meetings such as Library and Annual IQAC review meetings.
- Management members also attend end of term staff meetings and invite ideas and feedback from faculty.

Interaction with stakeholders

Management members interact with stakeholders on occasions such as
Foundation Day, Teachers Day, Independence Day and Republic day.
Parents, alumnae and retired teachers are invited for these functions. Donors
and patrons are also specially invited in order to partake in the culture of the
institution. The Management hosts lunch for all teaching and non-teaching



staff on occasion of International Women's Day on March 8th in appreciation of their contribution to the institution.

- Management members get opportunity to address students during Annual day, alumnae meets, and cultural events like Akanksha and Tekzone intercollegiate festivals.
- The Principal is the convenor of PTA and Alumina Association and this
 gives her opportunity to interact with stakeholders. She addresses students
 during orientations (first year students) and farewell functions (final year
 students), Annual sports day and NSS annual day amongst other occasions.

Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

- Planning is undertaken after need-based analysis and getting inputs through feedback mechanisms and interaction with parents during PTA meetings held twice a year, and alumnae interaction during the annual alumnae meet. Alumnae interaction is also actively sustained on social media via a Facebook page specially created for this purpose. Alumnae are also invited to interact with students and staff as resource persons in their respective specializations.
- The Management approaches donors, such as Shri Mayank Shah (eminent Industrialist) for supporting professional development programs for non-teaching staff, and Lions clubs and Rotary clubs for medical camps for teaching staff and non-teaching staff. Details of freeships disbursed to students are shared with respective donors at the end of the academic year. Eminent experts are invited to contribute towards the formulation and initiation of new programs such as 'Kshrujan' for entrepreneurial skills development and 'Pedagogy, Advocacy and Transformation' (PUKAR)

Reinforcing the culture of excellence

- The institution ensures the appointment of well qualified faculty for both aided and non-aided sections.
- The institution promotes research among staff and students, programs for non-teaching staff
- The institution has introduced skill based value added programs.
- Biometric regulations are followed and there is a work culture wherein faculty are present on campus for more than the required five hours and more, and are therefore accessible to students.
- The college has to its credit recipients of the SNDT Women's University Best Teacher Award, Fellow of the Textiles Association of India, Best Teacher awards from the Lion's Club, Fulbright Visiting Lecturer Grant Awardee, Postdoctoral Fellow of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation and recipient of Commonwealth scholarship for M.Sc., in Gerontology.
- The college was the first among SNDTWU affiliated colleges in Maharashtra to conduct CAS/PBAS interviews for selection and appointment of a faculty member as Professor. Student and teacher achievers are invited to the Office Bearers' meetings and are appreciated by the Management.
- Experts are invited from the industry to address staff and students at seminars and conferences and share expertise and benchmarks of excellence in the industry. Experts are members of the jury formulated to evaluate



internship presentations. They also address FY B.Sc. students during the orientation for selection of specialization at the end of Sem. II.

Management provides a conducive atmosphere for reinforcing a culture of excellence.

- We are a beneficiary a Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) project of SAS institute (India) Ltd. for enabling SMART classrooms and other ICT and technology facilities. The Management has successfully approached donors to construct a new annex building and augment infrastructure.
- SMES formulated an **Institutional ethical committee** in 2012 to monitor and ensure quality in research activities and publications. The body follows the guidelines of **Indian Council of Medical Research** whose parent body is World Health Organisation. (Details of the same are given under 3.3.1).
- College has collaborated on a project on using of benchmarking for higher education institutions with PN Doshi College of Arts and Commerce (Ghatkopar) and M.D Shah Mahila College of Arts and Commerce (Malad) in 2014-2015.
- Smt. K.G. Shah Department of Computer Applications received the Silver Award for the college project entitled 'Transformation of Girl Students into Empowered Citizens' at D.L. Shah Quality Award by the Quality Council of India, New Delhi on 7th August, 2015.
- College has participated in the annual Best Quality Enhancement Team (BEQET) projects conducted by the National Centre for Quality Management (NCQM) over the last ten years. The objective has been to encourage faculty to undertake projects to enhance quality standards of the institution. We have won 5 times for the following projects, and have received the sustainable membership award:


Champion organizational change

Several quality initiatives have been introduced to monitor administrative and academic functioning.

- The Principal conducts regular meetings with a specially formulated committee of non-teaching staff for enhancing administrative functioning.
- Delegation of duties is encouraged so that authority is decentralized and the next rung of leadership is cultivated



- Coordinators and in-charges are appointed for the various courses and are given freedom to initiate innovative ideas after consultation with the Management.
- Time schedules are set for submission and review of API, departmental reports, and committee reports. Follow up is done so as to ensure timely submission.
- Duties of members of committees are well defined in the SOP to ensure smooth functioning of the institution.
- 6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?




Feedback mechanisms include the following:

- a. Student-teacher evaluation: Students evaluate individual teachers at the end of every semester on the basis of all subjects that the teacher has taught. Theory and practical classes are evaluated. The questions are based on parameters like punctuality, discipline, innovative teaching aids used, percentage of interactive sessions conducted, explanation and understanding by the students, additional information beyond syllabus, availability and accessibility, etc. The data collected is analyzed and a computerized report is shared with the teacher in confidence. The Principal confers with the teacher over the report and discusses areas of possible improvement.
- b. Intra-Departmental Audit: Each department prepares a self-evaluative report at the end of every academic year. The report states the activities done by the departments, as well as participation by staff members in academic and co-curricular activities. The reports are then subject to an intra-department audit wherein the reports are reviewed by members of another department, IQAC coordinator and Principal. Comments are then shared and departments follow up on the feedback and suggestions given.



- **c. Parents Teachers Association:** meetings are held at least twice a year. This allows interface between the Head of the Institution, class teacher, faculty, college counsellor and parents. Parents have the opportunity to offer feedback on the performance of the institution.
- **d. Final year students fill an exit form** before they leave the institution. They offer suggestions and feedback on the various mechanisms in the institution. The data is analysed and presented in the departmental profiles, which in turn is reported to the IQAC.
- **e. Staff Job engagement index**: A Satisfaction engagement questionnaire is given to the teaching staff every alternate year. Each teacher is required to fill in the index, individually. The scores are then analysed and reviewed in the IQAC meeting.
- f. Feedback is taken from potential employers wherein students are placed for internship based from parameters related to employability skills. Students are assessed on the basis of their technical skills and soft skills. The institution has worked on the feedback received. For instance, the soft skills value added course has been modified on the basis of inputs received on the level of communication skills of the students placed for internship.
- **g. KPI** (**Key Performance Indicators**): As per the directive of the Government of Maharashtra Government Circular No.N-KPI-2010 the IQAC has been regularly preparing a self-evaluative report of Key Performance Indicators (KPI) on criteria related to teaching/learning/evaluation/administrative/student support practices, for the last five years.
- **h. Library Audit**: On recommendation of the IQAC, a library audit was conducted on 25th of August by the head librarians of SVT College of Home Science and Vaze Kelkar College. The observations and recommendations of the experts were placed before the Governing council and an action plan has been drawn up. For example, it has been suggested that the library should enhance its institutional repository.
- **i.** A Green Audit was conducted by STEP Techno Solutions on 1st of February 2016. Based on the audit, the institution has started compositing of wet waste in the food lab and the canteen. Additional programs have been implemented to create awareness on energy saving measures.





6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The institution is fortunate to be led by

- Highly qualified SMES Management members from professional fields such as medicine, chartered accountancy, engineering and architecture.
- Management members have also served as board members in other educational institutions and eminent organisations such as Sion Hospital,



Amulakh Amichand School, Tarachand Bapa hospital, Lions Club of Sion etc.

- They have been members of the SNDTWU Senate.
- They are totally involved in the effective administration of the institution. Given their rich experience, they are in a position to provide academic leadership to the institution and understand the value of research and innovative teaching practices, and are keenly involved in women's empowerment. They are strong pillars of support and encouragement.
- Management members along with the Principal closely monitor, assist and support us in all activities. Any program plan is first run through them and they impart suggestions necessary for its success.

• They have also contributed magnanimously towards the infrastructure of the college.

- As a result of the academic leadership of the Management, the institution
 has been a pioneer in starting courses of SNDTWU in an affiliated college,
 such as Bachelor in Computer Applications.
- Principal motivates faculty to take up research projects and extends support towards sanction of FDP from UGC for those who are doing PhD. Two faculty members have availed of this facility in the last NAAC cycle, and a third faculty will be proceeding on FDP shortly. Faculty are also granted duty leave for attending conferences and seminars.
- Financial support is extended for payment of registration fees for national and international conferences. (For details please refer to table 1.1.3)
 - Dr. Kirti Pathak (HOD, Dept. of Human Development) was granted leave to attend course work for a M.Sc. program in Gerontology in the United Kingdom.
 - Prof Mala Pandurang (Vice-Principal) was encouraged to apply for a short term research grant from the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation for a one month stay at the University of Chemnitz, Germany, in May 2016.
- There is provision in the Staff Welfare fund wherein faculty can apply for the amount of `7500 for travel assistance for international conferences.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- The institution believes in **decentralization and delegation of authority**.
- The Principal practices an open-door policy. This gives the opportunity to groom leadership at various levels. Apart from Head of Departments, course coordinators are also appointed for un-aided sections. The Vice-Principal and coordinator of the BCA section are invited to be present at the Governing council meetings and their opinions are taken into consideration.



- The Principal believes in team work and encourages junior staff members to take up responsibilities which enhances self-esteem and confidence, and helps to develop the next rung of leadership.
- Committees are formed for three years on rotation basis. This ensures that
 faculty have the opportunity to learn from the experience of being part of
 different committees. In-charges of committees are also changed on a
 rotation basis. The responsibility of organising secretaries is given to
 different faculty members each time National Level or State level seminar
 is organised.
- Faculty members are also encouraged to participate in the organisation of mega events organised by the SNDT Women's University such as Yuva Mahotsav and Avhaan disaster management training camp from 21st May to 1st June 2015 so as to gain experience of team work and organisational skills. They also play an important role in decision making bodies of the University and are granted duty leave to attend meetings of the same.
- Student council members are also encouraged to take up leadership roles and get opportunities through the organisation of mega events such as Akanksha and Tekzone intercollegiate festivals. NSS unit develops their leadership skills through social outreach projects and the NSS Special Camp. Students are deputed to attend the annual leadership camps at Devalali (Maharashtra) organised by SNDTWU.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system.

The institution believes in a decentralized governance system with a horizontal system of management, rather than rigid hierarchal governance.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

The institution is a small closely knit unit and at every level participative management is practiced.

- The principal meets the Management once a week.
- The Vice-Principal participates in the Governing Council meetings once in a month. LMC meetings are held at least twice in a year.
- The Local Managing committee comprises of the Principal, IQAC coordinator and three staff members and non-teaching member on a rotation basis
- The Principal shares all circulars received from the UGC, SNDTWU and the State Government. In this way, faculty are kept well informed of Government and UGC schemes.
- The HODs are consulted before any policy decision is taken. Matters are also discussed during the staff meetings and opinions of all staff members are taken into consideration.
- Decisions are collectively taken after deliberation in staff meetings and during the IQAC review meetings.
- Non-teaching staff representatives on the IQAC are also invited to give their opinion.
- For grant received from the UGC, the Principal ensures that the Heads of the department are closely involved right from preparation of the proposal to following up the expenditure of the received grant. The working committee for the UGC 12th plan reviews grants sanctioned and the implementation of schemes for the same.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

- Our vision is "Empowerment of Women through quality in Education" and this defines our very rationale as an educational institution. Our quality policy is derived from our vision and mission statement.
- It was crucial to define the notion of 'Empowerment', so that we could formulate clearly defined objectives which would enable us to move towards this long term goal. We perceive 'empowerment' of students in terms of the knowledge, attitude and skills that the institution imparts, and which the students imbibe. This ultimately gives them a strong and positive



- belief in self, life-long learning and knowledge management skills as well as a sense of social responsibility. All this leads to empowerment at intellectual, financial and emotional levels.
- The strategy to implement our quality policy is through the principle of KASH, namely - K-knowledge, A- attitude, S- skills, H-habit. A few examples of our objective, strategies and results achieved in terms of the KASH model is presented in Annexure No. 26






Academic Bodies

- NAAC Sponsored National Level Seminar on 'Best practices in Teaching, Learning and Evaluation' had a special session on "Towards holistic education- the role of academia, industry and professional bodies in today's education system". Panelists were Dr. Prabodh Halde (Manager Food Regulatory, Marico Industries); Prof Shobha Udipi [Rtd] Head, Post Graduate Dept. of Food Science and Nutrition (SNDT Women's University); and Mr. Ullhas Nimkar (Chairman and Managing Director of NimkarTek Technical Services Pvt. Ltd).
- Experts are invited from the industry to address staff and students at seminars and conferences, and to share benchmarks of excellence in the industry. They are also invited as part of the Jury for internship and as experts for curriculum planning
- Faculties are members of various professional bodies such as AFSTI Mumbai Chapter, PFNDAI Mumbai Chapter, IDA Textile Association India. They have been instrumental in bringing in collaborative ventures.
- 6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?
- Each Wednesday, the executive committee of the Management and the Principal meets to discuss issues related to the institution. This ensures a continuous flow of information and quick decision making process.
- The Principal is a member of University Statutory bodies of SNDTWU as well as decision making bodies of other Universities. She is therefore in the position of being well informed of policies and schemes.
- She shares relevant information with staff on Government Resolutions, SNDTWU policy decisions and circulars from the Joint Director of Higher and Technical Education's Office.
- The Governing council meeting is held on the second Wednesday of every month. Along with the Principal, the Vice-principal and BCA Course Coordinator gets the opportunity to meet the Management and review the activities of the institution.
- The Local Managing committee has members of the teaching faculty, and non-teaching staff along with the IQAC coordinator and Principal. This ensures that faculty and management members meet and discuss strategies for institutional development.
- Library committee meetings are held twice in a year wherein Management, Principal, Vice-Principal, HODs, librarian and student members offer feedback and suggestion on improvement of library services.



- Management members are also part of the IQAC and offer feedback during the annual review meeting of the IQAC held in March every year. The AQAR is shared with management members before it is sent to NAAC.
- The Managing Council Meeting is held four times a year. Detailed information about the progress and development of the institution is shared. The SMES annual report is sent to all SMES members.
- The Principal, Vice-Principal and senior staff members are present for the PTA meetings as well as aluminae meetings. In these meetings, institution policies and plans are shared with parents and feedback is received.
- In addition, the college magazine carries detailed reports of every department committees, offering an in depth view of the activities of the college.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

- Staff members are nominated for relevant short term training programs organised at the UGC Human Resource Centre, University of Mumbai. Kalina, and also deputed to attend orientation and refresher courses (Please refer to 1.1.3)
- 35 faculty members(of aided and unaided sections)underwent a 6 day training program conducted by SNDT Women's University from 15th to 20th April 2013 on 'Integrating ICT in Higher education' in collaboration with Commonwealth of Learning (Canada).
- English faculty has undergone training by NASSCOM as 'Train the trainer for Global Business Foundation Skills' from 18th to 23rd Jan.2016
- Faculty are sent for programs on Quality parameters conducted by NCQM and also for 3 day workshop 'Towards Understanding Quality Parameters for the Bajaj Ramakrishna national quality awards' from 6th 9th April, 2016
- 4 faculty have attended UGC recognised Capacity building workshops for women.
- Incentives include sanction of leave, recognition from the management and Felicitation on occasion of teachers' day. Faculty are motivated to undertake research projects and apply for funding.



6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

Performance appraisal of the staff is done through the following processes.

- **Student teacher evaluation**: This is a formal format given to students who give a feedback on the teaching related aspects of the teacher. Positive feedback and corrective measures are given to staff members through personal interaction with the Principal.
- Confidential annual self-assessment report of teaching and non-teaching staff: Individual faculty provide information of academic and co-curricular /extracurricular work done during the academic year. The forms are reviewed by the HODs and the Principal, and feedback is communicated in writing. Forms of the HODs are reviewed by the Vice-Principal. Principal's self-appraisal and confidential report is reviewed by the Management.
- **API indicators** wherein teachers performance in teaching, as well as curricular activities and research based activities is appraised by the IQAC
- Internal academic audit is conducted annually wherein faculty involvement and performance is audited by peers.
- Committees also submit their annual reports to the IQAC and suggestions are given for activities for the next academic year

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The following performance appraisal reports are reviewed by the Management, Principal and IQAC. Accordingly major decisions are taken which are communicated in person, during meetings, and by display of minutes as is appropriate.

- **Student teacher evaluation**: Individual faculty interact with the principal who gives a feedback on both positive and negative aspects. The HODs monitor the required changes.
- **Self-assessment report**: Faculty are given a confidential report which highlights positive contributions as well as areas that need improvement.
- **Intra-Departmental audit**: Feedback is shared with the respective departments. The department makes a presentation to show how it has addressed the suggestions given in the previous year.
- The API provides numeric data for each staff member and appraises performance taking into all aspects of teaching learning, extra and curricular activities and research. Teachers are informed of changes in scores, if any, after verification.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The staff welfare fund has been constituted by the management. The following schemes are available for teaching and non—teaching staff:

- Medical checkup in collaboration with the SMES College of Nursing
- Access to trained counsellor on campus
- Access to doctor on campus
- Appointment of spouses of deceased non-teaching staff members on compassionate grounds by the Management
- Post-retirement opportunities such as for library non-teaching staff
- Loan for children/ wards' education

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

- Posts are advertised in newspaper and appointment is done according to norms of UGC, Government of Maharashtra and SNDTWU.
- The management offers substantial salary for unaided courses
- The fact that the institution has been able to retain the majority of its staff, faculty of unaided courses, is evidence of satisfaction with the congenial work culture and secular character of the institution.
- Faculty development programmes are organised on a regular basis of at least one program per semester.
- Registration for attending seminars and workshops is subsidised by the Management.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

- The institution has delegated work of looking after efficient use of available financial resources to specific members of the administrative staff.
- A committee formulated for the UGC 12th plan looks into proposal, and utilization of funds. The Principal places the proposals for the consideration and approval of the Management.
- HODs are delegated responsibility of monitoring resources for department specific activities. Actual expenditure is monitored by the accounts section.
- Faculty who avail of research grants are made accountable for efficient use of the grant obtained.
- Grants received for any seminar/ workshop also are monitored by a member of the faculty who is appointed as the treasurer for the same.
- For each activity, the pre-budget and post budget accounts are submitted to the Management by the Principal.
- All payment is made by cheque and all cheques are to have two signatures to ensure checks and balance at all levels
- Surplus deficits are borne by the Management. For example, the Management has incurred additional capital expenditure for the furnishing and designing of the Gandhian Studies centre.
- Surplus amount received by Tekzone sponsorship is utilised for purchasing equipment for the department



- Funds collected through e-waste drive are used towards freeship for needy students
- Funds collected through alumnae are used to buy computers and peripherals.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

There is a system of internal financial audit carried by a qualified C.A appointed by the Management (Shri. Narendra Dani.) Date wise/month wise/ basic data/voucher/bill/fees collection are recorded by junior administrative staff, which is then verified by senior accountant, superintendent and the internal auditor. Government norms are strictly adhered to. The last audit was done from Dec. 2015 to March 2016. The balance sheet is printed every year in the SMES annual report. An external auditor Mrs. Ena K. Doshi (Chartered Accountant M.No. 47345), verifies the data as per standard norms including compliance required by Joint Director of Higher Education. An external audit was also conducted for the years 2002 to 2016 by the Joint Director of Education. The duly signed assessment report is yet to be received.

- 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

The IQAC has played a proactive role in initiating and monitoring activities that enhance the quality of education in the institution.

- They are an important link between administrative staff, teachers and students.
- The IQAC also has alumnae members who suggest quality parameters needed to improve institutional performance.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

- Two non-teaching representatives on the IQAC.
- The IQAC shares its decisions and plan of action with teaching staff during the Quality Improvement Circle Meetings held on the first Tuesday of every month.
- The IQAC has involved all the staff members in the preparing of the RAR.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalization.

- IQAC monitors and enhance the academic and administrative functioning of the institution. In order to do so, desired operative procedures are shared during meetings with the faculty and non-teaching staff.
- IQAC introduced the concept of the annual inter-department academic audit.
- It has conducted a green audit and library audit to monitor operational processes.
- All committees have contributed towards a standard operating procedure (SOP) manual.
- Guidelines for examination related activities have been formulated by the exam committee under the guidance of IQAC members.
- Documentation of academic and administrative activities is maintained in the form of minutes of meetings, filing of reports, annual college magazine, highlights on the website, AQAR report, audit reports, administrative and accounting ledgers etc. Soft copies are maintained in a digital repository in the computer lab.
- Activities are reviewed by the IQAC and timely reporting and transparency ensures monitoring and implementation of qualitative ventures undertaken in the College. All activities are reported via Principal to the Management. The authorities appreciate success, suggest corrective measures and provide encouragement to individuals involved in the quality enhancement processes.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

Staff had the following opportunities for training in effective implementation of quality assurance procedures:

- At least 2 faculty members and one non-teaching staff are deputed every year to attend sessions conducted by National Centre for Quality Management on quality enhancement techniques.
- There is peer group sharing on strategies for quality enhancement projects to be presented at Best Education quality enhancement technique annual competition (BEQET)
- Sessions on topics such as 'Class room management', 'process of Green Audit' etc. have been organized (Please refer to 6.3.1)
- Workshops have been conducted by the IQAC in April 2015 and April 2016 on API and CAS as quality indicators.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

- The institution conducts an annual intra -department academic audit. Each
 department prepares an in-depth departmental report. Departments then peer
 review these reports. It is also checked by the IQAC coordinator and by the
 Principal. Presentations by the department are organized and feedback for
 improvement is given. The next year, action taken and compliance is
 checked and reviewed.
- Annual report of the IQAC is presented to external experts for review. Management members are also invited for the annual review meeting wherein feedback is given.
- The academic and administrative processes have also been reviewed by the committee appointed from SNDT Women's University to assess the Best College proposal. The college was among the top three colleges shortlisted for the award in 2014-2015.
- The college has also submitted an academic audit report and proposal for RUSA through the SNDT Women's University in 2015, and is awaiting a response from the University.
- Library audit was conducted on August 25th 2016 by the Head librarians of SVT College of Home Science and Vaze Kelkar College.
- A Green Audit was conducted by STEP Techno Solutions on 1st of February 2016

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The departmental reports are prepared keeping in mind the criteria used by NAAC for assessment. Additionally quality projects are undertaken and presented in BEQET competition, thus getting a feedback on quality measures.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The following mechanisms are in place to review the teaching learning process

- Student teacher evaluation is conducted every semester on the following parameters—syllabus, subject knowledge, communication skills, use of innovative methods etc.
- Academic calendar is planned before the commencement of the academic year to ensure that there are 180 teaching days in a year
- Examination committee ensures that the exam schedule is displayed well in advance so that teachers can plan their schedule accordingly
- Matters related to curriculum, evaluation etc. are discussed in the Internal Quality circle meeting first Tuesday of every month (B.Sc.) and first Thursday of every month (BCA)

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

- The institution prepares an in-depth prospectus and information brochure which is given to students at the time of admission.
- Institution policies, and values are communicated at orientation programs organized for newly enrolled students
- The institution presents a detailed account of all activities in the annual college magazine 'Akanksha', which reflects the policies and outcomes of various programs in the institution. The magazine is given to all students and faculty of the college. We also give Akanksha to all guests and visitors to the college ensuring that college activities and programs are shared with all its stake holders.
- Minutes of the IQAC meetings are displayed on the staff notice board to communicate mechanisms and outcomes
- The college website carries information on the IQAC and the annual AQAR
- Formation of online groups on social media help to enhance interconnectivity

CRITERION VII

INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

A Green Audit was conducted by STEP Techno Solutions on 1st of February 2016. The Environment Sensitization Committee has formulated an action plan in phases in order to implement the suggestions given in the report. A 'green brigade' of active student members has also been formed to create awareness among their peers and to undertake environment related projects.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The following initiatives have been taken to promote a clean and green environment:

Energy conservation:

- There is signage in classrooms, computer labs and the library to switch off fans and lights when not in use. Student volunteers have put up indicators to mark switches with corresponding fans/ lights to reduce electricity consumption.
- Classrooms are spacious and well ventilated with large windows which allow the flow of natural light and air, thus reducing consumption of electricity for lights and fans.
- An inventory has been taken of equipment with the 'energy star' mark. Following the feedback given in the Green Audit, it has been proposed to the management that any equipment purchased henceforth should have a star mark to promote energy conservation.
- Screen savers in the computer labs have environment related messages. Computers in the lap are set so as to reduce screen display timings.
- The college is gradually replacing tube lights with LED lights in phased manner.
- Institute is in the process of converting existing gas lines into PNG pipelines for labs and canteen
- The biennial college exhibition in December 2015 focused on the theme 'Environment for a better tomorrow'. Students prepared charts on reducing energy consumption and audio-visuals were screened to visitors on environmental issues.

Water Harvesting:

• The campus does not have the space to introduce a water harvesting scheme. However, serious note is taken of water wastage and regular campaigns are conducted on the need to conserve water. Signage and notices are placed in washroom requesting students and staff not to waste water. Water and electricity conservation, and cleanliness are included in pledge taken by the institute. The pledge is displayed on ground and ninth floor, and printed in the college magazine and diary.

• Green Brigade volunteers monitor washrooms on all floors to report leaking taps and faulty water filters.

Check dam construction:

Not applicable as college is located in a metropolitan city

Efforts for Carbon neutrality -

- Lecture sessions are organized to make students aware of the concept of carbon footprints and the need to reduce the same. For instance, an orientation on the concept of solid waste management and carbon Foot printing by Ms. Shriya Bhatia (Environmental Planner at Mumbai Metropolitan Region Development Authority) was held on 6th Dec. 2014, and a workshop on sustainable development and carbon foot printing by Ms. Adhiti Muralidar (Scientific officer Homi Bhabha Science Centre) was held on 27th Sept. 2016.
- College ensures that new equipment which is purchased is CFC free (A/Cs and refrigerators, computers) by checking the standard mark.
- College restricts the use of mobile phones in classroom and laboratories.
- There is an institutional effort to make optimal use of paper thereby reducing carbon foot prints. As a response to the Green Audit, student teacher feedback was digitized from 2016 onwards to avoid paper consumption. Recycling of one sided papers is another important practice followed by staff and students. Notices, minutes and invitations are majorly sent through email & put on social networking sites.

Plantation:

- Although our college is located in the metropolitan city of Mumbai, it has a
 green ambience. NSS volunteers had participated in planting trees on the
 lanes outside the college, which are now fully grown The greenery on
 campus is enhanced by adding plants in the limited space available and also
 by maintaining potted plants. The NSS unit maintains a small garden (Katta)
 and regularly participates in Van Mahotsav programs of the Government
 and University.
- The college has started a certificate course in professional landscaping and will soon be implementing concepts of landscaping within the campus.
- For all functions, guests are felicitated with either a bamboo plant or a Tulsi
 plant in order to avoid use of floral bouquets. Paper gift bags are used instead
 of plastic bags.

E-waste management -

• The Srishtee E-waste project is undertaken by the Department of Computer Applications wherein students are educated on how e - components can be recycled and reused. Students have participated in collection drives in collaboration with Evergreen Recycle karo (I) Pvt. Ltd. The college received the 2nd prize at the Best Education Quality Enhancement Team competition, at the National Centre for Quality Management NCQM, for this project in January 2016.

General Waste Management

Efforts are made to monitor generation and disposal of waste according to the principles of 'reuse, recycle and reduce':

- Bins for segregation of recyclable and non-recyclable waste have been placed in the labs
- Workshops on waste management have been conducted to initiate the composting of wet waste in the food science labs.
- Cartons have been placed in the staff room, common room and select classrooms for the purpose of recycling of one sided paper.
- Students conduct a health and hygiene campaign by placing slogans and posters in washrooms. Newspaper sheets are made available for hygienic disposal of sanitary napkins.
- BCA department has taken the initiative of collecting flags which have been thrown on the ground on the public on 26th January & 15th August, as a mark of respect to our nation.

Additional initiatives:

- Visits are arranged to the "Maharashtra Nature Park, BPT Garden and ecofriendly hotel 'Orchid- Ecotel'. Students have visited 'Enviro- Vigil' at Thane to understand waste management techniques in biomedical waste and Kala Ghoda festival to view the installations on recycling of waste.
- Guest lectures have been organized on themes such as 'Green Technology', 'Waste management' and 'Bio diversity'.
- Students have participated in a project on mapping of biodiversity conducted by Ladybird Environmental Consulting. The project received 3rd prize at an intercollegiate undergraduate research competition in March 2016.
- The institute organized its biennial exhibition called 'Kaleidoscope' on the theme "Environment for a better tomorrow" on 11th and 12th December 2015. The theme of the intercollegiate technical festival of the BCA department 'Tekzone was 'green ITians Carnival' on 13th and 14th January 2015. Competitions included a fashion show to create awareness of environment related issues, and a documentary with the tag line 'share your green thoughts'. Inter-collegiate festival 'Akanksha' was based on theme 'Green Paradise' in August 2016. Competitions such as 'best out of waste', 'green post', essay competition and poetry recitation on subjects related to the environment were conducted as part of the festival.
- Under "Swachh Bharat Abhiyan", Gandhian Studies Centre and the NSS unit of college conduct campus cleanliness drives

7.2 Innovations



7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- It is now mandatory that all admission processes for programs offered by SNDTWU are online. However several of our students are from lower income groups and are not computer competent. They therefore face confusion over the process. On feedback given by the admission committee, student volunteer teams have been formed to assist with the online process of admission from 2013 onwards. The College provides 2 computer terminals on the ground floor, as well as access to terminals in the computer labs. Faculty members follow up with the administrative section to ensure that the procedure has been completed properly.
- The process of an inter-departmental audit was introduced in 2013-2014 as a mechanism to review annual evaluative reports of the departments, and enhance the departments' performance. The audit follows a four step process. First a self-audit by the department, then an review by another department, followed by review by IQAC coordinator, and finally by the Principal. Feedback is shared and departments formulate their action plan so as to enhance their teaching learning strategies, student support services and overall functioning.
- The IQAC nominates departments/committees at the beginning of the academic year to work on an entry for the best Education Quality enhancing team (BEQET) award organized by National Centre for Quality management (NCQM) in the subsequent year. This ensures that quality enhancement projects are undertaken in a structured manner. The college has been participating on an annual basis resulting in quality based initiatives as well as research based publications.
- The college offers a soft skills value added course which has been upgraded and enhanced according to requirements of the market place in 2013. One of the main suggestions given through the employer's feedback was that students need added inputs on communication and presentation skills. The soft skills course is therefore now divided into two components. In semester V, the focus is on presentation skills, while in semester VI the focus is mock personal interviews, participating in group discussions and preparing effective resumes and Statement of Purpose. Alumnae have acknowledged that this course has helped to enhance their employability skills. A 'Life skills course based on Gandhian values' has been introduced at SY level in 2014 to ensure that the students are equipped with the necessary skills for a holistic personality.
- A committee of nine non-teaching staff members was formed on 20th Feb. 2016 to discuss issues related to class III & Class IV employees, on regular basis. Several proactive measures have been taken on administrative issues, duties allotted to staff, cleanliness of the college. Under suggestion of the committee, sessions on interpersonal communication skills by Ms. Mayura Puntembakar has been introduced from July 2016.
- An active 'Students Placement and Industrial' committee provides opportunities to students to learn professionalism, communication skills and persuasiveness. BCA students are involved in the arrangement and coordination of campus interviews. Aptitude training for students of BCA

has been introduced through a MOU signed with SEED Infotech.in 2015. The process helps to improve students logical reasoning, quantitative math as well as stress and time management skills.

- Special strategies are used to help students from non-English medium background improve their reading skills, as poor reading skills which can be a serious impediment to the learning process not only in English but other subjects as well. The English department in collaboration with the library has started a book club to motivate students to read at least three books in a semester write reviews and make a brief presentation. The fiction collection in the library has been enhanced so as to cater to the needs of different reading levels. Students are introduced to the concept of e-book since there are several books (again according to reading levels) which can be accessed on SMART phones.
- 'Balmela' is an annual theme based funfair for children, between two to eight years of age from different strata of society. It is conducted by Dept. of Human Development with the objective of training students in management and organizational skills. Around 1500-2000 children from private and government schools, non-government organizations and differently abled children visit the Balmela. Students learn to plan, implement, exercise and evaluate activities, thus putting their theoretical knowledge into practical experience. In 2015, the event was sponsored by the Lion' Club of Sion.
- Annual seminar on pre-marital counseling has been conducted by the Human Development Dept. for the last six years for all students on campus. Students learn to identify important aspects of relationships and how to take a mature decision in choosing life partners. Eminent doctors and experts from the faculty of counseling, and reproductive health, are invited to address the students. The target audience is students in the age group of 18-20 years of age. The event was sponsored twice by the Rotary Club of Bombay Uptown.
- Under the subject of food product development in the VI Semester (FSN specialization), TY BSc students are taught how to develop and standardize an innovative, nutritious food product. Students are also taught nutritional labeling, packaging, budgeting, shelf life studies and marketing. This helps towards the creation of a research culture as well as enhancing entrepreneurial skills among undergraduate students.

7.3 Best Practices7.3.1

1. **Title of the Practice:** Enhancing employability quotient of students through academic-industry linkages

Goal:

Our institutional mission is the empowerment of our women students. Economic independence through employment is an integral step towards financial and emotional empowerment. The aim of our college is to develop employability skills of our students by networking with the Industry at various levels. We have therefore worked upon establishing linkages with the intention of enhancing critical and innovative thinking of our students, subject related technical skills

and the requisite soft skills required for the global market place. This practice is sustained by coordinating and interacting with industry experts in order to assist students to get a better understanding of a professional work environment, work ethics and corporate etiquette. Students are exposed to latest trends through discussions with industry experts and also hands on experience through internship, field and industrial visits. They therefore gain specialization-related knowledge that goes beyond conventional classroom teaching.

The Context:

Our first challenge in implementing the practice was to establish a rapport and build up the trust of relevant Industries/potential employers despite the fact that we are exclusively women's institution, primarily offering undergraduate courses. The B.Sc. program has an internship component in the 6th semester, and one faculty member of each department was delegated as a liaison to establish a rapport with places of internship. In this manner we have been successful in developing positive interactions with companies such as Marico, Britannia Foods, Enviro Care Pvt. Ltd, Four Points Sheraton, Shoppers Stop, Thomas Cook and Grasim Industries. The BCA placement cell was also assigned the task of reaching out to companies like Wipro, Tech-Mahindra, Capgemini, Infosys, and Cognizant for campus placements. Another challenging issue is that a large number of our students come from conservative socio-cultural backgrounds with very little exposure to the expectations of the global workplace. We therefore have had to develop institutional mechanisms wherein we can effectively motivate and mentor women students for the world beyond the college, in terms of employability. This included strengthening the soft skills value added course in the 5th and 6th Semester which has been made compulsory for all students.

The Practice

Our practice and its implementation had a three pronged approach. First we have involved experts from the industry in adding value to the curriculum taught. Secondly we invite experts on an ongoing basis to interact with the institution and students at various levels. We also involve experts from the industry in assessment practices, thereby inviting their feedback on students' performance. Thirdly, we have initiated and sustained a number of collaborative ventures with the industry.

The following practices have been established, and sustained:

From 2011 onwards, each department was asked to plan their academic calendar so as to invite subject experts from the industry for guest lectures as this would give them an added perspective of the requirements of the industry. For example BCA department has initiated a move to invite experts from industry to conduct 5% of their syllabus.

From 2013 onwards, it was decided that each department would invite at least 2 experts from the industry as members of the panel/ jury constituted for evaluating internship reports in the 6^{th} Semester. They offer invaluable feedback to students on the expectations of the market place.

From 2014, it was decided that each major would invite experts from industry to speak on career possibilities in the respective specialization as part of the B.Sc. orientation for major selection at the end of the second semester, and various job opportunities available after BCA course.

Members of the industry have also been invited as external experts of the LMC committees .For example Mr. Milind Rane, Deputy General Manager HR at Hardcastle Petrofer Pvt.Ltd, is a member of the LMC of BCA and Dr. Prabodh Halde, Head (International Regulatory Affairs) Marico Industries is the subject expert for the LMC of M.Sc. CND. Two alumnae (Ms. Trupti Kini, Research Analyst, IIT-Powai and Ms. Kanchan Gupta, Senior Software Developer, Morgan Stanley) are part of the LMC for BCA.

Eminent members of industry have been invited as Chief guest for events such as the inauguration function of the intercollegiate technical festival Tekzone, and National level seminars for e.g. Ms. Sunita Bhaskaran (Head – Oracle Practice, ATOS India), Mr. Sankar Ghosh (MD at Solution Architecture, Accenture), Mr. Nanasaheb Shendkar (Environmentalist and Chairman at Aaartist group of companies)

From 2014, at least one expert per specialization from industry is invited to be part of mock interviews which are conducted at TY Level, as part of the soft skills course.

In 2015, we signed a MoU for Aptitude Training in collaboration with SEED Infotech in order to improve students' logical reasoning, quantitative math, Stress and time management. In 2015, we also signed a MOU with Carepox Ltd for starting a certificate course in Entrepreneurial skills for 25 SY and TY RM students.

The M.Sc. CND department was given the responsibility of exploring linkages with the food industry and has successfully established linkages with companies such as with Marico, PepsiCo, Chini Kum, Pawaak and Easy to eat Foods which has led to collaborative projects.

Evidence of Success

As a result of our concerted efforts, the number of companies with which we now have associations have increased, and likewise the number of campus placements for courses like BCA has also increased by ---- percent. Importantly, we have been able to sign 6 MOUs for collaborative projects involving our M.Sc. students with companies like Marico and PepsiCo. The industry has taken interest in starting an 'Incubation project' for mentoring students who have innovative ideas for research projects and start up. We have been able to sign an MOU with Carepox Ltd. for an entrepreneurial skill development course, as well as with SEED Infotech for aptitude and soft skill training. SAS India Ltd has shown interest in our institution and has awarded our parent body a CSR for 30 lakhs to enhance our ICT infrastructure. Important intangible results is a marked improvement in the communication skills and confidence levels of our students.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:



We have had to face initial challenge of low motivation levels and lack of professional attitude amongst students who are sent to the industry, as they do not have the required socio-cultural impetus. We also had to work on improving English language skills which is a requirement of today's global sector. Often the rigid schedules of the Industry made it difficult for professionals from the Industry to give a commitment in terms of their time and effort



Enhancing employability quotient of students through academic – industry linkages



2. Title of the Practice: Inculcating a sense of social responsibility in students Goal: Describe the aim of the practice followed by the institution. Mention the underlying principles or concepts in about 100 words.

The Home Science program has ample possibilities for social outreach programs. Keeping this window of opportunity in mind, our institution decided to focus on inculcating the values of social responsibility in our students through a systemically designed plan of action. Our main objective is not only to create social consciousness among students, but also to guide them on how to take a more proactive role in society, and thereby transfer their learning from the classroom to the community. It was decided that we would implement our objectives through specially designed curriculum based activities, as well as specific extension activities that go beyond the curriculum. We took up the thrust area of gender based issues and issues related to underprivileged women and children.

The Context:

In 2012, the IQAC reviewed the extension activities undertaken by the institution at various levels. While there were ongoing activities conducted at different levels, the committee decided to systematize the processes so as to make extension activities more goal- oriented. A decision was taken to apply to the UGC for a grant to start a Gandhian Centre in the college. We received a UGC grant in 2013 and this gave us an institutional mechanism wherein we could plan activities to impart good citizenship through value education programs. Our Principal also instituted a 'value education endowment lecture series' in the name of her late father. A major impetus to our initiative was the 'Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan' program to promote gender sensitization which the government of Maharashtra introduced in 2012. A college level committee was formed to implement gender sensitization events for all students on campus. At the same time, each specialization was asked to focus on at least one activity in order to engage students in activism. The main challenge was to ensure participation of as many students as possible and to also sustain communityneighborhood -networking. The total beneficiaries per year on an average were 300 students.

The Practice

In order to implement the institutional goal of creating socially responsible citizens who will consciously contribute to the society, the college took the following steps:

Activities related to gender sensitization were allotted to a committee specially constituted for the same, named as Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan. The committee worked with the Adipaath Foundation to conduct sessions on personality development, legal rights of women, self-defense workshops and workshops against domestic abuse. A calendar of events was planned and implemented in advance with the target audience of all students on campus.

The Seminar workshop committee was asked to take up the responsibility of conducting the value education lecture series. It was decided that there would be at least one lecture each semester for FY and SY students.

The Gandhian Studies Center took up the theme of promotion of pluralism on campus and stressed upon the need to respect diversity and practices of social inclusion through a range of activities.

It was decided that the focus on health aspects would be undertaken by the NSS unit.

Each department was asked to focus an area related to their specialization. For instance, the Department of Food Science and Nutrition built up a rapport with the Chota Sion Hospital wherein students conduct nutrition awareness programs for mothers of young children, and the students of Textile Science and Apparel Design have conduced training programs in embroidery for underprivileged girls at the Ashadeep Association. 90 students under the mentorship of 10 teachers worked on a project to bridge the gap between generations as conceptualized by the NGO THRED (Trust for Human Resource Enrichment & Development). Students of the Human Development have been organizing an integrated Program of the Prangan Experimental Nursery school and socially disadvantaged children of Shraddhanand Mahila Ashram. Another successful venture is the annual 'Balmela' in February. This is a unique theme based fair for fostering creativity in children. Apart from schools in the area, welfare organizations are also invited to send children to participate in the event. In this manner, students are directed towards transferring skills they have imbibed from the college to the community. In time, they develop a sense of bonding with the community. They improve upon their communication skills, time management skills, problem solving skills, team work and leadership qualities, organization skills and analytical skills The focus on community oriented activities has contributed towards the holistic development of students.

Evidence of Success


The success of our performance can be gauged from the number of community linkages which we have established and sustained. We have had ongoing activities for the last four years with Chota Sion Hospital, Stree Mukti Sanghatana, Ashadeep Association and Shraddanand Mahila Ashram among others. We have received recognition for the extent of our gender outreach programs at State and District levels. The college received the 2nd prize at District Level and 1st prize at University Level for the academic year 2012-2013. and 2nd Prize at State Level,1st prize at District Level and 1st Prize at University Level for 2013-2014 from the Government of Maharashtra. We consider it a mark of the success of our best practice that we are continuing with the program despite the government discontinuing the scheme. Another marker is the MOUs signed with Stree Mukti Sanghatana and the sustained relationship with social service organizations such as Lions club and , Rotary Clubs who have expressed a keen interest in engaging our students in their activities.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required



The main challenge that we faced was to draw up a structured plan wherein all students on campus could be beneficiaries of this project in some way or the other. It was also a challenge to motivate faculty members to spare time for organizing such activities in addition to their existing workload. As we follow a hectic semester system, we had to find out as to how to cope with the time constraints and also to work out a chain of continuity. Students also had to be motivated to volunteer given the pressure of the curriculum. We worked towards getting financial support for the various activities and managed to do so mainly through human resources which we got from collaborating agencies.






